BRITISH PARLIAMENT.
The Opening on Thursday Last—The
Queen's Speech—Salisbury's Outline
of the Government Policy.

London, Jan. 21.—Parliament was for-
mally opened to-day by the Queen in
person. There was a brilliant assem-
blage in the House of Lords when the
Queen's speech was read.

Her Majesty in her speech said her
relations with other powers continue
friendly. Differences with Russia regard-
ing the Afghanistan boundary had been
satisfactorily adjusted. She trusts that
the work of the Anglo-English frontier
demarcation commission, already far ad-
vanced, may tend to secure the establi-
shment of peace in Central Asia.

Referring to the rising in eastern
Roumania, Her Majesty says her intention
in negotiations which followed the out-
break had been to bring the inhabitants
of that country, according to their wish,
under the Prince of Bulgaria's rule, while
maintaining unimpaired the essential
rights of the Sultan.

The Queen regrets that she had been
compelled to declare war against King
Theodor of Borneo, owing to acts of
hostility by himself and subjects. The
gallantry of the forces under Gen. Pen-
dlergast had rapidly overthrown the
Borneo forces and she declared that the
most certain method of ensuring
peace was to be found in the permanent
incorporation of Borneo with her Em-
pire.

The negotiations respecting the rights
of the French on the coast of Newfound-
land had been satisfactorily concluded.
With Spain also an agreement had been
reached giving the British the same
commercial rights as Germans in the
Caroline Islands.

Parliament would be asked to adopt
certain measures rendered necessary in
the convention relative to International
commerce, to which the Queen has
agreed.

Turning to internal affairs, the Queen
said: I regret to say that no material
improvement can be noted in the con-
dition of our agriculture. I feel the
deepest sympathy for the great number
of persons in many avocations of life who
are suffering under a pressure which I
trust will prove transient.

I have seen with deep sorrow the re-
newal, since I last addressed you, of the
attempt to excite the people of Ireland
to hostility against the legislative union
between that country and Great Britain.
I am resolutely opposed to any distur-
bance of that fundamental law, and in
restricting it I am convinced that I shall
be heartily supported by my Parliament
and my people. The social and political
condition of that country engages my
anxious attention. Although there has
been during the last year no marked
increase of serious crime there is in
many places a concerted resistance to
the enforcement of legal obligations, and
I regret that the practice of organized
intimidation continues to exist. I have
caused every exertion to be used for
the detection and punishment of these
crimes, and no effort will be spared on
the part of my government to protect
my Irish subjects in the exercise of their
legal rights and the enjoyment of indi-
vidual liberty. If as any information
leads me to apprehend, the existing
provisions of the law should prove to be
inadequate to cope with these growing
evils I shall look with confidence to your
willingness to invest my government with
all necessary powers.

Bills will be submitted for transferring
to representative councils in counties of
Great Britain local business which is now
transacted by the courts of quarter ses-
sions and other authorities.

A measure for the reform of county
government in Ireland is also in prepa-
ration. These measures will involve the
consideration of present incidence of
local burdens.

A bill for facilitating the sale of glebe
lands in manner adapted to the wants of
the rural population will also be sub-
mitted to you, as will also bills for re-
moving difficulties which prevent easy
and cheap transfer of land, for mitiga-
ting the distressed condition of the poorer
classes in the western highlands and
islands of Scotland, for the more effec-
tual prevention of accidents in mines
for extending the powers of the railway
commission, in respect to the regulation

of rates, and for the codification of
criminal law.

I trust that results beneficial to the
cause of education may issue from the
Royal Commission which I have appoint-
ed to inquire into the working of the
education acts.

The prompt and effective despatch of
the important business which, in an
ever-growing proportion, falls to you to
transact, will I, doubt not, occupy your
attention.

In these and all other matters per-
taining to your high functions, I earnest-
ly commend you to the keeping and
guidance of Almighty God.

In the House of Commons, Mr. Con-
nolly, nationalist member for Longford,
gave notice that he would ask leave to
introduce a bill to amend the Irish land
act. This announcement was received
by loud cheers from the house rule
members.

Mr. Gladstone said the conduct of
Lord Salisbury, in the Roumanian matter
was honorable to him and worthy of his
name, and was a credit to England. The
opposition would render Salisbury every
assistance and grant him every indul-
gence in connection with the settlement
of the Roumanian and British questions.

In regard to Ireland, Mr. Gladstone said
he wished the Queen's speech had been
more explicit. He was convinced that
only a gentle and conciliatory handling
of the Irish question would be effectual.
He had always striven to eliminate the
elements of wrath and passion in discus-
sing Ireland. The exercise of candor
and justice could alone afford the small-
est solution of the difficulty. "Whatever,"
he continued, "it may be necessary to
do for Ireland should be done promptly.
In the name of heaven let us maintain
it for 35 years—600 years; let us not
deviate from the path of good temper
and self-command, but, forgetful of
every prejudice, let us strive to do justice
to the great, the gigantic, interests com-
mitted to our charge." (Loud cheers.)

House of Lords.
Lord Salisbury, in a speech outlining
the policy of the government, said Ger-
many had given assurances that she did
not intend to amend Samoa. With
regard to Borneo, he said it would be
better to await the arrival of papers from
Lord Dufferin before making any state-
ment. The government was using its
influence to prevent any important
breach of international law. On this
point Lord Salisbury said he felt strongly,
because it had been reported that he had
given encouragement to Greece. This
statement he emphatically denounced as
untrue and declared that England,
above all, desired peace in the east.
Referring to Ireland, the prime
minister said the government had refrained
from renewing the crimes act, because
there had been a prospect of restoring
order in that country. Experimenting,
however, had failed, although every
chance has been given to make it suc-
ceed. Nothing, he said, could exceed
the patience of the East of Cornwall in
carrying out his mission of peace. The
disease existed in Westminster and not
in Ireland, and the government must try
to stamp it out here. The works of Mr.
Gladstone he declared, were answerable
for many Irish evils. Mr. Gladstone had
not spoken with sufficient firmness con-
cerning the integrity of the empire.

LONDON, Jan. 22.—The address in reply
to the Queen's speech was agreed to in
the House of Lords.

The News says the Government is dis-
appointed at the attitude of Gladstone,
and that Parnell hoped that the ex-
premier would amend the address and
that the ministry would be ousted as de-
fenders of the integrity of the Empire.

The debate in the Commons yesterday
left the impression that both parties are
anxious to conciliate the Parnellites and
have no desire to enforce strong coercive
measures. At the same time it is be-
lieved that there is no chance of either
Conservatives or Liberals proposing at
this session any Home Rule measure
likely to satisfy the Irish. Mr. Glad-
stone said that in speaking re-election
he was mainly guided by a wish to
proceed with proposals in regard
to both the legislature and
social position of Ireland. Only
the government, however, was able to
get in such a matter. He believing it
would be mischievous to do so, did not
intend to introduce proposals of his own,
but he would reserve his opinion. He
would also reserve his decision whether
to alter or to add to proposals embodied
in his election manifesto. He pleaded
for a patient hearing of the opinions of
the Irish Nationalists.

St. Michael Hicks Beach said it was
worrying not agrarian crime that had
increased in Ireland. The new Chief
Secretary for Ireland would consider the
question whether the ordinary powers
were sufficient or whether special powers
would be needed to suppress boycotting.

Mr. Gray will sit for Dublin and Healy
for Londonderry.

Mr. Parnell said that he had always be-
lieved that if the principle were admit-
ted that Ireland was entitled to some
form of self-government. The settle-
ment of details would not be found a
formidable task, and that there would
