



An Entirely New Industry Being De veloped in Canada

W. W. Price, the Toronto Sun's traveling correspondent, furnishes some ineresting information regarding an entirely new industry which is being developed in Woodstock. This is nothing the Beachville, Strathroy, and another butter factory. At these butter factories the skimmed milk, which has been left after the cream has been tak-en away, is curdled and pressed like skim cheese. This cheese is then sent to the factory at Woodstock. where it is kiln-dried, ground into powder, and then made into glue. For the milk used in this way farmers receive from

20 to 24 cents per cwt. net. It is intended to put up a much larger kiln in connection Woodstock factory this fall, and then to draw supplies from a number of fac-tories and to manufacture glue on a very large scale. It is said that ex-tensive orders have already been plac-
