**SOLIGNUM.**

A Remarkable Test! Locally made by Messrs. W. & G. RENDELL.

To test Solignum as a preservative for Wood against the attacks of Worms, we tried a piece of 2 x 4 Spruce, about two feet in length, by painting one-third with Solignum, leaving the balance clear wood, this we suspended by a wire through the centre, in the water about one foot from the bottom, immediately over a pile of stones the remains of a sunken wharf (which is the place where our Wharf Shores are eaten off first) for Three Months. On taking it up at the end of that time we found some half-dozen small holes, only a very short distance in the clear part of the wood, which shows the liquid had penetrated through the whole piece and the worms had hardly begun boring before coming in contact with it.

Last year as a test of some brands of Copper Paint we had, we had a similar piece of wood treated at both ends, leaving the centre third clean; this was in exactly the same place as the piece for the Solignum test for Three Months and Three Days, when taken up the painted ends were perfect but the centre was riddled with worm holes.

Both these pieces of wood are to be seen at our Office by those interested in the preservation of Wharf Piles or any other wood work.

**Paper Bag Cookery New.**  
NO UTENSILS NEEDED.

Discovery of New York Chef May Revolutionize Cooking — Tender Meats—Easy Process.

Presiding over the kitchen of Brooks' Club, New York, is a magician whose magic is likely to revolutionize cooking.

He is M. Soyer, and briefly stated his discovery is that food which is enclosed in a paper bag and put into an oven is cooked far more quickly than by the old method. Food cooked in this way loses neither weight nor nutriment. The envelope in which it is enclosed prevents evaporation, and all the essences are retained. Minor yet substantial benefits are a reduction in the number of cooking utensils.

Mr. Soyer prepared the following dishes in just over an hour: Loaf of lamb, 45 minutes; chicken, 25 minutes; "army stew," 30 minutes; stewed kidneys, 5 minutes; bouillabaisse, 10 minutes; soured mackerel, 5 minutes; roasted apples, 15 minutes; veal and ham pie, 35 minutes; currant cakes, 20 minutes; apple tart, 10 minutes; boue bouche (puff paste), 10 minutes; chop, 10 minutes.

**Absolute Simplicity.**

What strikes one most in the new cookery is its absolute simplicity. Every cook, even the plainest of them, may become a cordon bleu. The loin of lamb was put into the paper bag without even the companionship of a dressing of flour. Three-quarters of an hour later, to the minute, it emerged from the oven, and the scorched but intact envelope was removed. The joint was of a delicate golden tint, and was accompanied on the dish by a generous quantity of gravy. Judged by the supreme test, the meat was tender and juicy.

**Paper Must Be Pure.**

Something should be said about the paper. It must, of course, be pure and devoid of obnoxious chemicals. When there is a wide demand for it, as there must be presently, the supply will meet it. The paper is not expensive—for a middle class family it need not cost more than 36 cents a week—and, when the saving in utensils and the labor in cleaning them is taken into account, the economy of the new process is evident. Enclosed in a paper bag, the food is exposed to heat, which opens the pores of the meat and melts the sinew. Nothing is lost, because there is no evaporation, and careful experiments have proved that the weight of cooked food is exactly the same as the weight of the raw material.

And there is no smell. When paper-bag cookery becomes the vogue, no more will a bouquet of varied odors greet the guest who dines at a small house or flat where the kitchen is close to the dining room. The scent of the food like other essences is retained until it serves its proper purpose of titillating appetite. —London Chronicle.

M. G. LAST REPLY.

Dear Sir,—I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 17th, which has been duly considered by our Governing Committee and to which I am directed to reply.  
We beg to say that we have never made any contention whatever respecting the other three brigades parading in response to His Excellency's invitation, and have no reason or desire whatever to do so.  
We regret exceedingly that His Excellency should have offered a solution of the so-called difficulty which was known to be absolutely unacceptible to the M. G. B. and thus have placed us in the embarrassing position of being compelled respectfully to decline to accept His Excellency's suggestion and to find ourselves very much against our natural wishes and desires thereby excluded from the public parade.  
We beg further to respectfully submit that in a former letter we think we showed conclusively the lack of any analogy between the Army and the local Brigades. In any case we beg to submit with all deference and respect to His Excellency that we should not be expected to acquiesce in any arrangement which concedes to the C. L. B. precedence as of right, which is equivalent to priority.  
We shall exceedingly regret with His Excellency the absence of the M. G. B. from the public parade, but the proposed arrangement leaves us no alternative. Nevertheless we beg to assure His Excellency that the Coronation of our Gracious King will be celebrated as heartily and loyally by the M. G. B. as by any of His Majesty's myriads of subjects, and that we shall earnestly pray for a long, happy, glorious and peaceful reign for our beloved Sovereign.

### The Patriotic Concert.

Editor Evening Telegram: Sir,—I wish to make some observations in reply to your correspondent "Tim Shannahan," and I crave space in your columns for this purpose. First I would remind him that the Committee which has this Concert in hand were appointed by a meeting of citizens which was held in the Colonial Building about three weeks ago. In the beginning it occurred to the minds of the citizens who were there assembled that the best place in which to give the Concert was Bannerman Park. Here all might gather and it was urged that no charge could be brought against any one that a portion of the public had been intentionally excluded, for the certainty of discovering fault finders was, from the first, before the minds of all. One difficulty, however, forced the meeting to give up the idea of the Open-Air Concert. This was the possibility of rain. Once that chance was suggested no other course was possible but to secure a place which would both accommodate a large audience and protect them from rain. In such circumstances it was resolved that an attempt should be made to get the Prince's Rink, and a committee was appointed to this end and generally to carry out the wishes of the meeting as to the Concert. This committee immediately set about their business. The Rink was secured and the service of soloists, choruses, and the four Brigade Bands enlisted. Subscriptions were also asked for and the sum of \$750 was obtained from 36 gentlemen, or an average contribution of \$20. From both a musical and a financial standpoint, therefore, the Concert became a possibility. It remained to decide about the accommodation of the public. Up to this date the ideas associated with the Open Air Concert were present in the minds of the Committee. Their intention was to provide a Promenade Concert only. At a later date it was thought by some to be unwise to expect everyone, especially women, to stand throughout the performance, and that an effort should be made to secure some seats.

On the other hand it was urged that the cost of hiring chairs and carting them to and from the Rink would be too great for the Committee to undertake. But those in favour of chairs assured the Committee that the public would willingly pay for seats and thus defray the cost of providing them. Others were of opinion that if chairs were provided at all some should be supplied free of charge. It has thus come about that the Committee has resolved to put chairs into the Rink, and to meet the cost of them by charging for half while leaving the others free. The latter are to be occupied on the principle of "first come first served."

I wish also to suggest to the mind of Mr. Shannahan another thought. It is this, that with respect to this Concert there are two equalities. The first is of those who attend the Concert, the second is of those who pay for it. I gather from Tim's remarks that he has, up to the present, considered himself as in the ranks of the first-named. I now appeal to him to join the ranks of the subscribers by handing over to the Treasurer the sum of \$25. There are other things also he might do in connection with the Concert. For instance he might lend a hand to the Committee in decorating the Rink. Or he might attend at an early hour on Friday night in the capacity of usher. If time does not permit him to show his loyalty in either of these active forms he might at least do so by investing in the purchase of seats for himself and Mrs. Tucker. I have no doubt that his appearance with Mrs. Tucker on that evening would be greeted by an ovation.

### Coronation Honors.

LONDON, To-day. The coming Coronation of the King is signalled by a free-handed distribution of honors. The Right Hon. Sir Joseph Ward, P.C., K.C.M.G., Premier of New Zealand has been given a baronetcy. Mr. Fisher, Premier of Australia, and Sir Edward Morris, Premier of Newfoundland, are made Privy Counsellors. The bestowal of a baronetcy upon Dr. Oaker, Regius Professor of Medicine at Oxford and formerly Professor of Medicine at McGill University is of special interest to Canadians and Americans. Altogether twenty new baronets and 40 knights are created. The stage is accordingly set for the Coronation of George Alexander, actor manager, and the baronets and knights include men conspicuous in commerce and science. Several hundred decorations have been bestowed. Sir Charles H. Spence, Chief Justice of Canada is made a G.C.M.G. while Dr. Falconer, President of Toronto University, Charles James, Deputy Minister of Agriculture at Toronto, are made C. M. G.'s.

### London Decorations.

LONDON, To-day. Rain has been falling steadily since early in the afternoon of yesterday, and flags along the streets are hanging limp and gaudy with color blurred and the paint running down the columns of the triumphal arches. Some of the finest decorations and effects arranged for the Coronation celebration stand a fair chance of being ruined. The spectacular aspect of London is considerably damaged, but many illuminations are ablaze with light, all the way from the West End Clubs to the heart of the financial district, where the Stock Exchange and the Bank of England are bright with electric lights.

### Against Union.

PHILADELPHIA, To-day. Preliminary to opening the General Convention of Baptists of North America, Dr. Strong, of the Rochester Seminary, President of the Convention, spoke against complete union of the various Protestant Churches. "Let us work together, but keep our fundamental principles separate," said he.

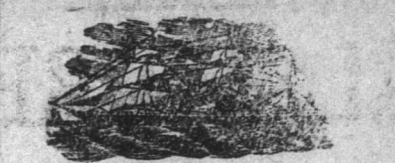

Both teams started in pretty fast and for a while the game was evenly balanced, the ball being very much around centre. At length the Scotias broke clear and Cahill brought the ball up field only to lose to the Dominion backs. A regular onslaught now took place on the Dominion goal, the backs, Burke, Martin and Woods, doing good work. They cleared well, and Burnham, famous of old with the St. Bon's for his wing shots, made a pretty run and centering nicely, the boys of the Iron & Steel lost a chance to score. Still undaunted they kept the Scotias backs busy, Ross playing a splendid game, well aided by Haddon, late of the M.G.B., the ball was sent whiz-

zing up field and unpretentiously George, for the blue and white, essayed a shot from the wing, beating Murphy and drawing first blood. Nova Scotias, 1; Dominion, 0. Deserves a Medal.

Eye witnesses who were present on Harvey & Co.'s pier when Stoker James Bruin rescued another stoker named Miller from drowning, say it was an act of bravery which should not go unrewarded. Miller fell overboard at 11.30, when the ship had swung about half the length of herself from the wharf, and when the thunder storm was at its height and torrents of rain descended. When Bruin heard the cry of man overboard he unhesitatingly jumped from the Florizel's deck into the water, a distance of 40 feet, and but for his ability as a swimmer both he and the imperilled comrade might have met a watery grave. It was only when the frequent and vivid flashes of lightning lit up the surface of the water that those present could see the splendid efforts made to ensure the safety of his friend and to prevent him in his struggles from grasping him by the arms and rendering him powerless to extend aid or cause the death of both. To do this when the darkness was intense, between the flashes of lightning, was a task of great danger and difficulty. Bruin, who could not swim and was rather heavily clad, must have drowned. Bruin, who is a son of the late Const. Thomas Bruin, is a quiet, unassuming young fellow and has saved several from drowning. Our informants who were present when he so distinguished himself say that young Bruin should receive some proper recognition of his bravery, and believe that the matter should be brought to the attention of His Excellency the Governor who will, no doubt, see that he will be suitably rewarded. Bruin's grandfather, we might also observe in passing, served honourably as a soldier in the British Army.

He is only 21 years of age, but is the hardest prisoner that the police had to deal with.

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.  
LONDON, June 19.  
Special Representative Hammond, from the United States, accompanied by Mrs. Hammond and a special embassy staff, made his official entry into London this afternoon. He was met at the station by the Duke of Connaught, Crown Prince Christian of Denmark, Prince Alexander of Teck and other notables. The American party travelled to London in the royal saloon attached to a special train from Dover, where Baron Sandhurst welcomed them to England. The special train brought to London a number of representatives of Continental powers, also the Papal Legate.

LONDON, June 19.  
Thousands of Londoners are fleeing from the city to escape the hordes of sightseers from the provinces and abroad, whose capacity for Coronation festivities is so boundless that night, so far as sleep is concerned, has become a decidedly curtailed period. Fears of panic, following an incident within the walls of barriers erected by the police, have also furnished thousands of weak and nervous people with a desire to get away from the crush. The railroads have been quick to take advantage of the situation, and are advertising excursions at attractive rates to seaside and country resorts on the days of the big events. The King and Queen visited Westminster Abbey this afternoon and witnessed part of a rehearsal of the Coronation ceremony.  
LONDON, June 19.  
A score of prominent British Admirals met this afternoon under the presidency of Admiral Lord Charles Bessborough, and unanimously condemned the Declaration of London, the international agreement for the governing of prizes in naval warfare, adopted at a conference of naval powers two years ago. One hundred and four Admirals have signed a petition to Premier Asquith, pleading with him not to ratify the Declaration.

WASHINGTON, June 19.  
Frauds amounting to several millions of dollars in duty on cutlery imitations during the last few years, have been discovered by secret agents of the Customs service, who have been working in this country and in the Holings district of Germany, whence most of the cutlery imports come to the United States.  
CHICAGO, June 19.  
The States District Court to-day denied a motion of Armour and nine other Chicago packers for a rehearing of their motion to quash the indictments charging them with violation of the Sherman anti-trust Act. This means that the packers must stand trial.

VIENNA, June 19.  
Eight were killed and two fatally injured when the troops fired a volley into a crowd of election rioters at Drohobovs to-day. The mob stoned the troops, the latter replying with their rifles.  
LONDON, June 19.  
In the Coronation Procession Lord Kitchener will ride next to the King and Queen.
