THE COST OF A CABLE.

It should be remembered that a private individual could purchase and lay an Atlantic cable for little more than one-half what some recent companies have been compelled to disburse. It is quite certain that the mere cost of manufacture nowa-days need not amount to £100 per miles days need not amount to £100 per mile, and it is quite possible for anyone possessing command of say £400,000 to lay such a cable possessing all the latest improvements, and to find himself at the end of the operation possessed of a sufficiency of working capital. But the company which lays a cable across the Atlantic has to provide a capital of half as much again to cover promoters' charges and so forth.

Though the combination claim to have nine cables in working working order it is more than doubted if they have half that more than doubted if they have half that number. There are only two really reliable wires, the Direct and the French, beth of which were examined by electricians as well as metal experts during the process of manu-facture. Every suspected piece was con-demned and new wire put in its place. The demned and new wire put in its place. The result is these wires are always in good working order. I have the authority of a gentleman thoroughly posted for the statement that not more than four of the wires are ever working or to be depended on. The Gould cables were not inspected and are almost worthless. Instead of letting them into the gool Pender should have kept them out and their sales would have given out. Collingwood, Sept. 27—The adjourned inquiry before Capt. Scott, R. N., was opened this morning at 9 o'clock. The first witness called was Mr. Adam Dodgeon, mayor of Collingwood, who for twenty years was engaged in ship building. He years was engaged in ship building. He has also had considerable experience as a sailor.
