Information Wanted. ERICOR ACADIAN.—Can you inform me, through the columns of the ACADIAN, the purport of the bill recently introduced in the Local Parliament to amend the Wolfville Water Supply Act? Whether the bill gives the commissioners power to extend the pipes outside the limits of the district for the purpose of supplying water to individuals or to protect property against fire not taxable in the district? I notice that pipes have been laid across the W. & A. R. and north of the northern boundary of the district as described in the original Act; and would ask by what authority they have been so laid. Most assuredly the commissioners have no such authority under the original Act, and unless some new legislation has given them such authority they are, to say the least, acting very injudiciously and setting a bad precedent for the future; for if they can go out of the limits in one direction they can in another, and if they can go outside one rod they can go one mile or ten miles as their inclination may lead them or the funds at their disposal enable them to.
