

The most important foreign news today is the official announcement that an arbitration treaty between Great Britain and Germany has been signed. The terms are identical with those of the Anglo-French, Anglo-Italian and Anglo-Spanish conventions. They provide for the arbitration of differences of a legal nature, or relating to the interpretation of treaties. The treaty is a surprise to the press and public. as they were not aware that negotlations were on foot. The formal ratifications appear to have been timed for dramatic effect. The King and the Emperor have been fraternizing at the Kiel yacht races, and the world will insist on seeing the King's hand in the achievement. Considering the ingrained prejudice which stands between the British and German peoples, which council. The chief of staff (who is ve their rulers do not share, it is not surprising that the English press comment is far from cordial. The London Spectator solemnly warned the King before his visit to Kiel that the Emperor would try to entrap him into ter-general and master of ordnance treaty or pledge, which would be found to be entirely in Germany's interest. Since the conclusion of the Anglo-French convention Germany has been taunted with her isolation, and British critics have taken relish in describing her as occupying the lonely and friendless position held by Great Britain at the time of the Boer war.

The Kaiser in late years has shown an eagerness to ingratiate himself with the British people, and work in harmony with the British Foreign Office. In this he has been seconded by the pacific desires of the King, who has rightly earned the title of "The Peacemaker." The unexpected visit of the powerful German squadron now in Portsmouth harbor is undoubtedly the Emperor's spectacular method of signalizing the new treaty. It may be unpalatable to the jingoes and music hall patriots, but every enlightened person should welcome it as another step toward the goal of universal and abiding peace. Five nations of Europe are now wrapped in a network of these arbitration treaties. When the present war is ended, it is probable that Great Britain and Russia will try to effect a similar arrangement. If the American Republic is truly dedicated to peace, it cannot long stand outside the pale

The third army, under General Nodzu, moving 80 miles from Taku Shan, of Hai Cheng by forcing Fen Shui Ling permit correspondents to leave Tokio, crowned the eminences to the eastward on June 27. Henceforth the operations of the Russian cavalry assume new interest.

Gen. Kuropatkin's strategy at Kai Chow is much discussed in military circles in Japan, where his original intention was interpreted as a Napoleonic programme to crush the three Japenese armies in detail, first striking General Oku's corps, then turning on the Taku Shan force, and afterwards finding himself on General Kuroki's left flank. The Russian commander's act'on at Kai Chow was, however, wholly devoid of offensive When the main armies engaged, Gen. in everything at every point, their initiative, especially on the last day. Kuropatkin seems to have aimed chiefly at securing his army's retreat, inasmuch as, having abandoned the heights east of the railway with little completely stupified by the movement


