## BIG ACCOUNT FROM ASSESSORS

Ask \$675.00 for Work of Assessing This Year—Will Remove Boat House

A meeting of the town council was held Tuesday evening in the town council chambers, His Worship Mayor Murray in the chair with Councillors Bissett, Jamieson, Ingram, Devereaux, McKay and Campbell present.

Minutes of previous meeting read and confirmed.  
A communication was read from the Sisters of the Hotel Dieu Hospital asking that the grant of \$400 voted them by last year's council be paid this year, the condition under which it was voted, that of procuring the necessary legislation giving the council power to vote money for such a purpose. Considerable discussion took place over this communication. On motion it was finally decided the Hotel Dieu Hospital be voted the sum of \$400 for this year.

A communication was read from Mr. Joseph Duncan protesting against the high valuation placed upon a piece of farm land of his by the assessors and requesting the town council to reduce the valuation to \$500, all he felt the land was worth. On motion valuation was reduced to \$500.

A communication was read from Mr. Wm. M. Ferguson asking that he be relieved from paying taxes this year, he not having been employed since returning from overseas in July last. Referred to Assessment and Appeals Committee.

The usual departmental accounts were passed and ordered paid.  
The account of the assessors, \$675, was laid over until next meeting for consideration.

The revisors, Messrs D. C. Firth, Wm. P. Gray and W. J. Comeau appeared before the council requesting that the assessors place in their hands a copy of the voters' list as required by law. The voters' list they had received from them did not contain the occupation of the voter nor yet did it give his residence. The assessors had informed the revisors that this is the only list they could supply them with. The revisors must have the voters' list from the assessors as required by law. On motion the town clerk was instructed to notify the assessors accordingly.

On motion of Councillor Devereaux, Adell Albert was granted a license to conduct a small grocery store on the considerable discussion also took place over the application of Street Commissioner Chas. Parker to have his pay increased from \$3.50 per day to \$5.75 per day. On motion the increase was not granted, the feeling of the council being that Mr. Parker having so recently accepted the position at \$3.50 per day could hardly expect an increase in pay at the present time.

His Worship brought to the attention of the council the importance of looking about for a water power site to operate an electric lighting plant. Today we were paying out some \$15,000 per year for power, which could be considerably reduced if a water power site were secured. Such a site he felt could be procured not far from Campbellton, and it would be well for the members of the council to consider the advisability of operating an electric lighting plant with

Town Thronged with Visitors who Spent a Pleasant Day—Attractions of High Order

Campbellton's Labor Day celebration was without exception one of the best in every respect ever carried out in this town.  
Citizens of all classes entered into the arrangements and while from the start success was assured, the most sanguine expectations of all were surpassed.  
The weather was perfect for such a day. The rain of Sunday night was just sufficient to lay the dust and refresh everything.

Applications were read from Frank Dolan and Gordon Connell making application for the position of fireman at the electric lighting plant, made vacant through the resignation of Henry Chamberlain. On motion Gordon Connell was appointed, the vote standing 3 to 2.

The electric light committee was authorized to have temporary lights placed at the lower wharf.  
Councillor McKay brought up the matter of having the cannons now on the school grounds remounted, the carriages having been burned in the Campbellton fire, then to have them placed upon the Park. The town clerk was instructed to write the Minister of Militia and ask if two gun carriages could be supplied Campbellton.

Mr. W. H. Wallace was heard before the council. He is opposed to Dr. Sprout being given the right to erect a boat house at the terminal of either Water or Prince William street. The one now at the foot of Prince William street was a disgrace.

The town clerk reported that he had seen Mr. M. Mowat who had erected the one at the foot of Prince William street and he had promised to have it removed within two weeks time.

On motion the application of Dr. Sprout for permission to erect a boat house at either the foot of Water or Prince William street was not granted. There being nothing further before the meeting council adjourned.

The fact that Campbellton had a little park added much to the celebration and even those who were opposed to making a park at this location are now favoring it. It is proposed to interest citizens generally and have trees planted and other work done to make it a place of beauty.

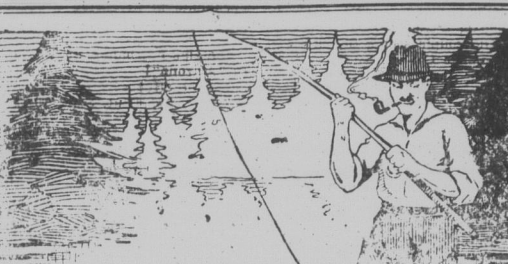

## PTE. DIXON WRITES FROM PRISON

Canadian Boy Who Nobly Did His Bit Cast into Prison—Disgrace to Canada.

His Majesty's Prison, Liverpool, 21, 7, 19. Dear Mother: Father and all at Home. I am only allowed to write once in every four months from here. You will have my last letter telling what the sentence was. You will be surprised no doubt; I know I was. But try to keep up heart as I am trying to make the best of it and trust to the Canadian Govt. to get me out soon. My heart is just about broken though now. It is so hard to be used like this after I tried to do right and was disabled in doing so.

I always tried to my duty in the army as my conduct sheets show and would gladly have given my life while in France, but to be sentenced to a term in jail over here for charge of mutiny I was innocent of is so hard to bear.

I never expected to go jail on these charges as I had all faith in Canada that they would see I got justice and fair play. If they don't well I know that the mutiny charges and I believe any other court but the one that tried me would have found me “not guilty”. I was told, Guthrie again before I was needed and I am sure he will do all power to have me freed. But it is up to the Canadian public to back him up. If they don't well I know that my country has gone back on me. I know you are all doing your best at home for me, I can't do anything to help myself now.

I don't hear anything about King's pardon for military prisoners at all though Peace has been signed and all now. The Canadian Govt. ought to ask for all military prisoners to be released, shouldn't they? That is all the Canadians I mean.

I pray to God night and morning to guide you all and help you to keep up heart and not worry. I am sure Col. Guthrie will fight until I am a free man and I expect Canada to support him. I am only asking for justice, I am going to see the governor here as I believe I can put in an application for a new trial. I don't think there is anything in it at all but I will put in the application anyway.

Do all you can to get me out here, well I can't say you will. I am not allowed to write of the treatment here. I am not ill used, but treated as a convict as I am supposed to be one. I hope you can make this out as I am making the best of the piece of paper.

Well I must close now. This is my birthday, I think of you all the time and trust I will soon be free to see you all again. Do all you can to get me freed or to get a new trial for me.

God bless you all and keep you all always try to keep up heart and hope for the best and I am sure the Canadian Govt. will clear me soon.

Oceans of love and kisses to you all, don't think it any use to write as I can only get a letter every four months.

Good-bye until I am free—

CARRY BOOTY TO SWITZERLAND  
Berlin Aug. 23.—(By the A. P.) A New Agency report suggests that the authorities have been utterly victimized in connection with the reported attempt to smuggle twenty million marks across the German-Swiss frontier. The news agency asserts that both the smugglers and the detectives who followed them in airplanes have arrived in Switzerland with the booty.

JAP POLICY ON THE MANCHURIAN AREA  
Tokio, Aug. 25.—It is reported that at its meeting recently the Imperial cabinet, upholding the opinions advanced by the military element in the government, decided to insist upon the exclusion of Manchuria and Mongolia from the consortium by which Great Britain, France, the United States and Japan will assume dominant position in the finances of China.

It is said that negotiations will be resumed with the powers on that basis.

RUMANIA KICKS AT THE DECISION  
Paris, Aug. 25.—(Havas)—The Rumanian cabinet has refused to accept the decision of the peace conference relative to the division of Rana and Temesvar between Rumania and Serbia, according to the Echo de Paris, which adds that Serbia is reported to be considering the general mobilization of her army.

ALLEGED SLAYER GIVES HIMSELF UP  
Moncton, N. B., Aug. 24.—Albert Nowlan, the alleged slayer of Dominion Police Constable Joseph Richards at Roy, Kent county, on Friday morning last week, voluntarily surrendered to Sheriff Boudreau at his father's home about midnight Saturday.

Since the death of Richards, Nowlan was being sought by the authorities. When glancing himself up, Nowlan expressed sorrow at the death of Richards, adding, “I hope people will not think that I had anything to do with it.” He was taken to the county jail at Richibucto.

The coroner's inquest into the death of Richards will commence Tuesday at 10 o'clock at Buctouche, conducted by Coroner D. V. Landry, M. D. A Jury was empanelled Friday and viewed the body, which was taken to Moncton Saturday and interred this afternoon under G. W. V. A. auspices.

The death of Richards is the sole topic of conversation in Buctouche and vicinity. Considerable difference of opinion is expressed regarding the sad affair, many contending that the death of Richards was accidental, while others hold to the belief that he was murdered. An autopsy was conducted Friday night by Dr. Delaney, of Buctouche, who will give evidence at the inquest regarding the nature of the wounds on the body. There is some doubt regarding whether Nowlan is a defaulter under the Military Service Act. He, however, was wanted for alleged interference with the police who arrested his brother some months ago on a charge of being a defaulter. The latter was fined \$250 and on refusing to pay was sent to Dorchester for two years. The inquest is being awaited with much interest.

Nowlan is a married man, with one infant child.

## CORNER STONE OF PARLIAMENT TOWER LAID BY PRINCE

Ottawa, Sept. 1.—Under smiling blue sky and to the strains of “O Canada,” His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales this morning laid the corner stone of the Peace Tower of the new parliament building. Following the laying of the corner stone, the Prince inspected the Ottawa War Veterans, massed for review on Parliament Hill and hoisted the new victory loan flag.

An immense crowd gathered on Parliament Hill to witness the laying of the corner stone and the square, surrounded by the beautiful and historic government buildings, was a scene of many colors.

GALICIAN FOUND DEAD AND ROBBED  
Kenora, Ont., Aug. 25.—W. Polodsky, a Galician, was murdered yesterday morning on the Canadian Pacific Railway track west of the tunnel Norman by some party unknown. His vest and shirt were torn open and a belt, which his friends state contained about \$300 in bills, was removed. His gold watch and \$18, which he had in a purse in his pocket, were not touched.

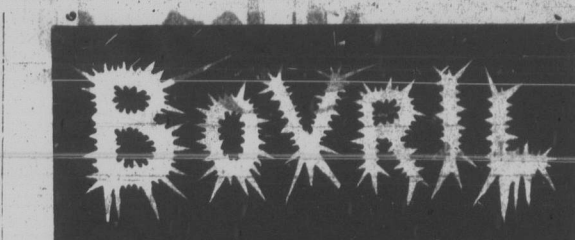

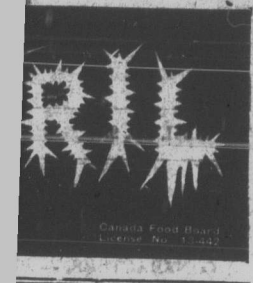

BELGIANS ACCEPT  
HOOVER'S PROPOSAL

Millions of Relief Commission Money Will Be Devoted to Education of Children.

Brussels, August 29—The Belgian Government has accepted the proposal of Herbert Hoover, Director General of the Inter-Allied Relief Organization, that the final assets of the Belgian Relief Commission, amounting to about \$1,000,000 be devoted to the creation of a foundation for the higher education of children of the workers and people of limited means.

The assets consist of deposits in Belgian banks and equipment and store which have not yet been realized upon.

**MEXICO MAKES  
IMPORTANT CONCESSION**  
President Carranza Issues a Decree Amending Reclamation Law.

Mexico City, Aug. 30—Important concessions were made by President Carranza today in issuing a decree amending the reclamation law. Briefly, they are as follows:

Claims for damages may be presented, not only for losses during the recent two revolutions ending with the installation of the present Government, May 1, 1917, but for losses sustained since then in various regions where revolts are still smoldering.

Damages by rebels or outlaws to person or property are subject to reclamation, when such damage is found to be the result of negligence on the part of constitutional authority.

A commission on indemnification will admit any means of proof "humanly reasonable." The claims commission can consider all cases, but the President has the right to arrange conventions with any foreign power for a mixed commission to handle claims of citizens of that power.

Claims by railroad companies and other public utilities taken over by the Government will be arranged either by the Federal claims commission or by agreement between the companies and the Secretary of the Treasury.

The most important amendment, it is considered, is that relative to the President's power to arrange conventions for mixed commissions with foreign Powers.

## THE GRAIN CROP VARIES GREATLY

Weekly Report of N. B. Department of Agriculture—Reports of Late Blight on Potatoes

The weekly report on agricultural conditions in New Brunswick, as reported by district representatives of the department of agriculture follows:

Fredericton, Aug. 29—Grain harvesting is becoming quite general in many sections of the province. The crop varies greatly throughout the province. In sections of Carleton, where drought crop is inclined to be light. Taking the province as a whole, the grain crop will be up to a fair average. It is somewhat thin on the ground but is well headed and well filled. Some northern counties report extra good crops of grain.

Reports of late blight on potatoes are beginning to come in from the potato inspectors. This has been much later than usual in showing up and the potatoes are nearer maturity. The cloudy weather, with little sunshine, seems to have favored the development of the disease. Just how far the blight will develop on the late varieties cannot be estimated at present.

Cobblers are being put on the market now, the average price received by the growers being around \$3 a barrel. Under live stock reports, there is little change from last week. The northern counties report farmers being offered \$5 each for lambs, but few sales are being made. Lambs are in good condition generally and growing well. Pastures are getting shorter all the time. Recent rains will freshen them up somewhat. Cows are reported to be in good demand, with prices remaining high. Beef cattle are slightly lower in price, due to the larger number coming on the market.

## AMAZING WORK OF ELEPHANTS, ASIA.

The elephants are our chief standby in Siam, and without them work could not be worked, as it grows in such inaccessible places that no hauling machinery could be brought near the tree. Elephants can climb like cats. It is marvellous to see them pick their way up and down steep slopes, but sometimes they lose their foothold. One of our elephants fell down a steep river bank last year, hit her head against a rock and broke her neck. The work of the elephants consists in climbing up to the fallen tree and pushing or rolling them downhill to a spot where it is level enough for dragging chains to be attached. Then they drag the logs down to the nearest floating creek, often a few miles away. An elephant can handle from fifty to seventy logs per season, which lasts from about the first of June till the end of February. Then it becomes too hot for them to work, and they go into rest camps until the next rains. The elephants do their best work in floating streams, working the timber with the current, releasing logs from jams and rolling the stranded logs back into the water. The elephant drivers have a special "elephant" language which the animals understand—a special elephant vocabulary with such terms as "Push sideways," "Roll," "Pull out," "Stop," "Lift your chains."

It is very interesting and exciting to watch the elephants at work in high water. They are magnificent swimmers. When they swim from bank to bank, holding the logs that require their special attention you see nothing of them except the tips of their trunks through which they breathe, and the mahouts, or drivers, who are generally in water up to their waists. If a big stack or jam racks suddenly where elephants are working, they know the danger of being overtaken. They trumpet and clear off to either bank or go. I once saw an elephant working in deep water and go swept under the stack. We all believed that he was a goner, but every now and then we were surprised to see his trunk come up the head of a jam slip of a rock into through the logs, suck in a long breath and go down hill a short distance, reappear each time further down-foot of the jam, very much blown, but otherwise none the worse for his accident. But he would not go near a pile of timber in high water for a year stream. He finally emerged at the afterwards. This particular work is called "hauling."

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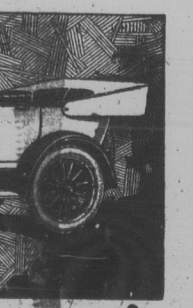
