LARGE AND BRILLIANT GATHERING AT GOVERNMENT HOUSE.

YEN'S LATEST PROGNOSTICATIONS.
MONTREAL, Jan. 18.—YEN'S LATEST PROGNOSTICATIONS.—There are indications of the approach of a storm period of considerable force, which there is likely to sweep over a large portion of this continent, and possibly Europe, between the 20th and 25th inst. The storm will probably be marked by general gales and by snow or rain storms, according to locality. The sea will be very rough, and the seaboard likely to suffer, also the other seaboard cities of the Middle States. The temperature will not likely be lowered. Snow storms are likely to occur in Great Britain, accompanied by severe gales. There may be cold weather with snow in the extreme south about the 24th and 25th.

WESTERN SALE.
Some lots in Dr. Schultz and Dr. Bown's property in Niagara were sold at Coast & Co.'s yesterday, but the competition was not brisk. The prices for the Westborne lots were being satisfactory they were withdrawn and the sale closed.

SIX YEARS AGO.
