POSTPONEMENT OF HISTRIAL TILL

OTTAWA, May 1-Frederick Mann, before the assize court at L'Orignal. A true bill was returned against him. The attendance of spectators was very large, and when the boy murderer appeared in the dock, his innocent looking countenance enlisted for him a certain amount of sympathy, but as the blood-curdling charges in the indict-ment were read, recollections of the terrible

While reading the indictment, the clerk's voice at a few points was inaudible to Mann, and he cooly ordered the charges to be read louder and to all of them he pleaded "not guilty."

On the case being called by Judge Senkler, Mr. J. Maxwell, a lawyer of L'Orignal, who has undertaken to defend the prisoner, made application for a postponement of the trial until the next assizes. His grounds were the absence of two material witnesses for the defence, Amelia Hale, eldest sister of the prisoner, who lives in Tewksbury, England, and Wm. Cooke, who was almost fatally assaulted by Mann with an axe at the time the latter was perpetrating his awful butchery. Mr. Maxwell also set up the plea of hereditary insanity on the father's side and stated that he desired to have the prisoner further examined by a medical expert:

Dr. Buck, superintendent of the äsyltim at London, Ont., was to have been present, but could not attend. Dr. Howard of Longus Point, a very material witness to the defence, the counsel said was subposed but could not attend, owing to indisposition. Counsel for defence read two affidavits made by Amelia Hale and Mary Ann Matin, mother of the prisoner, the substance of both of which were similar. It was set forth in the sworn statements that Frederick Mann was subject to hereditary insanity. When two years of age he was statesked with snallpox, from the effects of which disease he has since suffered severely in the head. At the age of 11 he was apprenticed to a baker at Tewkesbury, and on March 30, 1877, while delivering bread the horse ran away and he was thrown violently to the ground from the cart. He suvtained a serious fracture of the skull. The surgeon who dressed his head remarked that it would have been better for the unfortunate boy had the accident proved fatal. Sarah Mann had one brother, who died in a lunstic asylum. A neice of Amelia Hale has been confined in an insane asylum for nine years

Another neice attempted to commit suicide at the age of 16, and is at present in a home at Bristol. Mrs. Moore, the wife of a barrister at Tewkesbary, has written that she frequently heard complaints from Mann's mother about his strange conduct, and after the accident to his head she stated he seemed a great deal worse. Bev. Mr. Robson, vicar of Tewkesbury, has also written to the same effect as Mrs. Moore.

PRICE ONE CENT ACQUITTED BUT HELD.

THE PHENIX PARK CAR DRIVER FOUND NOT GUILTY,

Failure of the Informers' Evidence to Com-nect Him With the Murders—An Elo-quent Address for the Defence.

Dublin, May 1 .- Fitzharris, charged Phonix park murders, has been acquitted No witnesses were called by the defence The evidence against Fitzharris was tha ried, and two children have been the issue of this marriage. Mr. McLennan, Q. C., for the plaintiff, argues that although the defendant married the first wife in Detroit in 1870, that his domicile of origin still adhered, and that this was therefore a Canadian marriage. The divorce obtained in St. Louis in 1877, he argued was obtained by fraud, inasmuch as the desertion by the wife, charged; was untrue; and moreover that a foreign court had no right to dissolve a Canadian marriage except for grounds good in Canada.

The evidence against Fitzharris was that given by the informers. He was besides identified by independent witnesses, who swore they saw him in the park on May 6. McInerney made an eloquent address for the defence. He stated the accusation that the prisoner was in the park with a knowledge of the errand of the murderers rested on the evidence of the informers alone. He said although Peter Carey swore the prisoner recommed the circumstances of the murders to ohim, his narrative of the association differed from ascertained facts. He closed with a pathetic appeal to the jury to restore the poor man to his starving family with the good name which was his sole possession.

dence had been adduced to show the pris-oner was aware of the plot against Mr. Burke before May 5. The earlier meetings which he attended were held to plot against the life of Mr. Forster, and had no connec-tion with the present charge. It was clear that Fitzharris was in the park when the murders occurred, but if the jury doubted that he was guilty of the knowledge of the mission of the mea he drove, they were bound to acquit him.

After the verdict had been rendered, Fitzharris was taken to jail to await trial on a supplementation.
