### DENMARK MOURNS

King Christian Died on Mon-

**REIGNED 43 YEARS** 

One Daughter is Queen of England, and Another is Mother of the Czar

COPENHAGEN, Denmark, Jan. 2 -The King of Denmark is dead He died at 9 o'clock this morning [King Christian IX. was born April 8, 1818, and was therefore nearly 88 years of age. He was the fourth son of the late Duke Wilhelm of Schleswig-Holstein, He was appointed to the succession of the crown of Denmark by the treaty of London, May 8, 1852, and by the Danish law on July 31, 1853. He succeeded to the throne on November the 15, 1863 and has therefore reigned forty three years. In 1842 he married Louise, the daughter of Langrave Wilhelm of Hesse Cessel, who died Sept, 29, 1898. Their children are Prince Frederick, who now becomes king; Her Majesty Mar. 1, '05 By Deposit Receipt Royal Bank Queen Alexandra, wife of King Edward the V11.; Prince Wilhelm, now King George of Greece; the Empress Maria, wife of the late Czar of Russia; Princess Thyre, wife of the Duke of Cumberland, and Prince Waldemar.

No 33 Derailed at Eel River Saturday Morning

NO INJURIES

\$2813 95 Cause of Run Off Not Positively made 1000 00 Clear

The Maritime Express coming west on Saturday morning of last 33 30 week jumped the rails at the west side of Eel River Crossing. At the time of the accident the train was travelling at a high rate of speed and it is nothing short of a miracle that nobody was injured. This is due to two causes viz. the 6284 27 fact that cars standing in the siding prevented the cars of the express from tipping over, and because the pony truck of the loco-400 00 motive remained on the rails.
105 63 Had this truck, which acts as pilot to a locomotive, left the rails there is no telling what the result

would have been, The engine became detached from the train and when it came 500 00 to a standstill was over one hundred yards ahead of the wrecked cars. The top of the tender was thrown clear of its flooring and trucks, landed at the side of the track and slid along on the snow almost into the woods. The trucks then left the tender and the engine dragged the frame until she came to a standstill. The mail car was standing with one end on the track, the other in the ditch within a few feet of the line fence. ,The dining car and sleeper were badly torn by contact

with the cars in the siding. On receipt of the news that the accident had occured wrecking crews were sent from Campbellton, Newcastle and Moncton and the work of clearing the track was begun. The steam crane arrived. late in the afternoon.

The train was in charge of Con. A McLellan with Driver John Morton and Fireman, Frank Hogan on the engine.

The engine of the wrecked train 1284 50 is No 313 the same that was in 755 94 the smashup last spring near 420 01 Dorchester in which E. S. Wnite 1697 02 nearly lost his life. The unfortun-2628 43 ate engine is now dubbed Hoodoo 1000 11 No. 2.

Wreck of Steamer Valencia.

ON PACIFIC COAST

Awful Story of the Disaster. -Pitiful Tale of Survivors.

VICTORIA, B C., Jan. 24-The steamer, Valencia, enroute from San Francisco with 94 passengers and a crew of 60, went ashore at midnight last night during a thick fog and a large number were drowned when attempting to leave the ship. 


