SAVING SEED. - Every farmer can do much to improve his crops by carefully selecting his seed. This is a well known fact, but it is too unfrequently acted on. It may not be practicable for the farmer in the case of the small grains to select individual ears and preserve them for seed, but if plots of the best filled and strongest growing grain were selected and threshed separately from the wheat, oat or barley field, no one will deny that oat or barley field, no one will deny that much improvement might be made in these crops with very little trouble or expense. There are other crops of which it is easy to select the best individual specimens, the choicest ears of corn or potatoes from the best and most productive hills. The best time to do this is at harvest. 
