If so, it won't do any harm to recall to mind the recent forest fires with their toll of human life and dollars.

A little precaution on your part may save a repetition of this The regulations of the New York State Forest, Fish and Game Commission, applying to fires, may well be adhered to by campers and sportsmen in every part of the country. The essential part

"The state expends large sums in preserving the forests as a pleasure resort and asks those enjoying its pleasures to contribute

their share by guarding carefully against fire.
"Fires will be permitted for the purpose of cooking, warmth and insect smudges on state land; standing timber shall not be used "Fires must not be started on the leaves; all combustible ma-

terial must be cleared away five feet from the fire. 'A sand beach or dry creek bed is the safest fireplace. "Fires must be thoroughly quenched, not covered up or stamped out.

"The ground beneath should be saturated with water. "Fires must not be started against stumps, trees, or near piles of logs or brush. "Fires other than those mentioned above are absolutely prohib-

"Caution must be exercised against allowing fires to originate

from the use of firearms, pipes and cigars." Just let this sink in. During the dry season it is hard enough to prevent fires arising from other causes than neglect and foolishness. Conflagrations frequently start from natural causes. Only those who have been in the woods when fire is raging can appreclate how serious a fire can grow from a spark in the leaves, or

The camper who is planning a week or two in the woods, may be somewhat inconvenienced, but he may save millions of dollars by insisting that a pail, filled with water, be kept constantly in every tent. It wouldn't be going too far if every camping party added a patent fire extinguisher to the outfit. They don't take up much room and are death on flames.

Montreal reports to Bradstreet's say general trade has had a much quieter tone than was reported last week. The thousands of visitors here for the Euch-aristic Congress have left for home, but the result of their presence is seen in the large number of orders which wholesale houses have from many country results. sale houses have from many country re-tailers who were in. Seasonable fall weather has given a good impetus to the show improvement, and the likelihood for a poor fall and winter as was predicted for some parts of the west seems much more remote than a month ago. A good seasonable business is moving in drygoods, and prices generally seem steady to firm. The threatened lock-out in the English cotton mills is having an un-steadying effect upon the market for prints, etc. The demand for most staple groceries if of normal proportions, although the inquiry for sugar is very light, due, no doubt, to the high prices at which fruit has ruled. A good trade in general hardware is reported. As is natural, city collections are good after the heavy trade of the past week or two, but those from the country are a

little slow.

Brisk at Toronto.

Toronto reports to Bradstreet's say all lines of fall trade are now moving briskly, and indications are that the turnover will be considerably heavier than that of last year. Western shipthan that of last year. Western shipments of general lines are particularly satisfactory. In clothing a particularly good season seems to be assured. By this time Feltman's bakery was supplying such demand as there was at Coney Island for pastry and ice sand, where a few clammers lived, and where the only thing in the way of amusement were the shanty operated by three-card monte men, The only railway, except for a horsecar line, running to the beach, was Gunther's, and it was near the Gunther station that Feltman hired a shanty, paying \$500 for a year's lease, and began to sell clam roasts and

He at once established a record for low prices by selling beer for 5 cents, instead of 10, as had been the custom, and although there wasn't a train running to the beach after dark, he soon attracted trade, and in the first year cleared \$6,000 on his bar receipts

This was a good start, but the man from whom Feltman had rented the shanty raised the rent to \$2,000, and the baker felt that if he were to play the game with that ante he would have to hurry the boom he felt sure was coming. So he tried to win over Mr. Gunther to run evening trains to accommodate businessmen who might want to visit the island after hours. His suggestion that it was possible for a railway to make profits carrying folks to the island was laughed at by

Mr. Gunther, and the superintendent of the Brooklyn and Coney Island Horse-Car Road. Almost everybody told the baker that he'd wake up some day to the realization that Coney Island was off the map, but A. R. Culver, who was planning a new line to the beach, listened to German logic and promised to run late evening trains. With this hope ahead Mr. Feltman paid \$3,800 for a ten years' lease on a small building known as the Washington Hotel, tore down the old structure and built a two-story one, 55x125, with a 25x85

Bridge Swept Away By Flood Just Before Train Was Due.

WRECK ON ROCK ISLAND

Sixteen Perish in Accident Near the Town of Clayton, Kansas.

Clayton, Kan., Sept. 23.-Sixteen known to be dead, probably others killed and their bodies washed away, and eleven injured, is the result of a terrible railroad wreck which occurred on the Rock Island, two miles east of this place at an early hour Friday morning, when a fast train on the Rock Island ran through an open bridge into 20 feet of raging water. Nine of the dead have been identified, while seven are still unknown, Yes others may have been washed away by the torrent.

The stream which wrought the destruction is at ordinary times simply a dry aroya with no water, but with its bed thirty feet below the level of the railroad bridge. Early last night a tremendous rain fell, and the dry bed was soon filled to the brim with a wild torrent. The bridge itself was quickly broken up and carried away.

Shortly after 1 o'clock this morning, while the storm raged, the fast passenger train from Kansas City to Denver, travelling at 40 miles an hour, rushed headlong into the gap and the forward end of the train took the plunge into the water-filled ra-
