NEW YORK STOCKS. New York, April 29.—The pronounced weakness of European markets caused by reports of Austria's belated attitude toward Montenegro was of direct influence on the home market, where prices were depressed sharply today. Many of the important stocks made new low records for the year. Pressure was heaviest against the international stocks, particularly Canadian Pacific, which slumped seven points. Steel, the Harriman, Reading and Amalgamated displayed marked weakness.

Chicago, April 29.—Wheat displayed nervousness today under several conflicting influences. A net loss of 1 1/2 to 1 3/8 was recorded. Corn suffered a net decline of a shade to 1/4, but oats, which were 1 1/2 to 1 3/8 higher, were 1/4 to 1/2 higher. The market continued to reflect absence of demand and susceptibility to pressure. Prices broke sharply in the early trading. American stocks in London, which had shown general advances, weakened abruptly before the opening here and some of the early selling in this market was for foreign. Before the market was for the first time, the close of wheat trading caused selling was resumed culminating in a sharp decline during the last hour, which forced the market to the low point of the session. The trading appeared to be chiefly in the nature of bear pressure.

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LONDON STOCKS.

MODERN CURE FOR INSANITY.

Treating the "Insane" as Sane to Make Them Really Sane.
New York, April 28.—Alarmed by the rapid and steady increase of insanity in the United States the authorities are now studying the methods pursued in Europe, where they have been able to cope with the situation far more satisfactorily than is the case in America.

Authorities Insane Themselves
Perhaps the most serious factor in the situation, however, is the fact that the authorities have not yet entirely displaced the old idea that the only function of the insane hospital is to confine and restrain, whereas all modern authorities agree that the more useful use of the hospital is to treat the inmates.

So much are early marriages the custom that the girls themselves think that to pass the age of 17 unmarried is disgraceful.

In connection with the Robertson College training school for ministers in Edmonton, the Women's Guild of that city have agreed to furnish a part of the college, and requests that Calgary and Lethbridge also contribute to the furnishing. But for this college eleven mission stations would be minus religious instruction of any kind.

Another excellent piece of work being done by the Presbyterian church is the building of hospitals where the lamentably ignorant Ruthenians are cared for by the aid of a skilled surgeon and certified nurses. At present the people themselves consider that the water in which a black cat has been drowned is an excellent wash for most sores.

FRUIT DEALER IS ANXIOUS TO ESTABLISH WHOLESALE FRUIT MARKET IN CALGARY

Mr. Fee, of the Vernon Fruit company, is very anxious that a wholesale market be obtained in Calgary. The city is close to the Okanagan district, and such a market, built on the C.P.R. line, would be a splendid unloading place for fruit and vegetables without their being held back in trucks as happens at present, costing a dollar per day for each car, several dollars for ice, besides the damage to the fruit itself through being jostled and kept in such a market, too would bring not only the retailer closer to the producer, but the consumer closer to the market, and the wholesaler wishing a case of apples could, by going to the market, obtain them at first cost. "Then," added Mr. Fee, "the correct prices could not be kept from the public. I used to publish my prices in The Herald, but the retailers resented it, and to keep my trade I was forced to put such prices on a sliding scale."

Mr. Fee believes that a wholesale market would give a fair price to the producer, an equal profit to the retailer, since his expenses would be greatly decreased, and a greater profit for the consumer to pay. Although the scheme was Mr. Fee's own idea, he has received the wholehearted support of the men in town. When the City Market did not succeed, Mr. Fee stated that he applied to the mayor for permission to take it over for fruit, but he received no answer to his offer. If better managed, Mr. Fee says the city could have made it a success. But he added that the proposed wholesale market would almost insure a retail market also.

Explaining to the Home Economics committee of the Local Council of Women in the library yesterday, Mr. Fee pointed out some reasons why fruit is so high in Calgary. The first fault, he said, lies with the consumers themselves, who often run monthly bills or longer, instead of paying cash. For cash, he said, any merchant in town would be willing to give 10 per cent. interest.

Madam Anderson stated that she had asked four merchants for discounts on their fruit, but they had refused. She said she had done this for eight years. On first coming to town she had received interest, but now, with more competition, prices were up 40 per cent. and no discount could be had. Mr. Fee, continuing, stated the matter should be taken up by the council, and returning to his argument, spoke of the cost of books, bookshelves, and clerks. The present system, he said, though not an ideal one, was preferred by the present because there was no strong enough to step aside from it. He owned that prices were too high, but urged that from seven wholesale places in town, eighteen crates would be sent forth, making in all \$14.00 per month. Here again the market would be of use, as retailers would buy direct.

Recalls Time When Indians Held Sun Dances Where Yale Hotel Now Stands
N. Hanson, Calgary Old Timer, Who Has Just Sold a Ranch Property for a Fortune, Talks of the Days When the Town was Young
"Completing a deal with an English syndicate whereby he disposes of his ranch at Wesa, B.C., for \$170,000, N. Hanson, one of the best-known old-timers in Western Canada, sat in the city a guest at the Alberta hotel.
Mr. Hanson first came to Calgary in 1884, at which time he was a boarding-house contractor among the Canadian Pacific construction camps. He was in this city by the advent of the railroad and followed the construction work through the mountains, finally locating on the ranch which he has just disposed of. This ranch is located on the Kootenay Central road, and is one of the best ranches in the famous fruit district of British Columbia.
"There's a big difference in the Calgary of 1884 and the Calgary of 1913," said Mr. Hanson yesterday. "I don't think even the most optimistic of us ever looked for the wonderful growth that has marked Calgary, and that will continue to be part of this city for many years to come."
Mr. Hanson began to discuss old days in Calgary with a group of old-timers. Stories of the days when the Indians held sun dances on the spot where the Yale Hotel now stands; of the time when the Indians and cow-boys raced down what is now Eighth Avenue; of the old-timers who have gone and many who are still here, were told and a real old-timers talk-fest resulted.
Now that Mr. Hanson has made his plans for the future, he is going to Cranbrook, B.C., where he already has some large holdings, and to settle down there.
"I like Calgary and the prairies," he said, "but I like the Cranbrook district and all my friends are there now. There are very few old-timers of 1884 left in Calgary, and all the friends of my later years are in Cranbrook and around there, so I'll settle down there now."

HUDSON BAY ENGINEER SAYS THAT NEW ROAD WILL BE A GREAT BOON
W. A. Cumberland, one of the engineers of the Hudson Bay Railway, was in Calgary yesterday and gave some account of the great boon which the new road would be to the west. It would mean that the great west would be brought a thousand miles nearer Liverpool than at present and the long haul from Winnipeg was by way of the transshipment at the head of the lakes would be removed.

These were the lowest tenders in such case, and they were over \$14,000 lower than any of the others offered.

ASSOCIATED CHARITIES CARES FOR HELPLESS INVALID IMMIGRANT
Gabinet Hybenhang, a German immigrant, who has been in the country but a little over two months now lies in a precarious condition in his home in the city, unable to help himself, and a little child of 4, whom he brought out with him from the Fatherland to improve their condition. Shortly after the arrival of the man here he fell in alighting from a street car and so injured his back that he now lies helpless as a child, unable to do any thing and with no prospect of ever working again.
Matters went from worse to worse and the poor family had nothing to do but weep. Some neighbors called the attention of the associated charities and on the arrival of the assistant secretary, R. W. McDougall, he found the man lying helpless on a board with no bed in the room and in a pitiable state from want of proper care and nourishment. The Associated Charities has now taken the case in hand and it is an exceedingly hard one to deal with, as the poor man will never be on his feet again and able to work. It is hoped that something may be done to alleviate the distress of the home.
