



This increase in the number of patients admitted justifies considering very seriously the need of providing more room. The old building might be remodeled and fitted up for the reception of patients. THE CANCER

No Direct Cures Made by Any Special Treatment—Many Experiments Made.

London, Dec. 12.-The reports of Professor W. J. Morgan's successful treatments of cancer by means of trypsin, combined with Dr. C. W. Saleeby's writing on the same subject here, have aroused interest in all sections of the community. Inquiries at the chief cancer hospital of London, in Fulham road, show that the use of trypsir there has not been accompanied by the success reported from the United States. For the past six months half a lozen patients have been under the trypsin treatment, but not one result has been favorable. Of the patients selected none was going downhill or in such condition that nothing would have done any good. The trypsia used was active. It would digest egg albumen.

The hospital authorities, asked to account for its success in the United States and failure in London, said they could not account for anything of which they did not know the full circumstances. It must always be borne in mind that many reported cures of cancer were found not to be cancer at They first wanted to know beyond all doubt if the disease was cancer, clinically and microscopically. When Dr. Beard, of Edinburgh, was quoted as having cured cancer in mice with trypsin the reply was to the effect that the value of the experiment was handicapped by the fact that the growths induced in mice by inoculation also disappear spontaneously, without the use of trypsin. Cases are recorded of tumors disappearing from the human body, but they are very rare. Cases have been found here where

The hospital has tried everything, but hitherto the expected results had not appeared. The representative of the hospital added: "Meantime, we are clearing ground. 




