Teutons Driving Through the Trentino In Effort To Flank Italians and Force Retirement From the Piave-Rome Reports Italians Across River, Blowing Up the Bridges and Stopping Enemy's Thrusts.

Rome, Nov. 10-An Italian rear guard force, which had been surrounded at Lorenzago, succeeded in forcing

Berlin, Nov. 10-Via London.-The Austro-German forces which are invading Northern Italy, have reached the Piave River. Asiago has been captured. The Piave River has been reached all the way from Suzgana to the Adriatic,

Asiago is on the Trentino front, 20 miles west of the Piave River, along which the Italians have been expected to fight a decisive battle.

The capture of Asiago indicates that the Germans and Austrians have begun an offensive on the Trentino front in an effort to outfiank the Piave line. The breaking of the Italian front at this point probably would entail retirement of the Italians from the Piave line.

Suzgana is at the foothills of the Alps. The Germans have reached the Piave all along its course over the Playe all along its course over the plains of Northern Italy.

Mr. Justice Middleton of Toronto gave an eloquent address before the St. Andrew's Men's Club at the opening banquet of the season held at St. Andrew's Church Friday night.

J. H. Laughton, the new president of the association, opened the evening with a strong appeal for the members of the society to co-operate in its work introduced to the assembly by John Gunn, Justice Middleton addressed the gathering on "Reconstruction and Its After-the-War Phases."

"Before the war the universe was drifting into problems which would have culminated in a greater, more bloody conflict than the present one had these conditions been allowed to continue," said the judge.

"Labor and social disorganization was rapidly reaching a crucial stage at the outbreak of war, and it must be the effort of all intelligent men who have learned great, broad truths, developed from the present conflict, to premeditate the problems of our social, laboring life and to teach the great truths underlying Christianity.

"Prior to the war, a large proportion of the dominion population entertained the impression that Canada would some day become an independent state or join hands with the United States. QUERIES REGARDING MILITARY SERVICE

Question.—A man has been examined and placed in category D. Is he liable to be called for overseas service?

Answer.—Category D includes those men who are temporarily unit for service, but who, because they may become fit later, are actually not classified at all. It is exeremely improbable that such men would be asked to serve overseas, unless their condition were to improve, or unless having come before another board for classification, they should be rated in a category higher than D.

Question.—I have claimed exemp-Question.—I have claimed exemption on the grounds of being a farmer. How should I word a claim to the exemption tribunals? F. T. 



Each tribunal in this district will have no more than 25 claims for exemption to deal with in any one day, according to Deputy Registrar Wismer, who has already allotted to each tribunal its work for next Monday and Tuesday.


A total of 175 men in this city will receive by registered letters some time today notices informing each at which tribunal and at what time his case will be handled. This systematic allotment will mean that there will be no confusion.

When the man is notified that his case is to be handled by a certain tribunal on a certain day, he can appear in person, according to his own wishes. If he has furnished complete writing data he need not appear unless he wishes, except where the tribunal wants him to have cleared up some point or gain more information as to this man's case.

The procedure in such a case will then be to advise the deputy registrar that the man is wanted in person to appear before the tribunal to answer questions and give information which the tribunal may require.

The deputy registrar will notify the man by registered mail if the tribunal requires his personal attendance and will mention the day and time at which he must appear. If a man should then decline to appear, his spellication for exemption would in all likelihood be refused, and he would thereby have prejuditeed his own sase by his failure to appear.



BRITISH SEA LORD SQUELCHES GERMAN **NAVAL SECRETARY**

Enemy Fleet Dare Not Show Itself on the Seas.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—The admiralty, replying to the German secretary of the navy's criticism of the recent speech in the House of Commons by Sir Eric Geddes, first lord of the admiralty, says:

"The world knows from the Cattegat events that the royal navy is waiting for the high seas fleet, which still continues to decline battle. No German war vessel larger than a destroyer has shown itself 150 miles west of Heligoland from August, 1916, to October, 1917,

when two light cruisers attacked a Scandinavian convoy."

The reference in the above dispatch to the Cattegat deals with the sinking by British warships of the German auxiliary cruiser Marie and ten other armed patrol craft, while that concerning the attack by two German light cruisers on a Scandinavian convoy evidently refers to the sinking of nine neutral vessels and two British escorting torpedoboat destroyers in October in the North Sea.

Washington Officials Fret Regarding Russia.

AT HOLDING UP OF

DIPLOMATIC NOTES

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—Russia's latest upheaval will not change the attitude of the American Government toward measures under way for the relief of economic conditions in the demoralized country. This statement, applying particularly to contracts placed with money borrowed from the United States for vast quantities of shoes and clothing for the population, was the only authorized comment at the state department today upon the overthrow of the Kerensky Government at Petrograd.

Official advices from the Russian capital still are lacking, no word having been received from Ambassador Francis since Tuesday. Apparently the British and French Governments have not heard from their representatives, so it is assumed that the revolutionists in control of the Petrograd telegraphs and cable are holding up all diplomatic dispatches, an action certain to draw strong protests.

The situation was discussed at today's cabinet meeting, but Secretary of State Lansing was unable to add anything to information appearing in the newspapers. A cable received during the day from Minister Morris at Stockholm, summarizing dispatches printed in the Swedish newspapers

Began With Two Hundred Members — Presented "A Midsummer Night's Dream" First Year of History -Fairies of Those Days Now

Mothers of Families.

The large attendance at the artists concert of the Woman's Music Club held last Monday evening in the Masonic Temple was not only a tribute to the artists and a practical demonstration of sympathy for the cause for which it was given, the Byron Sanatorium for tuberculous soldiers. Half a dozen or so women pianists and vocalists were in the habit of meeting in the mornings in the Carling drawing-room to satisfy their own cravings for music. Ottawa had a floating population during the session and frequently many fine musicians were to be found among the members' wives. Hearing that Montreal had a fine music club, the Ottawa group wrote for a copy of the constitution. The musical women of Ottawa were collected together and in a short time a club was started, with 200 members. The following autumn and winter Miss Carling was back in London and persuaded a number of London women to organize a music club. It was an interesting coincidence that the London club, like the Ottawa, had a first year membership of 200. Mrs. John Labatt was first president, and Mrs. Charles Moore (Frances Hatton Moore) the honorary president. Among other members were Miss Graydon, Mrs. Betts, Mrs. Chadwick, Miss Raymond, Miss Morphy (now Mrs. Snell), Mrs. Paull, and Miss Fitzgerald (now Mrs. White of New Westminster).

Former Londoner Starts It-Irvine Cobb and Other Celebrities Assisting.

Arthur Lawrason, & former London er, who has won a place of prominence in the musical world of New York as a singing teacher of interna fame, has set the ball rolling to provide the American base hospitals with music

The inspiration began to sprout at the time Mr. Lawrason accompanied his distinguished pupil, Madame Regina Vicayino to the city last spring when she sang at a Musical Art Society concert in March. She expressed her desire to sing to the returned solders and together they visited the Central Military Convalescent Hospital and the Byron Sanatorium for Tuberculous Soldiers. Mr. Lawrason, like the prima donna, was deeply impressed by all that he saw, and subsequently announced that he was presenting a "music box" to the Sanatorium for Tuberculous Soldiers.

In order to get a variety of records, he inserted advertisements in American musical publications asking for donations of records. He had responses from California to Florida and from the extreme north to the extreme south of the United States, 325 in all, which have arrived and are ready to give pleasure as soon as the new building is opened.

price occurred as a result of the abundance, but each bag sold from \$1.85 to \$2 each.

Vegetables went at a fast clip and in wholesafe quantities. Parsnips brought from \$5c to 75c per bushel, and turnips sold at 25c to 40c in similar quantities.

One of the big features of the morning's trading, and even of the week's offerings, was the unexpected number of peaches which appeared. Although of a particularly poor quality and at a high price, the fruit was in good demand. Small baskets sold at 50c and the larger kind brought 75c. One of the fruit dealers on the square stated some time ago that he would have a large quantity of late peaches for sale, but this did not materialize until this morning. Apples also were to be obtained in large portions. The quality of apples is not exceptional, but they nevertheless brought a good price, many baskets selling at 50c to 35c per 12-quart basket. Only two dressed hogs appeared and these called for \$21.50 per cwt.

Hay continues to be in the best demand, the range of prices being \$11 to \$13. One load was sold at \$14, but this was of an exceptionally fine quality and so cannot be taken as representative of the prevailing prices.

About half a dozen baskets of grapes were grabbed up by the marketers as soon as they appeared. Butter and eggs are firm and sell whenever offered. Butchers' meats were scarce and the demand poor. Poultry is to a large extent being substituted for meat until Christmas, hence the good demand for the birds.
