

STANISLAU CAPTURED.

PETROGRAD, Aug. 11. Stanislau, the important railway centre, southeast of Lemberg, the capital of Galicia, has been occupied by Russian troops. The capture of Stanislau is announced in an official statement given out this evening. The troops of General Letchitsky captured Stanislau on Thursday evening, and pursued the Austrians who retreated in the direction of Helicz The Russians have also made important successes in the Sereth region. They compelled the Austro-Germans to retire from the fortified positions of Gliadka and Voroblevsk and have occupied the town of Monasterzyska. The capture of Stanislau has given the Russians another gateway through which they can march toward Lemberg. Like Brody, Stanislau is an important railway centre. Railroads radiate from it in five directions. It is 87 miles southeast of Lemberg, and is situated between two forks of the Bystritza river, 10 miles south of the Dneister. Stanislau was a manufacturing city and an agricultural centre before the war and had a population of 33,000.





THE U. S. RAILWAY CRISIS.

NEW YORK, To-day. Whether the leaders of the 400,000 mployees of the railroads of the ountry will make good their threat country will make good their threat of a general strike unless the demand for an 8 hour day and time and a haif for overtime is granted by the managers of 235 railroad systems, will probably be known to-morrow. The only hope of a peaceful settlement apparently rested to-night upon the possibility that the men might be induced to except a pay form of arbitance. luced to accept a new form of arbi-

FINE RUSSIAN ACHIEVEMENTS. LONDON To-day.

A further series of surprising suc ed to-day by the Russians. The most important of these successes is the capture of the important railway junction town of Stanislau, the definite occupation of Monasterzyska and the seizure of important positions on the Zlota Lipa line. Coupled with these victories was the capture of many thousands of prisoners, especially on the right bank of the Sereth, where the prisoners taken number 5,000.

The Germans appeared to regard the Kovel-Lemberg sector as the most critical on the eastern front. The appointment of Field Marshol Von Hindenburg to the chief command un-doubtedly had the effect of temporarily stemming the Russian advance on the northern section of the line, but Field Marshal Von Hindenburg does not hold controlling command over the troops guarding the southern ap-proaches to Lemberg, where General Letchitzsky has taken Stanislau, be-ing within striking distance of Halicz, and is rapidly completing his encirclement of the army of General Count Von Bothmer. The latter's forces have held obstinately to their positions since last winter and have kept them virtually intact. However, it cannot be long now before the fate of Lemberg is sealed. Military observers believe that the possession of Stanislau and Kolomea makes secure the Russian possession of Bukowina, and gives them a base for the invariant of the control of sion of Hungary. The fall of Halicz which is also regarded as imminent which is also regarded as imminent, would interfere seriously with General Von Bothmer's communications, and would compel him to retire his army along the left bank of the Dneister toward Lemberg, between the Russian forces advancing from the direction of Tarnapol and Brody. The German official statement to-day admitted the regrouping of the Tenselment The German official statement to-day admitted the regrouping of the Teutonic forces taking place in order to meet the new positions of the Russian armies. It is reported that in their perplexity over the situation on the Italian and Galician fronts, the Austrians again have brought troops from Galicia to the Isonzo front in a desperate effort to save the situation there, and Turkish troops have been sent to the Galician front to replace the Austrians.




