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

#### Our Volunteers, fensive is already weakening. GERMAN ATTACK STOPPED.

LONDON, April 28. The following British official statenent was issued to-night: Fighting to the north and northeast of Ypres continued all vesterday. Our operadefinitely stopped the German attack. and it has not since been renewed.

"Since yesterday morning there have been no Germans west of the Canal, except at Steenstraate, where they have established a small bridge head. The readjustment of the situation has necessitated the delivery of counter-attacks both by French and our troops on north of the Ypres salient. In resisting these counterattacks, the Germans again made use of noxious gases and of shells manufactured in contravention of the

Hague Convention. "On the rest of the front there is nothing to report."

FRENCH CRUISER TORPEDOED. PARIS, April 28. The French armoured cruiser Leon Gambetta has been torpedoed and unk in the Adriatic Sea. Part of er crew of 725 men were saved, but the loss of life is believed to be very

THE LOSS OF THE LEON GAM-BETTA.

PARIS, April 28. A communication from the Ministry of Marine, reciting the torpedoing of the French cruiser Leon Gambetta was given out this afternoon as follows: The armoured cruiser Leon Gambetta, cruising at the entrance of the Otranto Canal, was torpedeed on the night of April 27th, and went to the bottom in ten minutes. All the officers perished at their posts; 136 members of the crew, including 11 under officers, were rescued by vessels sent out promptly to their help by the Italian authorities. The list of survivors is not yet received. The French cruiser was the victim of an

Austrian submarine. Since the beginning of the Anglo-French operations against the Dardanelles, French warships in the Adriatic limited their operations to watching the Straits of Otranto, with the idea of preventing any Austrian submarines escaping from the Adriatic, at the head of which is Pola, the Austrian naval base, and reaching Turkey. This patrol duty was particularly necessary to protect the ressels of the Allies operating against the Dardanelles, and in view of the fact that Austria possesses several submarines, whose cruising range sufficient to permit them to travel

from Pola to the Dardanelles.



## When Caught Alone.

Wife of French Officer Writes Detailed Story of German Atrocities-Ill-Treat Old Man.

A Toronto woman has received a letter from the wife of a French officer, giving detailed accounts of the terrible atrocities committed by the Germans in Belgium and Northern. France. Eextracts from the letter are

as follows. "The old men from Vareddes, a parish about 50 kilometres from Paris, were taken to Germany in captivity. Half the parish, nearly, had to go on foot to Germany, being flogged when tired, and not able to walk any more, and fed only once in four days. Some managed to escape and came back to Vareddes. They said that one night they were placed against a wall with arms uplifted, as if on a cross, and had to witness the Germans getting their guns ready to shoot them. They

were fortunately delivered. "They tell me one cannot imagine the sufferings of those left behind. In

"They tell me one cannot imagine the sufferings of those left behind. In Luneville the rabbi and his daughter were burnt alive in the cellar of their home whilst the wife was kept close by to hear their cries.

Liars and Thieves.

"The Germans do not know what honor means. My husband, who captured many prisoners, says he never met with such liars and thieves. They are so proud when in numbers and so cowardly when alone. I wonder what would happen in Europe and the world at large if they should be victorious, but fortunately the Allies are sure of putting them down. The end of it will bring a grand victory for us all.

"My husband is quite daef since he returned from the front. A German shell burst a few yards ahead of him and he was thrown violently to the ground. Everybody thought he was killed, but he was not even wounded. The noise was such, however, that from that time he has not been able to hear a sound. He does not mind that much. He is as merry as ever, saying he is glad to have lost the use of his ears for the sake of the fight for civilization. These last three months he has been superintending the drilling of 19-year-old men, who are now about to start for the front. About a fortnight ago several hundred of these went away to the front, and you cannot imagine how enthusiastic they all were. They adorned their rifles and guns with bouquets, French, English, Belgian, Russian and Serbian flags. 

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
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
