## TOWN COUNCIL NAMES COMMITTEES

Seeking Legislation to Legalize Appointment of Town Manager.

A meeting of the Town Council was held Monday evening, His Worship Mayor McKay presiding. Council members present were: Messrs. Gorman, Dunsmuir, Moore, and Marquis were present. The regular order of business was suspended for the purpose of drafting a resolution to be presented to the Council on Monday night in committee of the whole, Coun. Marquis in the chair.

## BATHURST MAKES HIGHEST SCORE

Winners of North Shore Bospital At Bathurst by Very Close Margin.

The Tenth Annual North Shore Curling Bospital was held at Bathurst last Thursday and Friday and was won by Bathurst by the narrow margin of two points. All clubs of the North Shore were represented by four rinks and play started at nine o'clock Thursday morning and continued until 10:30 Friday evening. The total points made by each club is as follows:

Skip Shivers of Bathurst made the highest score of the bospital, 67. Campbellton won thirteen games and lost three; Bathurst won 11, lost three and tied two; Newcastle won nine and lost ten; Chatham won four; lost ten and tied two; Dalhousie won two and lost fourteen.

The result of the play was in doubt until the last stone was played. Skip Stout of Bathurst was playing against Skip Jefferys of Newcastle. All the other games had finished and it was found that Campbellton was two points in the lead. Stout was lying three when Skip Jefferys went to play his last stone. He tried a wicked shot of a Baturst to get number one but played a little too wide and struck a Bathurst stone in front and rolled it in for the fourth count, thus giving Bathurst two of the lead. Needless to say there was a great shout of joy from the Bathurst curlers as they realized that the beautiful North Shore Bospital trophy had been won.

On Thursday evening all the visiting curlers were given a sumptuous banquet at the Gloucester House and the usual round of songs and speeches enjoyed by all. Two of the soloists being H. B. LeLay and H. V. Murray of Campbellton.

It was really a splendid bospital and one that will be remembered because of the close and exciting nature of the play. This gives Bathurst their second win on the new trophy which must be won three times to assure final possession. The trophy, handed over to the club by the Gloucester House, is the second one put in play in a period of ten years.

While Bathurst has won this year on total points which is the deciding factor agreed upon, it is nevertheless one of the vagaries of this system of scoring that the club put in play the best showing is sometimes denied the premier position. To Campbellton really belongs the honor of the most creditable showing as a club in the above figures will show:

History of Games.	
The First North Shore Bospital was held in Chatham in February 1914, between Campbellton, Bathurst, Newcastle and Chatham curling clubs, and was won by Campbellton.	
The Second Bospital was held in Campbellton in February 1915. This year the Dalhousie Curling Club was represented. The Bospital was won by Campbellton.	
The Third Bospital was held in Newcastle in February 1916, between the same five clubs, and was again won by Campbellton. It was decided that commencing with the 1916 Bospital the club winning the Bospital Trophy three times should own it.	
Campbellton accrued that victory of 1914 and 1915 would not count in contest.	
The Fourth Bospital was held in Dalhousie in February 1917. This year the "Wood" Schedule of play was adopted for the first time. Campbellton won the Bospital with a score of 228 Points.	
The Fifth Bospital was held at Bathurst in 1918. It was played on the "Wood" Schedule and was won by Bathurst with a score of 210 points.	
The Sixth Bospital was held at Chatham in 1919. Bathurst again curling with a score of 202.	
The Seventh Bospital was held at Campbellton in 1920. Bathurst again winning with a score of 255 Points. As this was the third win by Bathurst, the first Bospital Trophy became the property of the Bathurst Curling Club.	
A Second Trophy was put up for the Bospital beginning 1921, when Bathurst won out in Newcastle with a score of 226 points.	
The 8th Bospital was held at Dalhousie in 1922, Campbellton winning with a score of 229.

## WAS ASSOCIATE OF LATE MEMBER

Resident of Hopewell Hill Pays Tribute to Late Archibald MacKenzie.

Hopewell Hill, Feb. 7.—The news in the press this week of the death at his home in Campbellton of Archibald MacKenzie, an old-day legislator and a former member of the House of Assembly, brought sincere regret and was of special interest to a resident of this place who was a particular friend of the late member and sat with him in the local House during the sessions of 1874-1878. This resident is Alexander Rogers, registrar of deeds, who represented Albert county in the Assembly during the term mentioned, when the late Mr. MacKenzie was the popular representative of Restigouche. Mr. Rogers is probably now the only surviving member of that House of nearly half a century ago. The late Hon. George E. King was then Premier; Hon. J. J. Fraser, provincial secretary, and Hon. William Wedderburn, Speaker. Mr. Rogers and the late Mr. MacKenzie were closely associated in their legislative duties and occupied the same lodgings during the four-year term, developing a close friendship that was kept up after the late Mr. MacKenzie's death. Mr. Rogers today paid high tribute to the late Mr. MacKenzie's sterling qualities of heart and life and general kindness of disposition that had not failed to give him friends on all sides during his life-time and would call forth sincere regret at his passing.

## COUNTY'S OLDEST RESIDENT DEAD

Woman Died, in Car At River Charlo Last Week.

Mrs. Elizabeth Buchanan, who is believed to have been the oldest woman resident of Restigouche county, died at the home of her daughter Mrs. John Faulds at River Charlo on Wednesday February 7th inst.

The late Mrs. Buchanan who was formerly Miss Elizabeth Peters of Canobie, Gloucester Co., was born at that place in 1824 and was thus in her 100th year. She was predeceased by her husband some 35 years ago. From Canobie she moved to Black Point about 40 years ago where she lived until last March when her home was destroyed by fire. Since that time she resided at River Charlo with her daughter Mrs. John Faulds. Mrs. Buchanan's death was doubtless due to old age but the loss of her home a year ago and exposure suffered at that time constituted an experience from which the aged lady never recovered.

Deceased leaves to mourn three sons one daughter and ten grand children. The sons are George of Campbellton, Robert of Manchester, N. H., and Lincoln at home, Mrs. Faulds of River Charlo is the only surviving daughter. The funeral services were held on Friday the deceased daughter and two grandchildren being present for the burial. Interment was made in the Presbyterian Cemetery at Clifton Gloucester County.



#### FUNERAL OF LATE MR. JOHN GOUGH

The funeral took place at St. Sauveur on Wednesday morning last of the late John Gough, Esq., formerly of Nouvelle-Bonaventure county, but who has been living in this city for several years. Prior to his coming to the city, Mr. Gough was, for a long time, a highly respected citizen of Bonaventure county, where he enjoyed the esteem of all who knew him. He was of a kindly servicable disposition. He took an active interest in the public events in his country and did yeoman service to the party of his choice in the political campaign waged in that part of the Province during the last quarter of the last century. He was a staunch supporter of Hon. Maurice Sir Francis Levesque, the chief Justice, and other eminent men who, in the 70's and 80's, fought many a battle royal in far-off Bonaventure. The deceased was a great friend of the late James Carrel, founder of the "Quebec Daily Telegraph" and father of the Hon. Frank Carrel.

Several years ago, Mr. Gough had the misfortune of being stricken with total blindness, a calamity which he supported with true Christian fortitude. He then decided upon removing to Quebec where he might receive the care and attention his condition required. He had found the comfort as well as the solace of a home at the St. Sauveur Orphanage where his last years were surrounded with the utmost devotion which Christian charity can provide and where he died peacefully on Monday last, at the age of 78 years.

The funeral took place Wednesday morning at the St. Sauveur church and the burial at the parish cemetery.
