His Answers to Members of **Lunacy Commission Were** Rational

#### UNDER FIRE TWO HOURS

Mew York, March 30.—Harry K.

Thaw's counsel are so sanguine of the outcome of the lunacy enquiry that yesterday they were making plans for the resumption of the trial next week. It seems now that, if the trial is resumed, the defence will probably announce that it rests without further testimony.



#### MEN SWEPT **OVERBOARD**

C. P. R. Liner Manitoba Arrives At St. John In Safety

DAYS OVERDUE

St. John, N. B., March 30.—After a terrible experience in one of the worst storms of the winter, the C. P. B. liner Manitoba reached port Thursday foremoon from Liverpool nearly five days overdue. The Manitoba salled from Liverpool on March 13, having on board 1,343 passengers, which included 59 saloon, 138 second cabin and 1,146 steerage. On the fourth day out from Liverpool the storm, the worst ever experienced by Capt. Evans, was encountered. A fierce gale lashed the seas in fury, the passengers were deathly sick, and all on board put in a most miserable week. Seas continually broke over the steamer, and at times she was practically helpless. The Manitoba ran into a veritable field of icebergs and passed continually broke over the steamer, and at times she was practically helpless. The weather cleared on Saturday last, and although Sunday was rather rough, no furthes hardships, were experienced on the run to St. John.

On March 15, the third day out, one of the crew was lost overboard, talling from the bridge deck while engaged in cleaning. He was Richard Davies, a native of England. A repetition occurred on Wednesday night about 11.30 o'clock, while the Manitoba was off Briar Island. One of the sailors, named Crabtree, an Englishman, missed firs footing and was never seen afterwards. A boat was quickly manned and beat about the vicinity for two holds, but without results. Of the total passenger list only 75 are for the United States.



The French mission, now at Oudja, under Capt. Mangin, has been accalled.

Proper and Inevitable.

Berlin, March 28.—The occupation of Oudja, Morocco, by French troops is regarded at the Foreign Office here as being a proper and inevitable step, if it be confined simply to punitive measures for the murder of a French citizen, and is without ulterior objects. It is assumed here officially that France will fully observe her arrangements entered in at Algeciras. The German attitude is one of alert observation. Any modification of that attitude will depend on the development of the French plans.

Sultan Expected to Yield.

Paris, March 28.—The Sultan of Morocco is expected to yield promptly to all the claims formulated by the commander of the French armored erruiser Jeanne D'Arc, now at Tangier, as soon as he is convinced that the French attitude is inflexible and that France has the unanimous support of the powers.

Bucharest, Roumania, March 28.—
The measures proposed by the Government to meet the demands of the revolted peasantry, and end the civil war, which is devastating Moldava and Wallachi, were announced in meeting in the shape of a proclamation issued in the name of King Charles. The royal proclamation appeals for the patriotic co-operation of the people to secure the re-establishment of arranguility, and announces that the Sovereign has agreed to the immediate suppression of some of the heavy suppression of some of the heavy taxes, while hereafter the farm lands will be cultivated by the State, or leased direct to the peasants. Not one of the larger syndicates hitherto engaged in farming vast tracts of land will be allowed to hold more than



FARMING FOR PRISONERS. Use of the Jail For the Insane

The 39th annual report of the in-spector of prisons and reformatories was presented to the Legislature last week, the annual statistics of which was presented to the Legislature last week, the annual statistics of which showed 44 jails and 13 lock-ups in the province with a total expenditure of jail maintenance of \$158,174 for 1906, against \$163,268 in 1905. The cash revenue of the jails was earned at Perth, Whitby and Woodstock, amounting to \$115, with an average cost for each prisoner of 22 cents per day in every county jail in Ontario, against 25 cents in 1905. In 1906 there were 10,810 committed to jails, a decrease of 225. Notwithstanding this decrease the fact remains, Inspector Rogers points out, that with a population of a little over 2,000,000 there were nearly 11,000 persons during the past year committed to the jails of the province. The number of insane committed during 1908 were 309, against 396 in 1905.

Of those committed during the year, 3,837 were married and 6,973 single. There were but 25 per cent. who could be labelled temperate, against 26 per cent, the previous year. #### FROM THE EMPTY TOMB

COME VOICES OF WARNING, JOY AND TRIUMPH.

EASTER MEDITATION FOR ALL

Calvary's Three Crosses-Some Pictures of the Resurrection-Incident At Funeral of D. L. Moody-The Triumphs of Easter-Sin Shall Not Always Have Power-Christ Has Conquered Sin and Death.

Los Angeles, Cal., March 24.—Appropriate to the Easter season is this sermon, in which from the empty crosses and from the empty tomb the preacher hears voices of warning, joy and triumph. The text is Mark xv, 27. "And with him they crucify two thieves, the one on his right hand and the other on his left."

In my lifetime I have seen many pictures symbolic of the first Easter morn. Some of them have depicted Jesus in the garden walking among the lilies talking with Mary. Some of them have pictured Christ stepping out of the tomb amid the prostrate forms of the Roman soldiers. Some of them have pictured Peter and John looking into the empty crypt, where was nothing but the shroud of the risen Lord. But of all Easter pictures the one which impressed me the most was that which used to hang upon the walls of my boyhood home. In the foreground of the picture was a broad winged angel flying. He was a divine messenger bringing to earth the glad tidings of the resurrected broad winged angel flying. He was a divine messenger bringing to earth the glad tidings of the resurrected Christ. To the right of the picture was the rising sun rimming the eastern hills. And as this sun was crawling over the eastern hills it cast its light upon six pieces of wood which had been formed into three crosses. There stood these three crosses emptied of their human burdens. The horrors of the crucifixion were over. The corpses of the two thieves and of the dead Christ had been quietly laid away in their graves. The decrees of the Roman law had been carried out. No Jesus was there. No repentant dying this

the day that Jesus was resurrected. Let us think of that Easter morn and those significant crosses.

Let us, in the first place, turn our attention to the central cross, upon which Jesus died. Why was this cross left standing amid the glories and the triumphs of Easter day? Why was it allowed to stand there to cast its dark shadow over the beautiful form of a risen Christ? I think God left it standing there for a purpose. He is coming to you and me to-day to say: "Oh, child, amid the songs of rejoicing which you are singing at this Easter season, amid the beautiful flowers with which you are decorating your sacred festal day, you must not forget the price Jesus Christ paid for your redemption? #### EXPERT METHODS.

Plan For Testing the Quality of Seed

Professor Holden, the western corn expert, has been making the rounds of the New England farm and New York state meetings, as reported in American Cultivator. Besides describing his method of selecting seed corn, the professor advances other ideas with regard to New England farm methods. He advocates growing the cattle feeds on the farm and insists that eastern farmers will grow more dent corn and that alfalfa will soon be considerably grown here if farmers will thoroughly drain the soil to a sufficient depth to make the soil sweet, thoroughly pulverize it and make a firm, solid seed bed, sowing the seed early in August.

Professor Holden told of his own work among the farmers of the west by taking them right into their fields and by personal inspection showing them how they were farming at a sacrifice, in that their fields were producing but a fractional part of what they might be producing if every hill were filled and every stalk were productive. He showed the difference in the acreage with one, two and three goods ears to a hill and thereby led up to the conclusion that the great source of loss in corn production is the poor seed which so many farmers use, either through carelessness or false economy.

#### SCHISM IN INDIA.

English Church Converts Split In Two Camps.

Two Camps.

A Rangoon correspondent describes a curious schism that has taken place among the English Church converts in the Karen Hills. Some time ago the Rev. Thomas Pellako, of the Anglican Church inaugurated what is now called Kleeboism. Briefly put, he substituted the word Kleebo for Christ. In Paku dialect "Klee" means "bow," and "bo" means "dear," and the word Kleebo as applied to Christ probably refers to the rainbow as a type and outward visible sign of Jesus Christ. The idea was in itself harmless enough and at the same time not unpicturesque, and for this reason, no doubt, appealed to the imagination of this semi-civilized people, but the importance attached to it by the people was certainly unorthodox; and the Rev. Thomas Pellako was suspended by the bishop. The result has astonished the missionaries themselves. Practically every man, woman and child of the district has joined what some people termed the new religion, and Karens from other districts are following in their footsteps. Even in the villages of Bowmuder, which are under the Rev. Aquat of the Anglican Church, eighteen out of twenty-five households flave adopted Kleeboism. Indeed, recently. Kleeboists held a festival in the village, within an enclosure constructed for the accommodation of 1,000 people, and situated within a few feet of the Anglican Church itself. The Bishop of Rangoon has proceeded to the scene of the conflict.
