Fruit Growers' Parliament.

College Hall was crowded on Wednesday evening last, when the N. S. F. G. A. held the first session of their thirty-second annual meeting.

Next on the programme was a paper, "Notes of the Year," by W. C. Archibald. The first point touched upon was season. The unfavorable influence of drouth were easily overcome by soil culture.

The important and live subject of Cold Storage was then taken up, the ball being set rolling by Wm. Rand, of Canzing, in a most admirably written paper entitled "Cold Storage and Trade."

Prof. Craig, of Ottawa, then addressed the meeting, devoting his remarks chiefly to the technical side of the question. He gave the principles underlying cold storage, and much valuable information was elicited from his remarks.

Mr Geo. E. Boak, of Halifax, who in company with Major Clarke is interested in a project for building a cold storage depot in Halifax, was then announced. Mr Boak is a pleasing speaker and presented the commercial side of the question in a forcible and business like manner.

Mr Hogill, representing the Farnes S. S. Hse was present at invitation and addressed the meeting. He stated that they were ready to do their part if cold storage was obtained.

The exhibit of fruit, though not large, was very fine, and was the subject of many complimentary remarks. W. C. Archibald had an artistically arranged display of canned goods.

Acadia Dairy Co., Ltd.

HOLDS ITS ANNUAL MEETING.

It is with pleasure we chronicle the proceedings of the second annual meeting of one of the few local enterprises of our farmers, viz., the Acadia Dairy Co., Ltd., which was held in Witter's Hall, last Saturday, 18th inst.

After the minutes were read, the directors' report was presented and which will probably appear later, it being very encouraging and instructive, and, we might add, not too long.

A new departure of the retiring directors was to have a full statement of the milk account printed with the names of the patrons and the amount of milk supplied by each one, together with the butter fat credited each individual during the whole year.

Mr. J. E. Starr, of Cornwallis, had the largest output, 57,677 lbs of milk, yielding 2565 1/2 lbs of butter fat, for which he received in cash from factory four hundred and sixteen dollars and fifty cents, which, we understand was produced from twelve cows, mostly grade Jerseys, and as the gentleman said at the meeting, "the patrons must not only look at the dollars and cents the cows brought them in, but must take into consideration the valuable fertilizer that if properly cared for by the use of absorbents was worth more by keeping up the farm and producing abundance of apples and potatoes."

Major Clarke, of Halifax, the cold storage specialist, was the next speaker. Cold storage is what must bring together the consumer and producer. There can be no doubt as to the advantages that must accrue to this province if the system of cold storage is adopted.

Mr. Logan, the general manager, spoke on the care of the milk by patrons, strongly insisting on them the necessity of having the milk properly cared for, especially in the hot weather, in order to insure success.

Local and Provincial.

The town report has been printed in a neat pamphlet and is being distributed among the rate payers this week.

Mr. W. J. Cox, of Kings College, Windsor, conducted the services in St. John's church, of this town, very acceptably on Sunday last.

The Wolfville Curling Club have had a few practice games this week. A number have joined lately, and when their outdoor rink is completed, this Club will probably be the banner one of the province.

About 3 o'clock last Friday morning an alarm of fire was given and the firemen quickly responding found that the fire had broken out in the residence of Dr. DeWitt. In a short time it was extinguished and with little damage.

Governor Daly and a number of representatives of the House of Assembly were in town Thursday, attending a meeting of the N. S. F. G. A. In the morning the Governor addressed the students of the School of Horticulture.

The ship Timorinde, of which Mr. Joseph Jones of this town, is first officer, recently made a phenomenally quick passage from Buenos Ayres to Newcastle, Australia. The distance of 9,000 miles from anchorage to anchorage, was covered in 45 days - an average of 240 miles per day. The best day's sail was 322 miles.
