

PROTECTION IN ENGLAND

(Mail.)

Many English journals, in consequence of the new French tariff, admit that the time i drawing nigh when the Imperia Government will have to deal with the question of foreign bounties. Mr. Hughvirley, the Conservative member for Man. chester, observing the perils the British manufacturer is being forced into by reason of the adoption elsewhere of protective duties, intends to move in the Commons for a committee to in quire into the influence o foreign tariffs on the trade and commerce of the United King. dom: and it is not at all impro bable that free-traders will favo the policy which some have already propounded, of "correct ing the ideas of foreigners by weighting their products with imports sufficient to countervail illegitimate advantages secured under protective tariffs and bounties." This, of course, though a high-sounding sentence, simply means retaliation. There is a difficulty in the way of offering France concessions which will induce the Government of that country te reduce its tariff. It is this: The new French tariff imposes specific duties calculated to give the French manufacturer a protection of twenty-five per cent. against English goods. If England was in a position to make concessions to France, France might in return make concessions to England. But England has no concessions to make in order to purchase the compliance of France to the principles of free trade. Great Britain has given already every tariff advantage she can give to Frence, and in asking for a reduction of the French tariff, she is suing France, as ar English journal points out, in forma pauperis.

IRI MI P.UMORS.

A despatch of the 26th inst. says that "There is a wellgrounded rumor to-night that Mr. Forster, who had come to Ireland in a very bad temper, has determine to suppress, for a time at least, all land meetings in Ireland. Five meetings of first-class importance are announced for Sunday, and the attitude of the authorities is watched with some anxiety. Although protected by six hundred troops and police, a processserver at Gangoslin, county Leitrim, was foiled in the attempt to serve processes on some of Lord Annesley's tenants by the threatening attitude of the people. All is quiet in county Limerick. The authorities have not yet intimated when they will renew the attempt to carry out evictions at New Pallas and Killmarlock.
