

Senator E. D. Smith Says He Fears Hydro Radial Projects Are Likely to Result in Frightful Loss

Well Known Fruit Man Calls on Government to Save Municipalities From Going Into Wild Hydro Schemes

He Urges Electrification of Government Railways Where Competing and Refers to Duplication—Saving of Coal By Electricity and General Advantages.

OTTAWA, April 16—When urged by the Senate yesterday afternoon that the Government should electrify such portions of the Grand Trunk and other railways, to be in the Canadian National System, as municipal authorities now propose to parallel with Hydro Electric lines, Senator E. D. Smith claimed that only in this way could the municipalities be induced to abandon radical projects which he believed were bound to result in "frightful losses."

Electricity for steam as a motive power upon the lines of railways as soon as and wherever economically possible. Dealing with the matter first from the standpoint of national economy, Senator Smith said that there was an adverse balance of trade against Canada and in favor of the United States, a considerable portion of which was accounted for by the fact that the Canadian railways last year used 10,000,000 tons of coal bought in the United States, at a cost of \$ a ton at the border. The Canadian railways in a year used 250,000 tons of coal a mile, and as there were roughly, 40,000 miles of railway in Canada, the coal bill was \$1,000 a mile, or \$40,000,000.

Senator E. D. Smith claimed that only in this way could the municipalities be induced to abandon radical projects which he believed were bound to result in "frightful losses." It would cost \$40,000 a mile to electrify sections of the Grand Trunk Railway in Ontario which would save an interest charge of \$2,000 a mile per year, but it was better to face that than to face the loss of \$40,000 a mile.

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Lawn Tennis to Be Given Big Boost in City; Big Club Is Now Under Formation

Efforts are being made to boom lawn tennis in St. Catharines. In connection with the forward movement for all kinds of healthy sport in St. Catharines, plans are being made to form a city tennis club organization which will have a large membership and include all who wish to indulge in this attractive outdoor pastime.

A. W. Marquis was present and made a wide open offer on behalf of the Golf Club to take over the proposed tennis club and offer any persons who wished to play tennis all the desired privileges. He said tennis and golf could be carried on together satisfactorily. A committee was named to confer with a committee of the Golf Club on the subject, but the spirit of the meeting was in favor of a separate organization. It was considered that the general public looked on the Golf Club as a rather exclusive concern and the prospects of getting a large tennis following that way would not be very bright. In any case only a limited number would be taken in to play tennis.

Weather Variations All in Twelve Hours

Today's sunshine followed a perfect riot of weather variations ranging from real April showers to a healthy winter now fall and freezing. This all came within twelve hours yesterday. In the afternoon came a warm April rainfall just such as was needed for growing things. But the necessary soon dropped and after the dark the warm rainfall had given place to cold spattering moisture that kept folks in doors who did not require absolutely to be out.

Later on the cold rain was succeeded by snow and when people looked out of their windows this morning their eyes met the not uncommon sight of a snow-covered ground. The bright sun this morning quickly dispelled the beautiful. The question now is whether the weather man really means business. Some fear not. Men point to the fact that the new moon is not till Sunday and therefore no real Spring weather can be expected until then at least.

County Council Gives Port Permission to Lay Main On Ontario Street to City

The County Council is back in special session to deal with the good roads question. They are meeting again today. Yesterday afternoon the council passed a resolution to the effect that if the Village of Port Dalhousie passes its waterworks by-law permission would be granted to lay

a twelve inch main along Ontario street, to connect with the St. Catharines waterworks. The Chippawa Gas Company was also given permission to lay gas mains on the streets of Smithville. The council then adjourned to take up the good roads question in committee and to meet again this morning.

Six Months' Sentence is Given To A. D. Moore, Who Got Away With Brewery Funds

Six months imprisonment was the sentence yesterday afternoon given by Magistrate Campbell to A. D. Moore, local agent of the Labatt Brewery of London who stole funds of the Company to the total of at least \$1290.

Crown Attorney Brennan cross-examined him closely and showed him invoices all which showed he had written "paid" on the copy given to the customer, and "charged" on the copy sent into the company. Moore confessed the problem was too deep for him, he could not explain it at all. The writing seemed to be his all right he said. The magistrate found him guilty and imposed the six months indeterminate sentence the limit being two years.

POLICE COURT

Christine Harkinson was charged in police court with failure to support her wife and children. The wife said her husband had moved to Hamilton and when she went there he refused to support her, so she came to St. Catharines. She had been confined at the hospital here at public expense, her husband having refused to pay her a cent. Yet he had been making \$7 a day and had bought a motor car for \$400. He had visited her at the hospital but had not offered her any money.

Holiday For Mid-Summer

Largely Attended Meeting of Merchants and Clerks Decide to Close Stores Wednesday Afternoon for June, July, August and September.

On a request of the merchants, a meeting was held last night in the Standard Hall, under the auspices of the Chamber of Commerce. The purpose of the meeting was to get together, merchants in all lines of business to decide upon a uniform week-half-holiday to be observed by all merchants during a mutually agreed period.

Mr. J. M. Elson was chairman. The opinion was practically unanimous, that Wednesday afternoon was the logical time for stores to close, and main point to be settled was during what months the half-holiday should become effective. The grocers had been closing on Wednesday afternoon all year round and in some other lines of business the half-holiday had been observed regularly for three months in the summer and in some lines four. Many of those present favored the suggestion of closing during the month of May as well. An expression of opinion from the merchants was finally asked for, and a motion by Mr. R. H. Biggs, seconded by M. Levee, that all the merchants agree to close on Wednesday afternoon during the four months, June, July, August, and September, was carried.

Mr. A. Robinson made a motion, seconded by Mr. R. H. Biggs that the merchants represented, having agreed to close their stores on Wednesday afternoon during the four months should agree to acquaint the public of this agreement and widely advertise the fact that their places of business will be closed on Wednesday afternoon during these four months.

Mr. A. W. Watts, Mr. Macdonald, Mr. Bate, Major Bradley, Jos. Hodgins and others spoke during the evening. Mr. Hodgins contended that the stores might as well close for May also.

The Daylight Saving

The question of the application to Daylight Saving of time, to the ten o'clock closing rule for Saturday nights was raised and a motion by Mr. E. W. Smith, seconded by Mr. L. Hattey, that the merchants close at ten o'clock daylight-saving time on Saturday nights was carried. The question was raised as to whether the intention was to close on Wednesday afternoons of a week in which a Government holiday occurred, regardless of the holiday, and a motion by Mr. A. M. Stofie, seconded by Mr. A. Vine that the merchants close on Wednesday afternoon during the months of June, July, August and September whether a government holiday occurred or not, was carried. Another point of discussion arose as to whether the hour of closing should be twelve or one o'clock, and by a motion presented by Mr. John Madill, seconded by Mr. Hattey, it was decided that the hour of closing should be twelve noon.

The meeting was a very short and business-like one as might have been expected from a gathering of business men. The matter of a weekly half-holiday is one which has come up every year and has always been one which has been a subject for considerable debate. The meeting last night disposed of the matter in a very satisfactory manner and without any undue waste of time or effort, and since a decision was arrived at, by a very large and representative meeting of the merchants, it should be carried out unanimously by all.

Records of the Six Years Indicate That Hydro Has Been a Splendid Success in St. Catharines—Property For Large Sub-Station Has Been Purchased to Hold Till Required.

It has occurred to the St. Catharines Public Utilities Commission that the citizens of St. Catharines who are the owners of the local Hydro System, might appreciate a simple statement of the financial condition of the system aside from the full statement made at the end of the year, and published in the local press. In this connection it might be well to explain that the supply of power by the Hydro Electric Power Commission of Ontario to St. Catharines is made under a standard Hydro contract with slight modifications to cover the special local conditions. Power for St. Catharines is purchased by the Hydro Electric Power Commission from the Ontario Power Co. at Merrittton sub-station of the Ontario Power Company, being transmitted to Merrittton on the power lines of the Ontario Power Co., and is in turn billed to the St. Catharines Commission by the Hydro Electric Power Commission at cost. The Hydro Electric Power Commission have \$7,500,000 invested in the transmission lines from Merrittton to St. Catharines and on this investment the local Commission has paid interest and 30-year sinking fund charges from the date the lines were taken over by the Hydro Electric Power Commission, April 1, 1914.

ty of \$1,500.00 in this transmission line, all paid up. The Hydro Electric Power Commission had made no other expenditures for the supply to St. Catharines. The operating report for the year 1918, the best year for the local system covering the supply of power to the munition factories, shows earnings of \$145,842.12 with expenses covering all interest and debt payments of \$111,576.31, leaving a gross surplus of \$34,265.81. Of this gross, \$10,237.00 was charged to depreciation, and the remainder \$24,028.81 was credited to the surplus account. In plain words the system had a gross surplus of 14% per cent of the debt issue after paying \$16,048.20, annual interest and principal payments. The 1919 Operating Report covering the period after the munition plants were suspended shows a reduction in earnings of \$87,855.20, and the gross surplus was reduced from \$34,265.81 to \$18,729.91. This was charged \$10,989.00 to depreciation and \$77,774.91 to surplus account. The gross surplus for this year amounted to 8 per cent of the debt issue. The balance sheet for 1919 shows a total debt issue of \$23,022,83. We have paid \$9,481.94 of aheadebentures, and have paid to the City St. Catharines therefore has an equi-

Atrocities Cause Reds of Ruhr to Get Ready to Fight Until Death

Reichswehr Brutalities Worse Than Those of Germans in Belgium—Workers May Have 35,000 Men Under Arms Soon—Terrible Murders Continue—Many Women Are Violated.

DUSSELDORF, April 16—The digging of trenches near Catingen and Kaiserswert has been prevented by the militia. About 6,000 reds have collected in the region of Schquin, Barmen, Elberfeld and Remscheid, resolved to offer extreme resistance. If the Reichswehr advance, the number of reds will increase to 16,000. If the retiring troops from the Barmen district will join the red army, the number may reach 435,000. The report persists that Russia officers in uniform are partaking in the red mobilization. Belgians have not moved across the bridge but the reichswehr continues to extend its field. The minister of the interior's amnesty proclamation has resulted in thousands of workmen returning to Essen where immediately a majority were arrested, beaten and kicked, several were shot without trial by the Reichswehr. Headquarters of the Worker's Central Council now is in Barmen. Ludwig, Ernst, Duwell, Stern and Eckhardt, communist leaders declared, the reichswehr must quit the industrial zone. They said the one defeat had not killed the workmen movement, but had only encouraged them to try again and that they were more than ever against militarism and the monarchistic reichswehr. Asked for an opinion of the French occupation they replied: "Germany soon will realize it was

the government's breach of faith with us that brought this about." Michael Pints swears his wife, Mary, a Red Cross nurse, was shot at Pulkum after she and two others were maltreated. The Haltern 65 canal workers were fired on with machine guns. They fled into barges, whereupon the reichswehr hurled hand grenades on the barges killing all the fugitives. Her man Schopper of Borbeck testifies a man named Wiesman, fearing atrocities, fled; the reichswehr troops shot him in the leg. A lieutenant kicked the wounded man and shot him through the head. In Recklinghausen the citizens sent a committee of six to negotiate a truce. The committee was attacked, ran into some bushes, and were shot. Near Dinslaken Carl Schoen, his wife and son and son-in-law were murdered. None was a red. A woman who had peeled potatoes for the red army was executed. The reichswehr killed eight workmen from the Wolfsbank coal mine. In Sterkrade, nearby, Wilhelm Gullikes, a Red Cross nurse, was arrested, beaten, violated by 12 reichswehr, stripped and left for dead. She recovered. A sailor was executed because he carried a union card. In addition there are hundreds of cases of murders and injurious assaults reported about which there are no unusual circumstances.

**SUMMER HALF HOLIDAY**

In meeting last night to discuss the question of closing all stores for a mid-week half holiday during summer months, the merchants present showed a disposition to recognize not only a tendency of the time but the interests of their clerks and others who are employed by them. The decision reached to shut up shop at noon on the Wednesdays of June, July and August and September, is a step in the right direction.

Whether we like it or not the time is coming when a mid-week half holiday will be demanded by the masses. In fact The Journal predicts that it will become a statutory obligation within a very few years as a result of legislation.

When stores remain open Saturday nights to accommodate the public it imposes long hours on merchants and clerks. Factories close at noon on Saturdays and all engaged in those places have a half holiday but firekeepers and their employees have no time off during the week unless they take time such as Wednesday afternoons.

Where it is at all possible, without interfering seriously with trade the Journal believes also that May should be included. With the cost of fruit and vegetables so high there is a practical and sound reason why people might want to have a half holiday in that month to prepare and plant gardens. There could be this coming spring enough gardens put out by citizens to produce hundreds of dollars worth of vegetables of all kinds. The production would help, in relation to the value, to reduce the high cost of living.

This is a busy, in fact a rather strenuous business age, when a good deal is taken out of men. A mid-week half holiday in the summer months, if it is generally observed, can an opportunity for outdoor pleasure and exercise to relieve mind and body. In getting the meeting called so that some unanimity could be reached the Chamber of Commerce carried out that kind of work for which it was organized.

**PROTECTING HUMAN LIVES**

The Ontario Safety League continues to place a large amount of literature in the hands of motorists, school children, industrial workers, and others throughout the Province. In the first three months of 1924 the League has distributed an enormous amount of safety material, including 25,000 industrial safety bulletins; 32,400 school safety bulletins; 8,500 special bulletins; 8,500 traffic bulletins; 2,700 electric railway bulletins; 150,000 motorists' safety book-marks; 10,200 health bulletins; 6,500 news letters; 9,000 safety calendars; 12,000 leaflets to the "new men"; 125,000 gummed seals; 3,000 safety cards and posters.

The League will hold an annual meeting in Toronto, beginning Tuesday, April 13th at the King Edward Hotel.

**Courtneys Left \$45,000 Estate; No Wills Found**

Death-Upsets Plans of Brothers Who Died Within Few Hours of Each Other at Falls.

NIAGARA FALLS, N.Y., April 15.—According to papers filed to-day with Charles Hickey, surrogate judge, at the court house here, John and James Courtney the brothers who died within a few hours of each other two weeks ago, left an estate valued at \$45,000. For years the brothers lived frugally in a little frame building behind an imposing brick block owned by them at No. 318 Niagara street.

Application was made to the surrogate today by A. W. Woods, of Ferry avenue for letters of administration. He was the closest friend of the two men and his application was made at the request of surviving relatives. A search of the brothers' effects failed to disclose any will although a reciprocal deed executed by them several years ago was found in which they transferred all their respective holdings to one another. This action was taken by them instead of making wills. Each believed the other would outlive him, but their deaths within a few hours of each other upset their plans.

George M. Tuttle, attorney retained by the heirs, said today that the heirs consisted of a half-brother, Stephen Courtney, and six nephews and nieces all of Toronto, Ont. The six nephews and nieces are the children of Edward Courtney, a brother, who died several years ago.

The estate consists of \$21,000 deposited in amounts of \$3,000 each in seven banks in Western New York; \$4,000 in deposits of money and Liberty bonds in banks in this city, and the business block in Niagara street which is valued at \$20,000. Judge Hickey will give a decision on the petition for letters of administration early in May.

Department of Finance

ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:—

1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.
2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or more.
3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T 1A.

CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use Form T 2.

### Penalty

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.

### Prosecution Shows Accused in Trouble Regarding Finances

BUFFALO, April 15.—The defense in the case of John Edward Teiper accused of murdering his mother and brother to improve his finance, will not open in the supreme court until Monday. Justice Harry J. Taylor made this announcement at 3.30 o'clock yesterday afternoon at which time he granted a motion for adjournment until this morning. The motion was made by District Attorney Guy B. Moore.

In granting the motion Justice Taylor addressed the jury as follows: "Gentlemen, the prosecution will complete its case tomorrow, probably in the morning. When it is completed the court will adjourn until Monday. This will give the defense an opportunity to prepare for the opening of court, therefore, on Friday and none of us will object to the rest, I am sure."

There had been a long conference earlier in the afternoon at which time Mr. Moore explained that he would be unable to complete his case by 5 o'clock. He suggested his motion for adjournment and George Clinton, Sr., chief of counsel for the defense said he would not oppose it. In return Mr. Clinton requested that the de-

fense be permitted to open its case on Monday.

#### Point for Prosecution

The prosecution scored yesterday through the testimony of Dr. Edward J. Meyer, consulting surgeon to all but one of Buffalo's hospitals, and Joseph C. Whitwell, finer print expert of the Buffalo police department.

Dr. Meyer testified that it was not probable that the defendant was rendered unconscious by the blow he was struck on the night his mother and brother was murdered. The defense has claimed that Teiper was knocked senseless after seeing his brother fall and knew nothing of the fate of his mother, sister and brother until he regained consciousness some time later. Teiper alleged that highwaymen were responsible for it all, and that it was one of the highwaymen who attacked him.

Whitwell swore that the marks on the collar worn by Teiper that night were in his opinion made by a man's right hand. The defense has contended they were made by a left hand. This would support Teiper's story of being grabbed by the throat and slashed at with a knife. Teiper's left coat sleeve was scut from the elbow down almost to the cuff.

After having Whitwell examine the collar and obtaining his opinion of the marks upon it, the district attorney placed his right hand at the throat of the witness and asked:

"Now tell me Mr. Whitwell how would it be possible for me to reach over and cut your left sleeve?"

Roscoe R. Mitchell, defense counsel jumped to his feet with an objection which the court sustained.

#### Not at First Trial

Whitwell was not sworn at the first trial, so his appearance on the stand yesterday was a distinct surprise. He was the last witness called before adjournment.

Mr. Mitchell's cross-examination of the finger-print expert was brief. He tried to prove that the mark at the left side of the collar held lines made by the cuticle of a finger. Whitwell said the lines the attorney saw were those in the linen.

surgeon, told of an examination he made of the defendant two days after the tragedy. Dr. Meyer made an examination at the same time. Both testified they found Teiper in a normal condition, physically and mentally, and knew of no reason why he should be in bed where they had found him.

C. Harry Teiper, brother of the defendant, was on the stand the greater part of the morning session and part of the afternoon. He described the relations between the defendant and other members of the family. Harry described his father's will and loans made from the estate to the defendant. He said he knew his brother owed a great deal of money, but denied knowing of judgments against him. Harry was called by the prosecution.

The family estate was settled by Harry in January, 1918. The settlement included \$9,000 left by Mrs. Ag-

nes N. Teiper, the mother. The estate of the father was worth \$158,000 four years ago, according to Harry. The share of Fred Teiper, the dad brother, was divided between Harry, Grace, and the defendant. The defendant is said to have received approximately \$85,000.

## Manufacturing And Art Akin

A strong undercurrent is bringing art and industry together again, after a century of alienation. In the old days, they were mutually independent. The furniture-maker, the pot-and-pan maker, the weaver, the stonemason, were all craftsmen, and, in so far as they did their work well and gave to it good qualities of form and color, they were artists.

Today conditions are quite different, because of the tremendous development of machinery. When the manufacturer began to realize the almost unlimited possibilities open to mechanical ingenuity, he usually forgot to provide for the thing that the machine alone can never possess—the human instinct for beauty. This gave the designing of articles of everyday use in house-building and furnishing, clothing and various other necessities, over into the hands of people who had no special aptitude or taste except in a few fortunate instances.

This, although the purely mechanical and utilitarian manufacturers of the new countries, where art is not held of serious account, easily began

to work high in the world's trade, yet the carpets, printed textiles, wall-papers, metal work, stained glass, and all such things, were contented to stay in second or third place.

It is time for this state of affairs to be changed in Canada, especially at this time when attention is rightly directed to the importance of encouraging and developing home industries.

A National Industrial Art Association has been proposed. This organization would do well to assist manufacturers in obtaining competent and skilled designers, with originality, and, above all, a good understanding of technical demands and limitations. The result would be that Canadian manufactured products would begin at once to take a higher rank not only among Canadian buyers, but also in foreign markets, and particularly in the United States where the importance of Industrial Design is only now beginning to attract much attention from the manufacturers.—From 'Industrial Canada.'

### H. J. C. WILL NOT BE ABLE TO PAY GOVERNMENT TAX

HAMILTON, April 15.—Headquarters of the province are practically unanimous in the opinion that if the tax on race tracks announced by the Hon. Peter Smith Tuesday if enforced it will no longer pay to operate the clubs. "It is too great a burden," said George Kerr, K. C., president of the Hamilton Jockey Club, when spoken to on the matter yesterday, "and unless the tax is cut considerably it will mean the closing of the Hamilton track. In my opinion," he continued, "it is a move on the part of the Attorney-General and the Government to close the tracks."

Previous to the closing down of the tracks on account of the war the tax paid to the Government was \$1,250 per day which means an increase of \$8,750 per day if the new tax is enforced. The \$10,000 tax, however is only on mile tracks, but the half milers have been hit real hard also as they will be forced to pay \$5,000 per day under the new ruling.

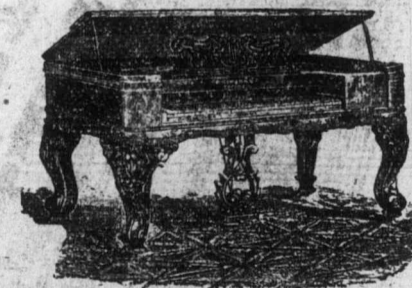

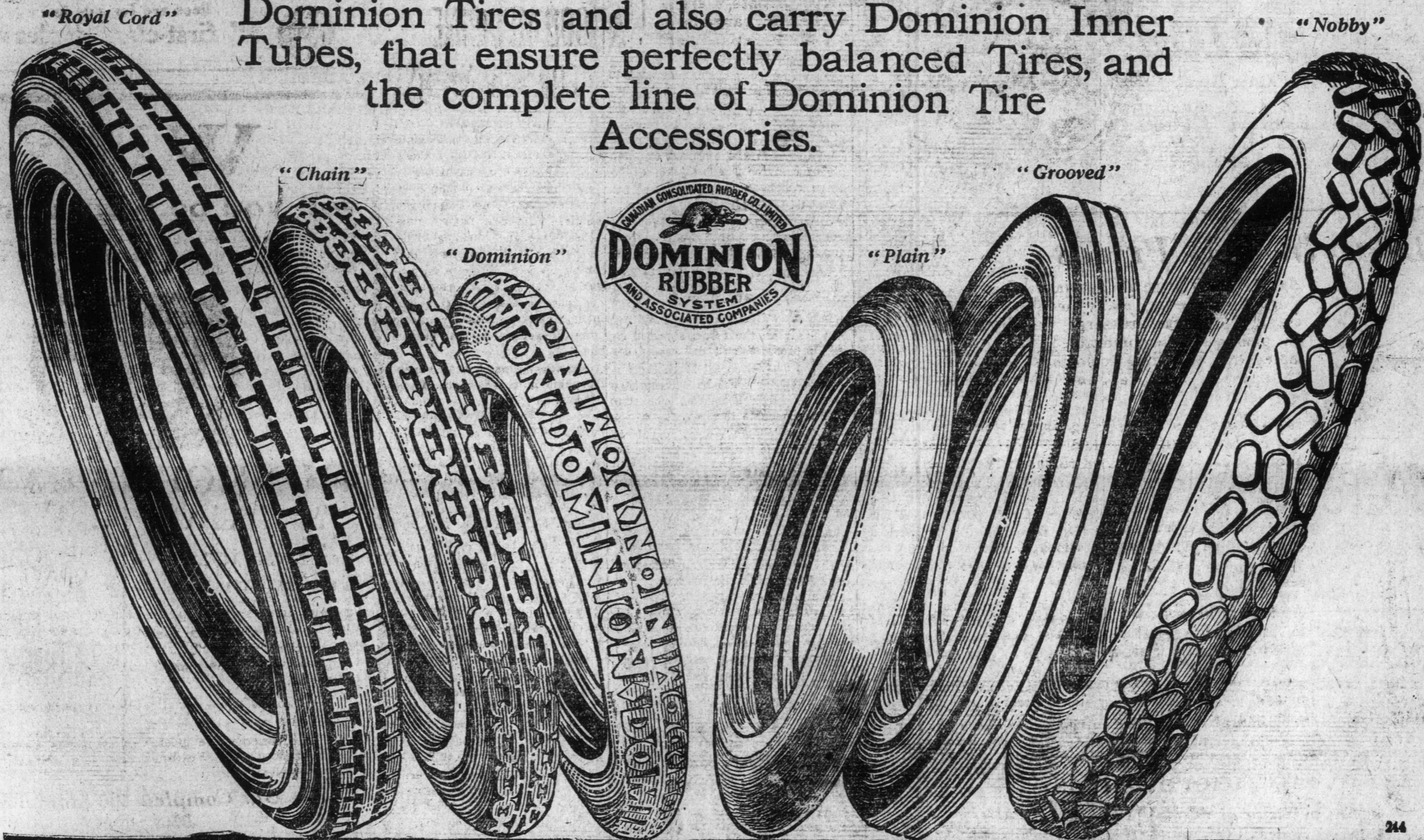

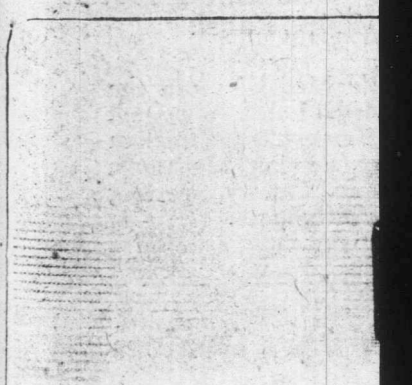

He begged that his identity be kept secret, as the notoriety would crush his mother and sister, but the frequent outrages by morons here has enraged the public and he will get all the law will permit. It is understood a true bill was voted against him today and as he doubtless will be speedily convicted, he will be sentenced to from 1 to 21 years. The great war had been under way since August and new problems presented themselves to the organization when he assumed command. These problems required a large measure of initiative to overcome. The task of rendering the highest and most efficient service was shouldered and Canada paid tribute to the success which attended those efforts by over subscribing the amount asked for during the Red Shield Drive.

Commissioner Richards is a forceful man. He is a man of few words. He believes in doing things. During the five years, more than 11,000 persons are recorded as having sought salvation. In the Field Report two very striking indications of financial growth are given. In 1914, the Self-Denial total for the combined territories was \$43,726. In 1919, for Canada East alone, it was \$76,591. Harvest Festival returns have been doubled.

#### DRURY GOVERNMENT HAS PLURALITY OF 49

Ontario's Farmer-Labor Government had its first showdown of power last night. When all the votes were recorded the Government had a majority of 49. During the afternoon and early evening the Conservatives put up a fight against the bill which reduces the qualification of candidates for municipal office. Half a dozen of them spoke against the bill, and a motion for a six months' adjournment was proposed by Charles McCrea, Sudbury.

No group in the house voted solidly except Labor. Even the Conservatives had their bolter, and John Joynt North Huron, a farmer, voted with the Government members. I. W. Oke former member for East Lambton, was the only one on the right of the Speaker to vote with the Conservative group. Five Liberals also voted for the hoist.

It was the first time that three Whips had walked together up the floor of the House. For the great majority of members it was the first vote they had ever registered in a House of Parliament.

On January 1st this year our total investment in telephone property—buildings, equipment, tools and supplies, plus what it has cost in actual cash to put this working equipment into service—was \$51,458,306. On the same date we had in operation 337,476 telephone instruments.

This means an investment of \$152 for each telephone instrument in service.



Treasurer \$14,835.26 for sinking fund or 10 per cent of the total debt. In addition we have invested in property and plant the depreciation fund of \$39,033.36 and the surplus fund of \$772,584.24 both reserved for earnings or an investment equal to a further 50.8 per cent of the total debt due.  
We have none but current accounts outstanding, and take advantage of the cash discount whenever it is allowed. The power accounts are paid monthly, the interest and sinking fund payments are made to the

City Treasurer as they fall due, and no overhead or office expense is charged to new construction, nothing but the actual material and labor in the new work. And yet, despite a reduction in earnings during the last year we have purchased property for a large sub-station to hold until required, and have purchased the office property on St. Paul Street running through to Head St. all of which is paid for, with the exception of \$3,000 which is not yet due.  
The first consumers were connected in June 1914, and the growth in consumers from year to year might be of interest:

Dec. 31, 1914, 945; 1915, 1838; 1916, 2705; 1917, 3155; 1918, 3454; 1919, 3779; Apr. 1, 1920, 3838.

The Rocky Mountains and it had been found to work well, especially in the winter months.

**Suitable in Mountains**  
Senator Robertson said it might be desirable, and eventually economical, to use electricity on mountain lines, but he did not believe that the time had come when the railways of Ontario could be economically electrified. At present there was a greater demand for electric power in Ontario than could be met. That condition would continue until the completion of 400,000 horsepower development at Chippawa. To electrify lines now going to be curtailed the supply of electric power to industries, and would not help railways. He had no faith in electric lines being made to pay in such communities and districts as Ontario. Highways were being perfected, and there was a growing development of hauling of freight by motor truck and of passengers by automobiles. The truck and the automobile would make the paying of rural electric lines an impossibility.

Senator Lynch-Staunton endorsed the proposal for the appointment of a Commission to report on electrification of Government lines in Ontario, and prevent municipalities carrying into execution the folly they had determined upon. The Government might well declare that it would electrify the portions of the Grand Trunk that municipalities have voted to parallel with the construction of new electric lines. The Government would do well to prevent the people going on with this reckless expenditure. Senator Ross asked if the Hydro had fixed a price on power from Chippawa.

Senator Lynch-Staunton did not know that the price had been fixed but the development was favorable for cheap power, and he had no doubt but that a contract could be made with the Hydro for power that might be required for the operation of Grand Trunk lines, and the rate would be low.

Senator Fowler said that last session he and others had warned the Government that they would be faced with such a situation as this if they persisted in their folly of purchasing the Grand Trunk. He felt that this justified the vote he and others had cast against the purchase. This seemed the proper time to say, "I told you so."
