

FEELS EUROPE

Press Expresses Opinion That Conference Should Have Led to Recovery.

London Telegraph Thinks Failure Most Disquieting News Since Armistice.

London, Aug. 15 .- Europe was unable to rise to what might have been great opportunity to put her feet on the road to recovery. This is the consensus of the press comment regarding the failure of the London conference, but as to who was responsible for the failure depends on whether one accepts the French or the British viewpoint.

The pro-government editorials express the hope that France will take the council of reason and sobriety and not continue to act against her own best interests, while those of the pposition press, such as the Daily Mail, say the British people will not allow any administration to quarrel with their friend and ally for the benefit and satisfaction of the Ger-

Says the Times: "The initial cause of the Downing street failure was the Balfour note, and that danger-ously, petty and shortsighted spirit which inspired it betrays a startling conception of British dignity."

The Daily Telegraph thinks the failure may prove the most disquieting news since the armistice, but assures the French that the British are as determined to make Germany pay as they are, the difference in views being merely one of the relative expediency of the different methods

DENY REQUEST Mine Officials Believe Walkout Will Be Long One. EFFECTS BEGIN TO SHOW

May Be Forced to Close. Sydney, N. S., Aug. 15. — With practically one hundred per cent of the United Mine Workers membership of Nova Scotia on strike sinca last midnight, involving nearly twelve thousand workers on Cape Breton Island and the mainland, the coal situation in this province has reached an extraordinary crisis. At noon today the miners, firemen, pumpmen, leaders and trimmers of Cape Breton were idle and executive officials had been pressed into service to keep that pumps and safety apparatus working lest the pits become flooded and

choked with poisonous gases. The same conditions prevailed at Springhill and Joggins, with conditions little better in the New Glas-

gow areas.

Mine officials have not so far of fered any ray of hope that the strike will be of short duration, with the exception of the operators of the Fundy mine at Joggins, who, at meetings last night, agreed to restore the 1921 rates of pay. They employ about sixty-five men. Officials of the British Empire Steel Corporation express astonishment at the unexpected action of the men, and declare that they will put forth every effort to

Strike Effects Showing.

Already the effects of the strike are showing. An early cessation of the work in the steel plant at Sydney is foreshadowed and thirteen sail and steam craft are held up in the Sydney harbor, due to the strike of loaders

Although there has never for years been any such thing as absolute tranquility in the Cape Breton coal fields, the present prolonged dispute may be said to date back to last October, when, as required under the Lemieux act, the Company and other operators notified their men that they wanted a revision downward of rates when the agreement then in force expired on Nov. 30, 1921. The Passing of Northcliffe. ORD NORTHCLIFFE is dead. From obscurity to the greatest publisher in the world is a long cry -yet NORTHCLIFFE did it. One may well ask how. In the first place the man had the real gift of the successful newspaperman; he was fearless, honest, a worker, and in his greatsuccesses never too great to get out and write a story himself.

Passing by all his earlier ventures in weekly and religious papers, all of which succeeded, the young publisher took his first plunge in the daily field when he hought the London Evening News, then on the point of failure. He introduced a style of journalism that was new to Britain -in short, it was the American idea of a daily paper. Heads well written, stories crisp and short. Then came his acquisition of the Daily Mail, and during the Boer war the sale of this paper ran up to over a million a day, and now stands at 1,350,-000. In 1906, when it was announced that NORTHCLIFFE had purchased the greatest paper in Britain, the London Times, or "The Thunderer," it was the equivalent of an earthquake to the conservative classes of Britain, for up to that time he had been branded as more or less of a yellow journalist.

One thing outstanding about LORD NORTHCLIFFE was the fact that he was a critic, and a hard one; when it came time to strike, in his opinion, he never believed in delivering two blows where one good one would do. But with all his smashing he was a builder, with all his criticism he was also constructive. It was during the war that he threw the whole strength of his great chain of publications toward making Britain efficient for the carrying on of the war. He attacked with a bitterness that came from a knowledge of facts; he struck out right and left against the policy of "blundering through," which has at times been the boast of certain Englishmen.

Few men possessed a greater firsthand knowledge of world conditions than Northcliffe. To him the world was the field for news. He traveled and studied, always with the idea of making himself conversant with world conditions, and he immediately turned his newly-gained knowledge to the strengthening of his immense string of publications.

He planned his days and his work. He retired early, generally at 9:30. Think over this, some of you midnight people. He was up and at work at 6:30 in the morning, believing that a man is better fitted for work in the early hours of the day. When he made an appointment for 10 o'clock he kept it at 10, and horred aimless chatter, and any conversation to interest him had to be went to sleep.



EXPECT MILLIONS FROM RACING TAX

Raney Predicts Rakeoff On Race Track Gambling Will Net \$4,000,000.

TORONTO, Aug. 14 .-- If Hon. W. E. Raney's estimate of the probable revenue from the 5 per cent race track rake-off is correct, the provincial treasurer's task of finding a surplus for the current year should be somewhat easier than it was last

In a statement issued today in connection with the race-track gambling controversy the attorney-general stated that the total provincial revenue from the tracks for 1922 will be somewhere between three and four millions of dollars.

After pointing out that cent rake-off on the amount wagered is in addition to the tax of \$7.500 per day on each track, the attorney general continues:

"The amount wagered last year was upwards of \$56,000,000, and the amount that will come from this taxation (the per diem tax) this year will, it is estimated, amount to upwards of \$2,500,000, so that the total revenue which will be derived by the province of Ontario from race track tax for 1922 will be somewhere between \$3,000,000 and \$4,000,000.
