Old St. Paul's Chart ard, Trinity, Every time I go i to he old Churchyard in Trinity, prented to give time and energy to careful investigati of the headstones, etc., there, I find something interesting, and often something interesting, and something surprising. For several years I had decided that the stone bearing the date 1748 was the oldest. Then later I found one with the date 1747, and still later, one with the date 1745. This week, however, taking advantage of the Church-yard fencebuilders' pick and shovel, I dug up some other half-buried stones, only to find all my other dates superseder by one perpetuating the death of Jonah Newell, Sr., in 1743.



Dear Sir,-I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of the 10th inst., enclosing copy of resolutions passed at the last meeting of the Regatta Committee.

The resolutions record the follow-(1) That in the opinion of this

Committee, the use of the grounds on Regatta Day shall be as far as possible devoted to purposes immediately connected to the successful carrying out of the Regatta. (2) In the opinion of this Commit-

tee permission to operate wheels of fortune or any like method of obtaining money, shall be granted only to individuals or clubs who are directly concerned with Regatta work.

In reply I may say I am in accord with the Committee's opinion as set forth in the resolutions. The Presidents of the different Boat Clubs have represented to me that they are short of the necessary funds for the purpose of purchasing and outfitting some of the boats necessary to succesfully carry on the Regatta, and I have therefore decided under existing conditions not to grant permission for the running of wheels of fortune cn the course on Regatta Day except to the Presidents of the Boat Clubs applying for same.
