Decrease In Labor Unrest

[By Special Wire to The Courier] OTTAWA, May 18 .- According to the record maintained in the Department of Labor, a feature of the labor situation during April was the marked decrease in the number of strikes and lockouts, as compared with the corresponding month of last year. During April, 1913, 25 disputes commenced, which, together with the eight previously in existence, affected 8,430 employees and caused time losses of 112,446 working days. The record for April, 1914, shows only ten disputes in existence (four new ones), affecting 1,297 employees and causing time losses of about 25,000 working days. Industrial conditions were not seriously affected by trade disputes in any particular locality, the strike of coal miners on Vancouver Island being the only disturbance affecting a considerable number of workingmen. Five disputes remained unsettled at the end of April.
