Fire on the Elora Road.

At about ten o'clock this morning Mrs.
Maddock, who lives on the west side o
the Elora Road, two doors south of MeTague street, having occasion to go from

Immediately the c'arm was raised, and the whole the meantime word had been sent to the fire department; and Messrs. J. M. Bond & Co. had despatched a fire extinguisher to the scene. Besides the assistance rendered by the neighbors, this was the only force at hand to resust the flames, which spread rapidly to both sheds, the wind blowing from the east around the corners of the houses and through the passage-way between. Shortly after ten o'clock the engine was steaming northward, accompanied by an immense crowd of curious citizens. The hose followed a long way in the rear, being impeded in its progress by the fractious horses that had been seized in the "hot haste," and fastened to the cart. The continual tinkling of the bell,—which serves in times of peace as an ornament to the hose-cart,—fightened the excited animals so that they did nothing but dance and frantically endeavor to be released from their misery. Some ardent citizens, seeing the state of affairs, and knowing that the hose was indispensable when a stream of water was required, kindly lent their aid to "help the thing along," and in this way the corner of London Road and Elora Road was reached. Here the engine had stopped, and after some time the hose was attached, and a stream sent along to extinguish the flames. It was about halfpast ten before this stream was in perfect operation, but it smothered what fire had been left burning by the little extinguisher, which had done excellent service in confining the flames to the shed, leaving the houses proper with only a singe. At about eleven o'clock the hose was own would up on the eart, and the men who had taken command of it returned, accompanied by the engine.

Both houses were insured, so that there will be little loss beside that sustained by damage to the furniture, which must be considerable, as almost every article in Mr. Maddock's house was carried into the street. Had it not been that the high wind was blowing from the east, nothing could have saved the frame houses from total destruction.

What we find fault with is the policy of the Government in regard to Canadian manufactures. Most of our manufacturers, we think would have been satisfied with a protective duty of twenty-five, or at least twenty per cent, but the Government instead of following this course, have simply increased the duty from 15 to 162 per cent—an advance so small as practically to be of very little service. This, we suppose, was granted on the principle that half a loaf is better than no bread, but the slight advantage conferred on the manufacturers of certain articles, such as musical instruments, sewing machines, &c., is more than counterbalanced by the additional duty imposed on articles which they have to import, and which enter largely into the manufacture of their goods. The Government in this matter have shown a want of consideration, and we shall be greatly surprised if the manufacturers interested do not bring their grevances before the Finance Minister ere this matter is finally settled.

The objection, which was made at an early stage of the proceedings, was supported by the Lord Chief Justice, and was supposed to have been acquised in by the representatives of the Treasury present. Cheese Exported.—During the past year, from January 1st, 1873, to January 1874, the exportations of American cheese have been the largest ever known, amounting in round numbers to 104,009,000 pounds. And yet with this immense exportation, and the increased production of cheese in the States and in Canada over former years, the markets both in Europe and America have never been more closely cleaned out, or short of American chese than at present. This state of things makes it obvious that the new make of cheese going upon a bare market will command good prices, especially if the quality of the goods be unexceptional in "meat and flavor."—Farmer's Advocate.

A BY-LAW for the purpose of providing for the erection of a new Town Hall and Market House in the Town of Guelph, and for the issue of Twenty five thousand dollars of Debentures

WHEREAS, it is expedient to erect a new Town Hall and Market House in the Town of Guelph required for the use of the Corporation of the said Town, and on land belonging to the Corporation.


And wherea, the amount of the whole rateable property of the municipality of the Town of Guelph, irrespective of any future ircome thereef, and irrespective of any increase in the nature of tolls, interest or dividends, or returns from the said work; and also, irrespective of any interest from the temporary investment of the sinking fund or principal money to be raised hereunder, or any part thereof, was according to the last revised Assessment Roll \$2,099,100.

And wherea, the existing debt, includ-

And whereas, the existing debt, includ-ing debentures issued for Municipal Loan Fund debt of the said municipality is for principal, the sum of one hundred and seventeen thousand seven hundred and nine dollars, and for interest the sum of

nil dollars.

And whereas, it is intended to make the said debt repayable in twenty annual instalments, such instalments to be of such amounts that the aggregate amount payable for principal and interest in any year shall be equal as nearly as may be to what is payable for principal and interest during each of the other years of such period, such instalments to be as follows:—

And whereas, His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Ontaric, by and with the sanction of his Council, hath consented to and approved of this By-law.

And whereas, this By-law hath been duly assented to by the electors of the municipality before the final passing thereof according to law.

And whereas, a copy of this By-law with due notice hath been duly published according to law.

Be it therefore enacted, by the Corporation of the Town of Guelph aforesaid, by the Council thereof, by and with the assent of the electors aforesaid, and the consent and approval of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Ontario in Council, and by virtue of the Acts of Parliament in that behalf, as follows:—

the Acts of Parliament in that behalf, as follows:—

1.—That it shall be lawful for the Mayor of the said town of Grelph for the time being, and he is hereby authorized, empowered, and required to raise by way of loan, from any person or persons, body or bodies corporate, who may be willing to advance the same upon the credit of the Debentures hereinafter meationed the sum of Twenty-five thousand dollars, and to cause the same to be paid into the hands of the Treesurer of the Town of Guelph for the purpose and with the object above receted.

2.—That it it shall be lawful for the said Mayor, and he is hereby authorized and required to cause Debentures to be made for such sums of money as may be required, not exceeding in the whole the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars, and

signed by the said Treasurer.

3.—That the said Debentures shall be made peyable in twenty years, by instalments as aforesaid, at the office of the Treasurer of the said municipality, and shall have attached to them coupons for the payment of interest, which interest shall also be payable at the office of the said Treasurer.

4.—That the said Debentures shall bear interest at and after the rate of ix per cent, per annum from the date thereof, and the same shall be payable half yearly.

5.—That for the purpose an equal special rate of one and a tenth mills in the dollar shall in addition to all other rates, be raised, levied and collected in each year upon all the ratesable property in the said municipality during the contunuance of the said Debentures or any of them.
