

New Rights for Mothers CONSENT TO MARRIAGE NEEDED.

This is a useful provision, for when the father has vanished or becom mad the only practical way out of the difficulty hitherto/has been to put up the banns. This was a hardship upon Roman Catholics and others whose scruples made them object to a cere-Church of England. And if it happened that the marriage could not stand for instance where one of the parties was going abroad-it could not take

Under the new Act the right of consent is lost in various ways. If the parents are divorced or separated by agreement it goes with the custody of the child. If one deserts the other only the one who is deserted will have it. If both parents are deprived by a court of the custody the right will go to the person whom the custody is committed by the order.

Illegitimate minors have not within recent years required any consent to their marriages as they have no lawful parents. They must henceforth obtain the consent of their mothers.



The population of the country is homogeneous in language, but it is divided into a number of religious and confessional

"There are orthodox Mohammedans, Sunnits, Druses, Izmailets, and Sheeths, and among the Christian population there are Greek Catholics, Maronites, Chaldeans, etc. The French have profited by these divisions in order to split the country into a numger of States-that is to say, selfgoverning units. Each of these States has a constitution and a representative body, whose rights are, however,

One of such States, we are told further, is the country of the Druses, which became self-governing in 1921. Like the rest of the States, it is under the strict control of the French, the French Commissary keeping his residence in its capital, the French garrisons occupying its cities. We read further in the same paper that-

"In spite of the rudeness of the military administration, and in spite of mistakes made by the French officials, for the most part men taken from the French colonies in Africa, General Gouraud was on the whole a good pacificator, especially as he respected the religious susceptibilities and prejudices of the population.

"The same, however, cannot be said of General Sarrail, who replaced him in the spring of this year, and who has already provoked the dissatisfaction not only of the Arab Nationalsts, but also of the hitherto pro-French elements of Lebanon. General Sarrail is an anti-clerical and a Radical. He is of the opinion that one should put an end to the old prejudices in Syria. He began his reformatory activities by proclaiming a lay programme for the schools of the ountry from which all religious eduation was henceforth to be excluded This raised a storm of indignation.





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

Segregation of Germs

MILLIONS OF THEM CAN PLAY TAG ON HEAD OF PIN.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Sept. 25-Bacteriologists tell us that there are germs so small that a million of them could play tag on the head of a pin and still have plenty of room to grow and raise families," declared Dr. Hugh S. Cumming, surgeon general United States Public Health Bureau, recently. .A germ is a rather large germ when it would require a mere four or five thousand bunched together to be

The germ of bubonic plague is of fairly large organism. It takes only about forty thousand of them laid side by side to make an inch. It requires bout sixty-five million typhoid bacfli a drop of anti-typhoid vaccine.

A porcelain filter will strain out such germs as these, but there are disease germs so infinitely small that inder a little pressure they pass through the closely grained porcelain filters with the same ease that gnat flies through an open window. Germs are known by a wide variety

of names such as bacteria, bacilli, coci. viboris and so on. Each group of germs has its spec

Germs are so small that the indi viduals are as clear as crystal and you might examine a drop of water teeming with thousands of germs and not be able to see them with a powerspecial treatment. In order to make the invisible the bacteriologist puts

amining a specimen of sputum for tuberculosis. He smears a piece of glass with the sputum and drops on several kinds of chemical stains. When these stains are dry the tuberculosis germs stand out under the microscope as beautiful red rods in a blue background.

Different kinds of germs take differen' kinds of stains, blue, red, green, violet or brown. By this fortunate discovery, the bacteriologist is often able to look through his mocroscope and tell at a glance what kind of germs he is dealing with, but staining alone is not sufficient to identify many germs.

There are certain germs for which identification methods have not yet been worked out, such as for instance, the germs of smallpox, scarlet fever and measles. No one has as yet seen these germs, not even with the

most powerful microscopes. One of the aims of those at work in the germ laboratory is to find out what kind of drugs or anto-toxins harmless to human beings will kill the germs so that when a person comes down sick with a germ disease he may be given a medicine that will not harm him but one which will kill the disease germs in his body. It is even possible to administer renedies that will prevent the disease

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

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
