Throughout the day the enemy threw his greatest pressure toward the centre of the Allied line in an effort to gain as much ground as possible southward in the direction of Conpeigne. Under the powerful push of the continually-reinforced enemy columns the Allies were forced to give way a little, but they fought tenaciously for every inch of ground. An epic struggle occurred in the vicinity of Plemont, where the small garrison of dismounted cavalry-men possibly may still hold out. French soldiers who managed to get through the German lines late yesterday declared that before they left the Germans had delivered terrific assautts, all of which have been repulsed with heavy losses for the enemy. of which have been repulsed with heavy

A Terrific Conflict.

Several small villages, including Mery Belloy and St. Maur, changed ownership a number of times, but this evening were in German hands. On the Belloy Plateau, fighting went on continuously for several hours, man tackling man in single combats.

# HAIG ADVANCES ON THE EAST OF AMIENS; FOCH TAKES BACK POSITIONS

THE WAR SITUATION

Moving with steadiness, in spite of the frightful losses inflicted upon them, the Germans, in their plunge southward on the line from Noyon to Montdidler, continue to get in here and there in the centre of the line, where their greatest efforts have been exerted and where the French resistance might have been expected to be most stubborn. The enemy's greatest advance is at Vignemont, six miles from the line as it stood last Saturday.

Foch Counter-Attacks.

The French have launched counterattacks on the left of their line, which may be an indication that they have reached the front where they will make their final stand. This line seems to be along the Anonde River, a small stream flowing west and northwest from the Olse and roughly paralleling the line of the advance.

The Germans, according to the official statement issued by the French war office, reached the "vicinity" of this stream. This marked the limit of their advance, however, and the French Immediately attacked and drove the enemy back to the line passing through Belloy, south of St. Maur, south of Marqueglise and Vandelicourt. The village of Mery, west of Belloy, was retaken by the French on Monday night.

Where Enemy Gains.

This part of the battlefront, however, is apparently not the most menacing to the French. It is further east that the German seem to be making their most telling gains. Here, along the right bank of the Oise, they have reached Antoval, a village which lies on the crest of the hills

London, May 31.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press).—The British seamen, which it was agreed last year should last at least a month for every new crime committed by enemy U-boats, has now reached a total of five years and eight months. J. Havelock Wilson, leader of the British seamen, in a speech at Albert Hall, said that the 250,000 men in the shipping industry were determined not to tolerate any German in a British ship and were agreed unanimously that they would not take a ship to any German port as long as the boycott lasted.

WATCHED FOR U-BOATS ALL WAY ACROSS OCEAN

An Atlantic Port, June 11.—A large British passenger liner which arrived here today was warned to look out for German submarines and was escorted into port by a scout seaplane, which met the ship some distance at sea, some of the 176 passengers said. News of German U-boats in American waters reached them before they sailed from Europe, they said, and the same precautions as observed in the war zone about the British Isles were observed all the way across the Atlantic. Nothing of an alarming nature was seen.

WOULD KEEP GERMAN POSSESSIONS OVERSEAS

Anzacs Go Into German Area Half Mile On Two Mile Front-French Retake Mery and By Brilliant Counters Straighten Out Line Bent By Foe Monday—Foch Stops All Attacks On Right, But Gives Little Before Great Pressure On Left.

London, June 11.—The British last night carried out an operation to the east of Amiens by which their line south of Morlancourt was advanced a half mile on a front of a mile and a half, the war office announced today. Two hundred and thirty-three prisoners were taken.

The text of the statement reads:

'Last night anoth, r operation was undertaken with complete success by Australian troops in the region of Morlancourt. The south of the village has been advanced to the depth of nearly a half rolle on a front of over a mile and a half, and 233 prisoners 21 machine guns and a trench mortar were captured by us.

FRENCH RECAPTURE MERY.

Paris, June 11.—The German drive between Montdidier and Noyon continued unremittingly last night, says today's official report. On their left the French offered effective resistance. They recaptured the village of Mery.

The principal German effort was directed against the centre. Attacking with heavy forces, the enemy drove back the French as far as the region of the Aronde River, but by a brilliant counterattack the French hurled back the enemy all along this front and SINN FEIN TACTICS attack the French hurled back the enemy all along this front and re-established their lines south of Belloy, at St. Maur, south of Marqueglise and at Vandelicourt.

On their right the French engaged in violent combats with Will Fight the O'Leary-Devoy large forces concentrated by the enemy, who was able to gain ground. The French withdrew their line to the west and south of Ribecourt.

New York, June 11.—Seventy-five thousand New York Irishmen have joined in a nation-wide movement to combat the tactics of the Sinn Feiners, who, led by such men as Jeremlah A. O'Leary and John Devoy, have attempted to identify the agitation for the freedom of Ireland with anti-British propaganda in this country. So far he has succeeded, in two days of fighting, in carrying forward his line at the maximum point of advance, in Vignemont, a distance of six miles. In this he has been materially aided by a considerable number of tanks which the French artillery was at first unable to demolish.

WIDENS THE WEDGE.

The enemy further succeeded in widening the point of his wedge by bringing up two divisions of the guards and two Bavarian divisions borrowed from the army group of Crown Prince Rupprecht. These troops captured the villages of Mery, St. Maur and Belloy, giving him a plateau behind which he can mass troops partially screened from observation by

the French.

TRYING TO REDUCE SALIENT. Paris, June 11.-Through the lavish use of men and material the Germans sought all day Monday to widen the gains of Sunday in the centre of the Montdidier-Noyon sector. The total result was a slight advance on the left-centre, which nowhere exceeded a mile in depth The primary object of the German operations is to reduce the salient left standing between the gains made in the March and May offensives. WHY FOE IS DESPERATE.

Both the strenuous and, on the whole, effective resistance of the French and the furious efforts of the Germans are explained by the fact that an enemy success would involve the retirement of the French forces defending the line between the Aisne and the Marne, threaten both Paris from Compeigne, Villers-Cotterets and Chateau Thierry.



In Later Months.

Toward the end of the second year the child partakes of but three daily meals. Begin by omitting the meal of milk taken just before bedtime and gradually increase the importance of the midday meal. Now the little tot begins to show its likes and dislikes for hils food.

Let breakfast consist of a cereal with plenty of milk but little sugar and a single fresh egg, either soft-boiled (one minute) or poached. Breakfast foods usually require several hours' boiling, which can be done the day before. In the morning the cereal may be warmed over. A single cupful is enough for the child 2½ and 3 years old.

Until it is 3 years old the child's midday meal consists chiefly of meat broths, chopped or scraped meat and potatoes (boiled or baked). Beginning with very small portions, green vegetables, such as spinach, beans, celery, young lettuce, well cooked and mashed, may be added, and a dessert at the end may be given consisting of a part of a baked apple or pear with the skin and seeds removed, or a few stewed prunes, seeded. Water, but no milk, should be given with this meal.







### PRACTICAL RAILROAD ECONOMY-McADOO IS FIND ING OPPORTUNITY

It is not improbable that Director General McAdoo's order for the removal of froad presidents from the Government pay-roll will be followed by some quiet fting or dismissal of some of the numerous assistants to railroad presidents. ome of these assistants secure their positions through influence or family con-ections. Here is an instance: A president of a certain eastern trunk line had son. To put him on his staff of assistants would not look well and might exa son. To put him on his stain of assistants would not be desired as the president of the line, who had a friend at the head of a big central west railroad system. His friend also had a son, and so it came about that the son of the eastern railroad president was named as assistant to the president of the middle western road and the son of the president of the latter system was named as assistant to the resident of the eastern line, and both sons drew fat salaries, not on account f experiece or training, but because their fathers were railroad presidents. Mr. IcAdoo will doubtless find these things out in the inquiry that is now on and likely there will be another shake up.

A certain American railroad had 17 officers and department heads and 561 office employees in its main office, and it was found that the total of the salaries received by the officials and department heads exceeded the combined wages of the 561 employees. Under Mr. McAdoo's wage and salary readjustmenthis will all be changed. Branch passenger ticket offices in the large cities are being abolished, in fact many of them have already been closed and "for rent" signs have been hung out of the windows In downtown New York a central office has been established in a big office building that has a very large entrance lobby, part of which has been partitioned off for the purpose. The new office s not handsome and has no luxurious fittings, but there will be a big saving in men and rent and that is the main object,

### SAVE SOMETHING DURING PROSPERITY - HAVE SOMETHING READY FOR LESS PROSPEROUS TIMES.

When everything we have to buy, whether it be to eat or to wear, compands such abnormal prices, it might, to some of the readers of this column seem almost absurd to try to induce the ordinary individual to save money from present earnings, and yet we see our savings banks deposits rolling up to unpresent earnings, and yet we see our savings banks deposits rolling up to any precedented figures. This is readily accounted for by the fact that enormous sums are being paid out for labor now and to many a wage they never dreamt of earning. Only last week the writer was shown a young woman at work in one of the industries of a near city, whose weekly wage rarely goes below \$35, and has a possible on the bonus system, of \$45 for six days' work of eight hours each. In another industry we learn of a fortnightly payoll of \$204,000 to \$210,000 or over one million dollars per annum. While prices of all commodities are high work is plentiful at correspondingly high wages, and while some in dustries have been able to retain their staffs at the same old figures which obtained some years ago, these are the exceptions, advances being general most every line of business activity. With increased income have, as a rule come increased wants, and these nearly always exceed the increased needs there are those, however, who are taking advantage of the present unusually prosperous time for the wage earner, to lay up something for the lean year. are sure to follow, and these are the wise ones who by putting a little sel denial into their daily life are laying by something every month, which will come in good stead when through lack of orders, industries will be obliged to lay off a certain number of those now employed, and probably reduce the hours of these they retain the second to the second the second to the second the second to the dictates moderation in all things, and certainly a partial elimination at many of the extravagant habits now indulged by those who prior to the war never knew what it was to have \$25 per week to spend. No matter what the wage may be something should be saved, if only 25 cents

per week. This amounts means \$13 per annum, and every dollar saved adds to the country's wealth.

When the war began some firms saw at once the necessity for more sav-ng on the part of everyone, and especially the wage-earning class, and many out material inducements before their help to stimulate and encourage systemtic saving. Among those who were willing to co-operate with their men along hese lines we might mention a large Minneapolis flour milling company, which at thristmas, 1914, gave every one of its employees a check for \$25, with instrucions to take it to a savings bank and deposit it, the check being valueless other

The object of these gifts was to foster thrift among the employees. order that the saving-habit, once started by the opening of the account, may be kept up, an additional incentive to save part of their earnings has been made to the company's workers. This is embodied in a letter which reads in part

"If you continue in our employ until November 1, 1915, bring your savings bank book to us. We will then give you a check for half the net increase in your bank balance in excess of the original \$25. In other words, if your bank book shows \$45 on deposit November 1, 1915, we will add \$10 to your savings. If your bank book shows \$75 on deposit on November 1, 1915, we will add \$25 to your avings, etc. In no case will the amount paid under the arrangement exceed

One of the remarkable features was that a large number took to the bank in addition to their gift-check savings that never had been deposited. 
