Baron Von Hussarck, Austrian Premier in presenting his Cabinet to the Upper House of the Austrian Parliament according to Vienna advices. He added according to the despatch, that so far as the Central Powers are concerned the way is a defensive one.

"So long as our opponents take the standpoint of one-sided dictation," he continued, "there is nothing for us to do but to continue the war and carry it on to vigorously that it will be shortened.

"In war, so in peace, Austria will not be alone," he added. "Our alliance with Germany is a real affair of the heart and will deepen under the influence of peace. There is nothing menacing in this alliance, the warlike contents of which were forced upon the Central Powers by their opponents and will cease as soon as they extend the hand of peace."

Washington, July 24th. - Nearly 300,000,000 bushels of wheat are stored in Great Britain, the food administration was informed today. Details of the guarantees surrounding 1918-1919 wheat harvest in Australia also were transmitted. The Australian government has a guaranteed eighty-three cents per bushel, and to this the commonwealth has added twelve cents, making the price ninety-five cents to the producer.

In Buenos Aires the cash price for wheat is \$1.44 per bushel. Cash corn is selling there for sixty-two cents per bushel.

Calgary, July 23. - Rain fell during the night and morning and it snowed this afternoon.

Edmonton, July 23rd. - Northern Alberta has come dangerously near the freezing point in the last twenty four hours, but according to the evidence at hand has escaped. The lowest temperature reported today was at Lamont where the mercury dropped to 32 with a northwest wind.

The growing grain is now at a stage, it is said, when frosts would do damage.

Two Cars Crash at D. A. R. Crossing

Several Officials Badly Injured Near Bridgetown—Electric Storm Felt in Nova Scotia.

Bridgetown, N. S. July 24th.—A serious accident occurred at the Bridgetown crossing a train length east of the railway station about 11:30 this morning. A Dominion Atlantic Railway car containing the following railway officials, M. K. McQuarrie, chief engineer of the road; D. A. McDonald, travelling auditor; D. J. Murphy, general roadmaster, all of the D. A. R., and H. R. Mathewson, travelling passenger agent of the C. P. R., was running west as a special and blowing the whistle as usual at the crossings when an automobile owned and driven by Mrs. R. L. Lessell, was crossing north of the street. Mrs. Lessell evidently did not expect a special on the D. A. R., and her car was struck between the two seats, completely wrecking it and damaging that of the D. A. R. All the occupants were thrown out. Mr. Murphy is badly cut about the head and otherwise injured. It is thought he will recover. Mr. McQuarrie, the driver, is bruised and injured inwardly. Mr. Mathewson is also considerably bruised. Mr. McDonald was able to proceed on the west-bound express, while the others were being cared for at the St. James Hotel, medical aid being immediately summoned. Mrs. Lessell is somewhat bruised, but it is thought not seriously injured.
