SUFFERING AND FAMINE IN THE FLOODED DISTRICTS.

The Situation Recomes More Alarming— Congress Votes Assistance—Painful In-cidents of the Calamity—Heavy Rains

flood began. The stage of high water last year was passed at 1 p.m. There has been a steady and hard rain during the greater steady and hard rain during the greater part of the day. A still more dangerous flood will be upon the already unfortunate people of the Ohio valley. The rate of rise increased this afternoon to an inch an hour, and during the hour from five to six, three-quarters of an inch. It is hardly possible to give any idea of the situation. The water is but a little more than 600 feet from the Burnett house. From there to the river bank, the proper distance is between three and four squares. All that can be seen is the street inundated and boats gliding in all directions. Manufactories are stopping and men are thrown tories are stopping and men are thrown out of employment. In Newport it is esti-mated that from 5000 to 6000 people are homeless, and their supplies were exhausted at noon. Many went without supper tonight because the supplies of the relief committee were exhausted. At 7 p.m. the

THE CARNIVAL SHARKS. But is Bounced by a Large Majority-Championed by Labouchere. HOW STRANGERS WERE GOUGED

Extortion Practised by all Classes of Citizens—Something to Remember the City by—An Interesting Letter.

AND SWINDLED AT MONTREAL,

MONTREAL, Feb. 9.—The commercial netropolis of the dominion closed its eyes co-night on its great carnival; but there is guiltiness about it that will not easily be orgotten, especially by the visitors from a listance. The carnival, in so far as the attractions themselves was concerned, was in every way a success. The ice palace was a sight ever to be remembered and the procession of snowshoers around the mountain was the grandest thing of its kind ever witnessed. But what of all these magnificent features when your thousands of American and Canadian visitors return of American and Canadian visitors return home disgusted with the amount of extor-tion that they ran against. The worst "brace" game of faro bank or the bucketshop in the Mail building cannot compare to the skin game practiced all this week on the people who flocked here, and who were prepared to pay well for their fun, but not to be fleeced right and left by a gang of

to be neeced right and lett by a gain or sharks.

The result of all the fleecing will be that Montreal has killed the goose that laid the golden egg. With one or two exceptions the hotel men stood as deep in the goage as any one. The coachmen, restauranters, barbers, people with rooms to rent, the saloons, and in taet any one that had any kind of a commodity to offer the city full of "suckers" took a prominent part. I could name a dozen Toronto gentlemen, who with their wives or a daughter or a son, were tolled five dollars per night for lodgings in remote localities. As an instance I will mention that on Wednesday I sent a friend of mine to an address on St. Catherine street to secure lodgings day I sent a friend of mine to an address on St. Catherine street to secure lodgings for three gentlemen. The lady shark of the house said that in view of its coming on to the end of the week she would accommodate us for six dollars per night each. But the hackmen! I never saw or heard of so much kicking on the street cor-ners as I did this week. Men from whom the ickus were demanding three or four the jehus were demanding three or four times their legal fare were to be seen every times their legal fare were to be seen everywhere. A barber on St. James' street demanded fifty cents from me for a shave and a sea foam (the price in Toronto is 20 or 25 cents). I remonstrated, but I had to pay it. The restantants jumped their rates away up within the bounds of extortion, and the fare offered was of a very indifferent nature. The sole object of the residents apparently was to fleece the visitors out of their last cent.

BRADLAUGH SWEARS HIMSELF IN. SHARPEST THIS SESSION.

LONDON, Feb. 11.-Henry Labouchere and Thomas Burt accompanied Bradlaugh to the table in the house of commons day. There Bradlaugh administered the oath to himself and placed and signed a oath to himself and placed and signed a paper on the table, bowing as he did so to the speaker. The latter informed Bradlaugh that he had not conformed to the rules and ordered him to withdraw until his conduct had been considered by the house. Bradlaugh withdrew under the peers gallery. Gladstone made no motion whereupon Sir Stafford Northcote moved that Bradlaugh be not permitted to take the oath. The motion was carried by a vote of 280 to 167.

Prier to the division on Sir Stafford Northcote's motion, Gladstone said he

Prior to the division on Sir Stafford Northcote's motion, Gladstone said he could not deviate from the course which he had previously pursued. His opinion had not changed. It was not the duty of the executive again and again to dispute the decision of the house.

Mr. Labouchere opposed the motion of Sir Stafford Northcote, and expressed contempt for any form of cath, which he declared was superstitious incantation and sanctimonious sophistry. This hypocrisy he said was being exposed, and it was his opinion Bradlaugh would ultimately win. When Bradlaugh left the house he was received with mingled hisses and cheers by the assembled crowd. The law officers of the government have been instructed to prosecute him immediately for voting three times in the house yesterday. Bradlaugh will defend the action. In the meantime he will not resign his seat.

> The Dentist and His Position The question was asked of the New lork Sun why a dentist is not held in as high regard as a physician. It seems that over the way there is some repugnance toward the knights of the forceps.

It was probably due in the first place to the circumstance that the dentists, as a class, were not men of liberal professional education. Of old, physicians did the tooth pulling; and when the business was indertaken by a separate class of men, they usually brought to it mechanical skill rather than scientific knowledge. Even as dentistry became a more complicated act, and its field was extended, it did not soon develop into a regular profession for which men received a preparatory training like that of physicians. They picked up the art, and learned what they learned by experience at the dentists' chair.

Accordingly they were not regarded as elonging to a learned profession, and did not receive the corresponding consideration. That was so, though many of them were skilful and enthusiastic in their devotion to their calling, and brought to it great intelligence, and gave it much scientific study. Such men laid the foundations of what has now become the profession of dentistry, and is unquestionably entitled to be so called.


