GASPE BASIN.

Early on Thursday morning we rounded Cape Gaspe, the most easterly point in Lower Canada, a bold bluff headland, ramparted by precipitous rocks. It is a lonely spot, Around the cape and for many miles back and along the river the hills which here reach a considerable height, are covered with trees, which however are dwarfed by the poor soil and inhospitable climate. On rounding the cape the steamer makes for Gaspe Basin, a fine sheet of water many miles wide at the entrance but which gradually nar rows till it is reduced to the proportions of a creek. The sail up this Basin is delightful. On the north shore the slopes are dotted with the fashermen's cottages, surrounded by little patches of grain and vegetables, while on the water you can count dozens of boats, the men hauling in one line as fast as they throw out another, and in nine cases out of ten a good sized fish at the end of it. We know no healthier or prettier watering place than this remote corner of the world, and some day it may be Gaspe Basin will become as fashionable a resort as Cacouna or Tadousac. Having left the mail at the quiet little village at the head of the Bay we steamed out again, and soon pass a wonderful arched rock which stands out some distance from Perce, another port of call further south. This rock rises sheer out of the water to a height of more than a hundred feet, and its flat top is covered with hundreds of cormorants and sea gulls. A huge natural arch stands at one side of this stupendous rock, which has been formed by the ceaseless action of the waves or by some long past volcanic agency. Soon we pass the beautiful island of Bonaventure, from four to five miles long and about a mile wide. It is inhabited solely by fishermen, who also cuttivate most of the land, which is of excellent quality. The face of the island on the western side forms one unbroken and gentle slope to the water edge, but on the eastern side it presents a range of rugge

SHEDIAC AND PICTOU.

After retracing our course down the river and clearing the bar, our steamer directed its course for Shediac. We passed through the straits of Northumberland, which divide New Brunswick from Prince Edward Island. Sometimes the straits are pretty rough, but on this trip the weather was calm, and the steamer ploughed her way through the water with scarcely a wave to ruffle its surface. Indeed all through the trip the weather was most favorable. Not a single passenger was sick for an hour, and every meal was punctually attended to with appetites sharpened by the invigorating sea precze. We reached Shediac, or rather Point du Chene, early on Saturday morning, for the town of Shediac is situated three miles inland from the point to where the European and North American Railway extends, which connects the place with St. John. Here a number of our passengers, who were proceeding to St. John left us, and our steamer's course was then directed to Picton, where ended for the south shore between those two points the land presented the same appearance. No bold headland rose to attract the stranger's eye. From our point of observation we could see nothing but wide stretches of forest with intervening spots of cultivated land. To the north east lay Prince Edward Island, but too far off for us to discern anything save the dim outline of its shores. We reached Pictou on Saturday evening after a most pleasant voyage of four days, and left the Gaspe, after bidding a kindly good by to its excellent and obligning Captain.

THE TRISH CHURCH COMMISSION We were informed a few days ago that the Royal Commissioners who had been ordered by the Queen to en-quire into the condition and working of the Irish Church Establishment, had made their report to Parliament They recommended that all Episcopal sees and cathedral establishments in Ireland, with the exception of eight, should be abolished, and that there should be maintained on reduced incomes. They also reported in favor of measures to encourage tenants under on Tuesday by a majority of 26. At the close of the poll the vote stood—for the by-law, 72; against it, 46. perpetuity, and to enable landholders, the payment of tithes and rentcharges, to eventually redeem and re gain possession of their lands. Such is the report, and what is there in it? Will it give satisfaction to either the friends or foes of the Irish Church? It is merely an effort on the part of the Commission to effect a compromise tween contending parties without asking if they are willing to make con cessions or knowing if they will agree to those that have been made in their name. The Church must be assailed, but not destroyed, and tenants must be encouraged, not accorded full and immediate justice. But one point has been settled by this enquiry, namely, the untenable position of the Irish es tablishment as it is at present. To recommend a reduction in the number of sees is simply to assert that there is wrong in the existence of the institution. Had there been no real evil no amount of popular clamour should have induced a recommendation of laying a rude finger on what has so long been held to be the National Church of Ireland.

Mr. Disraeli hoped much from this report, and now that he has got it, what will he make of it? He and his followers, or at least the High Church Tories and Gladstone Oppositionists, denounce the proposition conveyed in it, we are told, and assert that if carried into effect it will be a direct vio lation of the Act of Union perfected between Great Britain and Ireland in the year 1800, by the fifth article of which the Churches of England and Ireland, as then by law established, were united in one Protestant Episcopal Church, to be called the United Church of England and Ireland, the conmanance and preservation of which was to be deemed and taken as an essential and fundamental part of the Union. Such is the argument urged with vehemence by the friends of Distracial and the Irish Church, while we are informed that their opponents think the sanction of the report by Parliament, and the shaping of its recommendation into legislative form, will constitute a very ample measure of justice to the people of Ireland.—The latter assertion may be doubted, for it is very questionable if the Opposition, while so powerful, and so strongly sustained by popular feeling, will agree to any half measures. 


