

WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader import a quarter-

good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Pric \$3.00 per acre. Duties-Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Premption patent may be obtained as soon as bomestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per icre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reluction in case of rough, scrubby or stony and. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

The violation of Belgium was watched without protest, although Roosevelt, when President, had, on behalf of the nation, affixed his signature to the document which should have guaranteed that land from attack-a violation which, in the case of John Bull, another of the signatories, brought him into the ring with a rush with his coat off. Since then there have been other open floutings of the stars and stripes, ending with the piratical sinking of the Lusitania and the loss of many innocent American lives. Wilson's first note to Berlin was met with a totally inadequate reply, and now another one has been prepared, which may possibly lead our neighbors to openly join the Allies. The tone of the U. S. press shows very clearly that, with a sudden jolt, they have been brought to a realization of the fact that instead of spectators of the most Titanic struggle the world has ever witnessed, they may become actual participants.





NEGOTIATIONS ARE NOW OFF

Rome, June 10.-Germany has broken off negotiations for the exchange of wounded prisoners who are unfit for further military service, with all the belligerent countries. The exchange was first only applied in regard to British prisoners. Various pretexts for this action have been placed before the Vatican, such as possible use on semi-military duties of prisoners still having one arm. These have made the worst impression at the Vatican.

Only a Fraction of it is Left in German Hands.

London, June 10- Careful reading between the lines of the various official announcements of the last twelve hours leads British observers of the situation on the continent to the belief that the wearied Russians have been successful in gaining a breathing space, along the eastern front. Furthermore evidence of the tro-Germans are said to be meeting near the center of the line in Galicia is declared here to exist in the statement from Petrograd that 2,000 Austro-German prisoners have been tak-en in a series of counter-attacks near

Przemysl. According to Russian reports the Austro-German offensive in Southeast Galicia has not been able to cross the

River Dniester at any point other than Zurawna, which is forty miles from Lemberg, and which they reached last Sunday. Berlin contradicts this with the statement that the right wing of the army under General Von Linsingen has advanced to 10 miles further and occupied Stanislau, an important railroad center.
