Town and County News

NEW GROCERY STORE.—Messrs. Loch & Weir will open their new store in McQuillan's new block, Upper Wyndham Street, with a first stock of groceries and liquors, on Saturday. They are both energetic young men, and we bespeak for them a liberal share of public patronage.

NEW BANK FOR GUELPH.—Arrangements are at present being made for the establishment of an agency of the Federal Bank in this town. A deputation was here on Saturday, and have made arrangements with Mr. Hazelton to have one of his stores on Upper Wyndham Street, fitted up for offices, subject to the pleasure of the Directors. It will be a month before the building can be got ready for their reception, after which business will most likely be commenced immediately.

LOCKNOX CURIOUS CLUB.—The annual meeting of the Locknox Curious Club was held in the Council Chamber on Saturday last, the 14th inst., when the following officers were elected for the ensuing year. IMPORTANT EXPERIMENT WITH CANADIAN ORES.—It has been known for a year or more that an extensive deposit of specular iron ore exists on the Haycock property, in the township of Hill and Templeton, opposite Ottawa. Some few days since a quantity of these ores were, at the Siemens furnace of the Nashua Steel and Iron Company, Nashua, N. H., smelted with charcoal in crucibles direct into ingots, one operation saving for the whole. Last week one of these ingots was, at the Moisie Iron Works, in Ottawa, heated in the usual way, and, without the use of the steam hammer, rolled direct into bars of different sizes. The ingot, on fracture, showed a very fine steel-like grain; the bars, however, on being broken, had in every way the appearance of the very finest Sheffield steel. Experiments were then made with the bars. Cold chisels were applied, and under the hammer the bars were readily drawn out without flaw. These bars were produced, it will be noticed, in two operations—a most important result, since, it is well known, in order to make ordinary cast steel, the metal must undergo various expensive processes.

CHALMERS' CHURCH SOCIAL.—On Tuesday evening a very pleasant social was held in the basement of Chalmers' Church. London, Nov. 18.—It is reported that Gen. Lazerna, the commander of the Republican army in the north of Spain, is dead. A despatch to the Standard from Hendaye reports that military operations are suspended on account of the weather.

Madrid, Nov. 18.—It is reported that Count Daru had an interview with President MacMahon, and promised him the support of the right with the exception of a dozen extremists.

London, Nov. 18.—Five Yarmouth fishing crafts have been missing since the recent gale, and are believed to be lost with all on board, upwards of thirty persons.

An official statement is published contradicting recent reports of the unsatisfactory progress of recruiting for the British army.

Mr. Disraeli has written a letter to Sir Henry Rawlinson, announcing that the Government, in consequence of the representation of the Royal Geographical Society and other learned bodies, has determined to organize a Polar exploring expedition without delay.

A Berlin despatch to the Times says, a letter from Prince Henri Reuss, the German ambassador at St. Petersburg, on the policy of Germany towards Russia, in the opinion of the documents which Count Von Arnim is requested to surrender. His disappearance adds to the mystery of the affair.

Berlin, Nov. 18.—The North German Gazette, semi-official, refers to Mr. Disraeli's recent denial, that certain allusions in his (Gladstone's) speech were applications in the Von Arnim affair, and says the explanation is gratifying to all who are desirous of preventing misunderstanding between England and Germany.

Cincinnati, Nov. 18.—The express robbers have finally confessed where the plunder was secreted, and late last night it was found, secreted in the woods some distance north of the city. It is believed to be nearly if not quite all recovered.

It declares that no one can become a convert to Rome without renouncing moral and mental freedom, and placing civil loyalty and duty at the mercy of another. The Estimates.

The Opposition were completely taken aback on Monday, when Mr. Brooks laid the Estimates for 1875 on the table of the House.

As will be seen by the summary below, the greatest decrease is in the expenditure for public works and public buildings.




