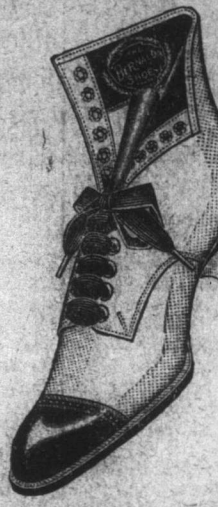

The Evening Chit-Chat

"Her voice was ever soft, Sweet and low; an excellent thing in women."—Shakespeare.

Could William say that of your voice — at least without using a tremendous amount of poetic license? A low, well-modulated voice is a charm almost any woman can have, but listen some day on the street cars and see how very few do possess it.

And while you are listening, don't forget to listen to your own. Try to catch it in an unconscious moment and I'm afraid you'll be surprised at its unmusical quality. And don't stop at listening once. Listen often and try to modulate it.

When I speak of a low voice I don't mean the die away kind. That's about as bad as the shrill tones. I simply mean an even, well-modulated, pleasantly-pitched voice, loud enough so that the persons to whom you are talking can hear what you say without any effort, and low enough so that the rest of the world can't.

A well-modulated voice is a charm that people seldom actively notice but almost always subtly feel. It is one of the things that goes to make up the sum total of "attractiveness."

When you are talking anywhere and a car goes by or any other noise threatens to obscure your voice, don't go into competition with it. Cease speaking until the noise ceases. That is one of the little habits that keeps

the voice in good condition and incidentally one that shows the well-bred woman.

Never under any condition raise your voice when you are angry. Obviously it is unladylike, but furthermore, a perfectly level voice is a splendid weapon in a controversy. If your opponent "hollers" it puts her at a great disadvantage. She feels as if she were being insulted and yet she can hardly ask you to holler back.

Commonness shows nowhere as quickly as it does in the voice. Don't you often hear in the street cars a bushel of puffs, some loud cheap clothes, tawdry ideals and an entire lack of breeding, right in the tones of a voice? And when you seize an opportunity and get a glimpse of the owner, you don't very often find you've made a mistake, do you?

A voice that hurries unduly, tumbles the syllables over each other and runs the words together, is extremely trying to listen to and doesn't inspire the confidence that a slow, well-controlled voice does. Such a voice needs attention quite as much as the loud voice.

A drawl, when it is natural, is somehow charming, but when it is affected, I think it is worse than a false front that doesn't match.

Please don't be satisfied with applying all this to your neighbor. Doubtless some of it fits her. But the point is, does it fit you? You can get along without her having a well-modulated voice, but can you afford to get along without one yourself?

Unless you can have more charms and more friends than you need, I don't think you can.

Grabbing the Mississippi River.

That the Mississippi River shall be turned into a great ship canal—bisecting the continent, putting Chicago on the sea-coast, tying together the Great Lakes and the Gulf—is a magnificent dream which a great many people are working to realize. Governors and legislatures of the valley states have approved it; great associations of commerce have called upon Congress to take action; the people have passed large bond issues in its aid. Yet the great waterway remains still a dream; even its future establishment is doubtful. A dozen practical difficulties stand in the way. Army engineers report unfavorably. President Taft advises caution and delay. Great business interests block the project in a hundred ingenious and devious ways.

Meanwhile—and that without either doubt or delay—the Mississippi River is at various points along its course, being turned into a mill pond for the production of electric water power by great private corporations. If Congress and the authorities at Washington find themselves—for whatever reason—unable to do anything in the direction of making The Father of Waters a highway of commerce, they should at least see to it that the underlying rights of the public are protected against the "vested interests" of the great power companies.

If, when the time really comes to open a deep water-way from St. Paul to New Orleans, it is discovered that a dozen corporations have made great investments along the river, which interfere with the proposed work, it will be difficult—and may prove practically impossible—to carry the great project to success. What is needed now is a comprehensive plan, to the outlines of which all present and future river improvement work, public and private, may be fitted.—From "Grabbing the Mississippi" in the March Technical World Magazine.

Dr. Adams recently made a heavy seizure in New York and another in Philadelphia, but this consisting of four tons of eggs is the most extensive yet made in the U. S.

Struck Judge of Play.

Some Rough Hockey Games in Ontario.

The hockey match at Sturgeon Falls one evening recently between North Bay and the team representing that town furnished the biggest sensation ever sprung in northern athletic circles. The game was unfinished on account of a vicious assault made upon the judge of play E. M. Henry, of the Imperial Bank, who is still in bed as the result of his injuries.

Henry states that Britton, who played centre for the Sturgeon Falls team, repeatedly struck him with his stick, and when warned that he was making vicious remarks, shortly after Henry had occasion to penalize Britton for tripping, when the latter struck the judge of play several vicious blows in the face, felling him to the ice, where he lay in an unconscious condition, requiring medical attention for two hours.

King Haakon Will Visit the Fisheries

Will Go to Lofoten Islands to Meet Cod Fishermen.

Christiania, Norway, March 1.—King Haakon announces that he will start March 3 on a voyage to the Lofoten Islands, off the north coast of Norway, where the great codfisheries are, and where thousands of fishermen are now assembled.

The King's plan has caused some surprise, as the trip is a rough one, and the weather is likely to be bad at this time of the year, but his purpose is generally approved.

King Haakon has often declared that it was his wish to meet personally the greatest possible number of his subjects in all parts of the country. The voyage will be made in a warship.

Detective Was Taken Into Custody.

Charged With Firing Shot During Rev at Springhill.


Halifax, N.S., March 1.—Practically the first disturbance in connection with the Springhill coal miners' strike, which has been on for seven months, occurred yesterday.

Two of the employees of the company came uptown in company with Detective Conrad Timms, and a row occurred between some of the men and some of the strikers near Rogers' Corner, and one of the men was badly beaten. Timms and the men retreated to the palisade and in the fracas a shot was fired. This morning Timms was brought before Stipendiary Hunter, charged with discharging firearms.

Serious Defect in the Municipal Bill

In the Council the other day Hon. John Harris pointed out a serious defect in the Municipal Bill now before the Legislature. Although the bill calls upon householders to connect their houses with street sewerage and put in water, Mr. Harris pointed out that there were a very large number of streets which had neither water nor sewerage in them, and that it was futile to borrow money to assist the poorer householder to do this when there was no water in their streets. He pointed out that the new water supply, provided four years ago, had not been distributed to the extent contemplated in the scheme, with the result outlined above. Further, that no provision was made in its present bill for the distribution of water along the streets which needed it, and that it was absolutely necessary to provide the means of putting water in streets before borrowing to put it in houses. He suggested that the monies to be borrowed should be differently allocated to provide the street water services which were lacking. Other defects in the present water services were also pointed out. The bill was sent to a Select Committee, and no doubt the Government and City Council will see the advisability of amendments such as Mr. Harris suggests. It is a pity citizens ever lost the experienced services of the Hon. J. Harris in the City Council.

Two Boats and Crews Adrift

Last night Minister of Fisheries Piccott had a wire from Magistrate Milten, Greenspond, saying that two boats and crews belonging to that place were caught in the slob ice which was continually running around them. He asked that the Bloodhook or Iceland, then at Pool's Island, might be sent to the rescue, and asked the Minister to get the consent of the owners of the ships to send the Iceland and the next wire said that the ship was three miles off Sound Rocks. By the flash of the guns they imagined the men were seaward. At 12:30 this morning another wire was received saying that the ship had run into the harbor, blew her whistle and later bore off again. Another wire was received saying that the two crews had been picked up by the Iceland and brought into Pond. The men must have been out looking for bealmer seals. They were in great danger for the boats could not be hauled over the slob, and if pushed through the planks would likely be chafed so badly that the boats would sink.

Evidence when Power produced showed, however, that the woman had assaulted him, and that he did not lay a hand on her. The case was dismissed. Inspector General Sullivan in each case prosecuted. Mr. Frank Morris defended.

Sealers Meeting Last Night.

A number of sealers who were in the city the past 10 days met in the British Hall last night when Capt. W. Winsor was moved to the chair. There were present the Premier, Hon. D. Morrison, M. P. Cashin, R. Watson, S. D. Blandford, J. C. Crosbie and Messrs. Moulton, Piccott, Squires, Whiteway, Parsons and Capt. A. Keen, of the Florioz. Speeches were made by Sir E. P. Morris and the rest of the gentlemen above mentioned, mostly as to the railway policy of the present Government. With the singing of the National Anthem the meeting adjourned at 11 o'clock.

Durango Arrived.

The S. S. Durango, Capt. Chambers, arrived here this morning after a voyage of 14 days from Liverpool. From the start of the voyage the vessel had rough weather with heavy westerly winds mostly, and at times a mountainous sea; the weather was also cold and snow storms were encountered, while a few days ago the ship met a field of heavy Arctic ice. To run clear of it the vessel had to steam round to the Virgin Rocks, and after that made a good run to port. She brought one passenger, Mr. Ferguson, 800 tons cargo and some mail, and has 600 tons in transit for Halifax. She is a lad of the West End, who stowed away in the s.s. Durango some time ago, was brought back this trip and landed here. He says he wants to be a sailor and the officers on board say that he is a good chap and that he would make a fine mariner.

Magistrate Guilty.

New York, March 2.—After a trial which lasted a week, Henry J. Fulton, a Brooklyn police magistrate since 1901, was found guilty by a jury to-day of accepting a bribe in the performance of his duty in court. The special charge was that he had accepted \$15,666, and for this trivial sum he faces a maximum penalty of ten years in prison and a fine of \$5,000, or both, and a minimum penalty of five years in prison with no fine. He was remanded to jail for sentence on Friday.

London, March 2.—King Edward yesterday made plea for universal peace—one of the strongest declarations of his kind delivered by an European monarch since Nicholas of Russia proposed his Hague peace plan. The King's words are regarded as of special interest in view of the recent German war scare.

It was when he received the Archbishops of Canterbury and York members of the church convocations this afternoon that he took occasion in replying to the York convocations address to say, among other things: "The concord of Christendom is unbroken and rarely in history has the idea of war seemed so repulsive or the desire for peace been more widely cherished throughout my empire."

Governor Visits Aurora

About 3 p.m. yesterday His Excellency Sir Ralph Williams accompanied by Miss Dean and an unexpected visit to the S. S. Aurora, lying at Bowring's wharf. He was received by Captain Greene, Messrs. J. A. Munn and F. W. Hayward who in taken by surprise tendered the hospitality of the staunch Newfoundland sealer. His Excellency visited all parts of the ship including the men's quarters, saw for himself what conditions were and at once made himself popular with the crew. From the bridge he made an encouraging speech to the men lined up on the deck, and when leaving the ship His Excellency and Miss Dean were cheered time and again.



Motor-Bus Over a Cliff

Fatal Sequel to a Midnight Road Race.
A race between two motor-omnibuses on the high road near Compostella last night resulted in one omnibus being flung over a forty-foot cliff into a river. Two passengers were killed and five others seriously wounded.

A fête was held at Compostella yesterday which was attended by the peasants from all the neighbouring villages. Many motor-omnibuses and motor-cars were used to convey the excursionists to and from their homes.

When the merry-makers left Compostella to return home shortly after midnight some of the motor-cars engaged in races. An exciting contest took place between two omnibuses, each containing fourteen persons, and for several miles the vehicles raced side by side at top speed.

Finally, while descending a steep hill, one of the omnibuses swerved and dashed into the other, with the result that the second omnibus was diverted from the road. Before the driver could check its speed, it dashed over a rocky cliff, into the river forty feet below.

The cliff was so steep that the other excursionists could not go to the assistance of their unfortunate companions until ropes and ladders had been brought from Compostella. After thirty minutes' delay, rescue parties were lowered over the cliffs. They found the survivors of the disaster clinging to the partially submerged omnibus.

Two men had been instantly killed, while all the other occupants of the omnibus were injured, three men and two women being unconscious. They were kept afloat by their friends.—Lisbon, Wednesday, Feb. 23.

Getting After the Fly.

Washington, Feb. 25.—The common house fly is the object of a nationwide crusade that was launched against him here to-day. A moving picture campaign of education in theatres throughout the United States and in Canada was perfected by men and women who have organized the special fly-fighting committee of the American Civic Association.

Strike Spreading.

Special to Evening Telegram. PHILADELPHIA, March 9. Promise of help without any development of strength in its own field which appeared to take even its most confident leaders by surprise, injected new life into the general strike movement to-day. A labor campaign which yesterday gave every sign of waning in force received its strongest impetus to-day from the action of the State Federation of Labor Convention in Newcastle in declaring that a state wide tie up industry would not be a surprise to insure success of the local cause. Added to this came the revelation, that the Union Labor Movement was strong enough to invade what was supposed to be a secure citadel of the opposing forces and open an admittedly wide reach. The success of the strike leaders in inducing over one thousand employees of the Baldwin Locomotive works to walk out to-day following the early morning desertion of possible as many more was the most striking development of the day in the local situation.

Aerial Traffic.

Special to Evening Telegram. MUNICH, March 9. The first regular air navigation service in Europe will be inaugurated on May 15th. Regular trips will be made from this city alternately to Sternberg and Oberammergau. A dirigible balloon of the Parseval type, having a gas capacity of sixty-seven hundred cubic metres and driven by two motors of one hundred horsepower each, will be used. The aerial carriage will accommodate twelve passengers besides the crew. The fare for the return trip to Sternberg will be fifty-five dollars, and for the round trip to Oberammergau one hundred and seventy-five dollars. The regular service will close for the season on September 1st. An officer from the German Aeronautic Corps has been detailed to serve as captain of the dirigible.

Fairbanks Entertained.

Fairbanks under the auspices of the Pilgrims' Society. The Earl of Halsbury presided despite his eighty five years, and talked eloquently of Bunker Hill and the Anglo-American friendship of late years. The speech of the evening was made by Mr. Fairbanks. He referred to the armament question and deplored that the energies of the nations were not directed to peaceful arbitrations of their differences.

SEARCH LIGHT GOING.—The S. S. Florizel hauled into the stream from Bowrings, South Side, yesterday afternoon, and last night her powerful searchlight was kept going, being turned repeatedly on the city harbour and signal station. Many places were brilliantly illuminated by it.

MILK STOLEN.—A couple of days ago a countryman who left his milk wagon outside the door of a city church whilst he went into prayer, found on returning that milk to the value of 80 cents contained in bottles had been stolen from the vehicle. He did not think it worth while to report the matter to the police.

BECAME ILL ON STREET.—Last night an old woman named Walsh passing down Water Street became ill on the sidewalk. Mr. Geo. Kearney, of the Smith Sewing Machine Co., who was standing in the door of his premises brought her in and restoratives being applied, she soon revived after which he drove her home.

NOT TO BE DOCKED.—The first impression was that the s.s. Bonaventure would require to be docked after her accident at Pool's Island. An examination by a diver a couple of days ago showed that the damages were slight, that the plates would not be removed from the bilge blocks, and that she need not be docked.

Tea in aid of the C. L. B. armory was served at Canon Wood Hall last evening by Mrs. T. McNeil and Mrs. J. C. Marshall. The attendance was fairly large. A concert was also given and much enjoyed. A very pleasant evening was spent. The receipts were very satisfactory.

Reprehensible Journalism.

In the Standard of Empire of the 25th ult., which is just to hand, we observe the following despatch from its Newfoundland correspondent, who, we understand, is D. W. Prowse, Esq.:

"St. John's, Feb. 23.
"The Bill providing for the construction of extensive branch railways has been carried without opposition, both parties realising the importance of this measure to the future of the island."

"The new lines will be of the greatest benefit to Bonavista and Trinity, and will be the means of opening up large and very valuable tracts of mineral and agricultural land."

"This is untrue from beginning to end. The Bill providing for the construction of the branch railways was not carried without opposition. Both parties do not realise the importance of these branch lines to the future of the island. As a matter of fact, the leader of the Opposition, Sir Robert Bond, delivered a very powerful speech against this railway policy and declared that it meant 'mortgaging the future of the country beyond repair.' Mr. Kent, K.C., in a lengthy and able speech said that the contract for the building of the branch lines is 'the worst that ever came before the Legislature,' and he 'believed the day will come when honourable members will regret that they

ever voted for the passing of this contract.' The Opposition divided the House twice on the question, and on the third reading it was only carried by a majority of eight. As we published in full the speeches of the Opposition members on the 9th and 11th ult., and also an account of the division that took place on the third reading of the Bill, and as the Government newspapers criticised these publications, the correspondent of the Standard of Empire could not have been unaware of the facts. His conduct in transmitting the untruthful despatch is therefore most reprehensible. Reading the despatch in connection with a number of others that preceded it and equally misleading, we are led to conclude that it was inspired for the purpose of creating a favourable impression in London, where the Government are about to try for a loan. To say that the branch lines to Bonavista and Trinity 'will be the means of opening up large and very valuable tracts of mineral and agricultural land' is just as untrue as the accompanying statement that the Bill 'was carried without opposition.' Those lines will neither open up agricultural or mineral land, and anyone who gives a thought to the matter is well aware that five or six million dollars are about to be squandered on an undertaking that has nothing whatever to justify or recommend it.

Peary Must Prove He Was at the Pole.

Special to Evening Telegram.
WASHINGTON, March 9.
Indications point to postponement of any Congressional action to reward Commander Robert E. Peary for his conquest of the North Pole until after his proofs shall have been published. The sub-committee of the House Naval Committee, charged with considering the various bills that propose honors for Peary, will meet today to discuss them further. "I am absolutely opposed to Congress grant-

ing any award to Commander Peary unless his proofs are made public," yesterday declared Representative Roberts of Massachusetts, a member of the sub-committee. "There is nothing whatever before us to show that Mr. Peary has discovered the Pole further than the statement of certain gentlemen that he did. How could any members of this committee get into the House and support any bill which they presented when they had no facts to back it up? We would be in a ridiculous attitude."

Rosebery Plans to Reform House of Lords

Special Evening Telegram.
LONDON, March 9.
When Lord Rosebery, on Monday, launches his plan for the reformation of the House of Lords he will perfect a set of three resolutions embodying in general terms the course which the peers propose to follow in modernizing themselves. As Lord Rosebery had been in consultation with a majority of members of the Upper House there is little question that the resolutions represent the general view of the lords on the subject of

reorganization. The first resolution will affirm the necessity for a strong and efficient second chamber for the well-being of the state. The second will set forth that such a chamber will be best obtainable by the reform and reconstruction of the House of Lords. The third will declare that a necessary preliminary to such reform and reconstruction is the acceptance of the principle that the possession of a peerage in itself should no longer afford the right to sit and vote in the House of Lords.

Big Naval Programme.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, March 9.
The Navy estimates for 1910 which were issued by the Admiralty to-night provided for an expenditure of two hundred and three million, eighteen thousand five hundred dollars, an increase of twenty seven million eight hundred and five thousand dollars over 1909. The increase is almost wholly taken up by the shipbuilding programme authorized by Parliament before dissolution. The new programme provides for five large armored ships five protected cruisers twenty destroyers, and a considerable number

of submarines. By April there will be under construction 7 battleships, 3 armored, 9 protected and 2 unarmored cruisers 37 destroyers and 9 submarines. The estimates further provide for an increase of three thousand men in the personnel of the navy and the completion during 1911 of two floating docks to accommodate the largest battleships. These will be stationed at Portsmouth and Medway. Reginald McKenna, first Lord of the Admiralty in a statement announces the formation of a new naval mobilization department and a permanent navy war council with the first sea lord as president.

Legislative Council.

Yesterday the Fishermen's Home Bill passed the third reading. The Loan Bill was also disposed of. The Bell Island Bill to tax ore passed its second reading. The Labrador steam fishery bill and the Law Society bill were put through committee. Two bills were referred to Select Committees, viz., the Dental Bill and the Municipal Bill. The Select Committee

met and heard counsel and received evidence. Mr. Howley appeared for the promoters and Mr. Knight for the opponents. The Municipal Bill was also referred to a Select Committee to deal with some serious defects in the bills, which have been brought to the attention of the Council by the Hon. John Harris. The Committee consists of Hons. Harris, Gibbs, Job and Angel. The Council meets to-day at 4.30 p.m.

Early Settlement of St. John's, Nfld.

By W. G. Gosling.
I have read with the deepest interest and admiration the report of Mr. Gosling's paper on the above subject printed in last night's Telegram. Poor T. D. Scanlan called me long ago "the man of many smiles," but Gosling is all smiles. We all know him as the most successful broker and commission agent. After reading this paper I can honestly say that he has mistaken his profession. He should have been a lawyer. Anyone who could invent such an ingenious and perverted argument in sustentation of the most absurd statement that Newfoundland, discovered in 1497, was wholly uninhabited until Guy's arrival in 1610, deserves all the honours of the profession. Sabine in his history of the American fisheries states that there were 50 houses in Newfoundland in 1522. Mr. Gosling does not tell us that Sabine's book is one of the highest authorities on the subject. In my history one can see how splendidly Sir Humphrey Gilbert was entertained by the merchants of St. John's during his stay here. No man

loves his home like the Englishman, and with abundance of wood and skilled mechanics it is utterly absurd to suppose that the merchants, owners of all the fine property described by Hayes (Gilbert's companion), had no houses. St. John's as it is described, a place most populous and much frequented without a solitary house. It is quite true that we know very little from the records about Newfoundland during the reign of Henry VIII., but any one who has studied my book will see clearly why everything about the trade was kept secret. It was all done, and I showed how it was all accomplished, to avoid Henry's tyranny and confiscation. Will any one for a moment believe that all this valuable property, stores, &c., in populous St. John's was left every season for six or seven months absolutely at the mercy of the savage and wild animal? We can all see clearly that winter crews, to build boats, do repairs, &c., were a necessity from the very first. If there were no winter crews, how could Hayes describe

Lenten Sermon.

His Grace Archbishop Howley delivered the fifth of his series of Lenten sermons at the R. C. Cathedral last night. His Grace spoke from the text: "For many are called but few are chosen." These were terrible words said His Grace and would make mankind despair did they not remember that Our Divine Lord was also infinitely merciful. The man who asked Our Lord how many would be saved was told to "strive thou to enter the narrow way." This advice should let us see that it was each one's own business to save his own soul, to do all in his power to enter the narrow way by leading a good life and to leave over idle curiosity about enquiries regarding others, such as were made by the young man of Our Divine Lord. Some people say that Almighty God being so merciful, so good that he will not allow any of his creatures to be eternally lost. True, God loves all mankind and showed the greatness of His love by the Redemption. Still he has given man a free will and a chance to gain all the merits that would entitle him to the complete happiness of heaven. Some will say why did God give man free will if having the gift his soul is liable to be damned, and no doubt many are lost eternally. In reply to this it is well to remember that if God did not give man free will he would be on a level with the brute creation and would not have the other glorious endowments of memory and understanding. Almighty God gives every one of his rational creatures sufficient grace to save their souls. In the exercise of his free will lies all the merit God wills, not that any one should be damned, and has established His Church with the Sacraments—the channels of grace—to enable all mankind to retrieve the loss caused by the sin of our first parents.

His Grace exhorted the congregation to make use of those graces and to co-operate with them and do the best in their power—strive to enter the narrow way by leading good lives and God would do the rest.

Before entering on his sermon pro-

per His Grace referred to a complaint that had come to him in reference to certain people who are going around selling "rosaries." They give scandal by their ignorance in telling people that by repeating the "beads" at home or in their pews they will get the indulgences granted for making the "Stations of the Cross." This is not true, and those people in making such statements whether they are made through ignorance or cupidity are acting in such a way as to bring religion and the practices of the Church into ridicule. Henceforth that practice would be stopped as he had given strict orders to the convents of the city not to allow irresponsible parties to be selling beads in their name.

His Grace then explained the particular conditions under which the Station beads are used, viz., by those who are too ill to attend the Church. If the beads are then recited before a crucifix the privileges gained by those who make the Way of the Cross in the usual manner are then gained not otherwise. It was a painful thing to see that sacred articles of our holy religion like rosaries and scapulars being made use of in this way, and be placed on sale in stores side by side with immoral books and obscene filthy pictures. The congregation should have intelligence enough to cure such practices that tend to degrade religion, by purchasing religious articles in stores whose proprietors have decency enough and morality enough to cause them to keep out of their business all immoral books and pictures, and to sacrifice the dirty gain that is made by the sale of such soul destroying articles as certain filthy pictures and books that are imported here. It is ad enough to be selling these things, at the putting them side by side and on a level with articles of devotion like rosaries, prayer books and scapulars is the devil's work and something that the congregation have the power of remedying in their own hands. Let them buy religious articles in stores only where there are no immoral books and photographs.

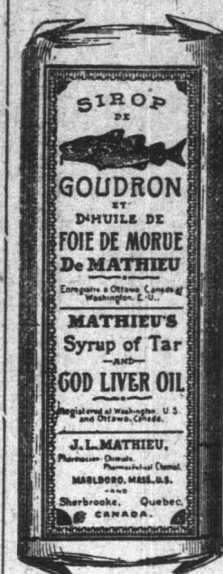

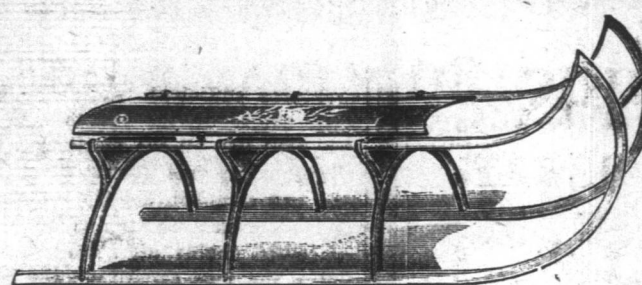

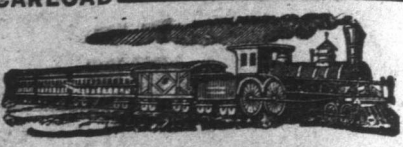
