AN IMPORTANT DECISION IN THE DURBAN CASE

Before Judge Moran yesterday a verdict was reached in the now celebrated Durban horse betting case.

Certain amounts were wagered on Durban last summer. John Linton bet \$100 with James A. Young on Durban against the field; Alexander R. Carmichael bet \$25 and Michael Clancy \$75 on the same terms.

There being only rumors about the alleged crookedness of the race, and on the advice of his lawyer, Moskop paid the money into court. His Honor gave judgment yesterday solely as to the legality of the wager, and did not consider whether the race was square or not.

This ruling was in favor of Linton, Clancy and Carmichael and against Young. The statute of Queen Anne was quoted. The bet fell within this which permits a party losing money at a game to recover it by paying into court.

This ruling demonstrates that any stakeholder may pay over the amount of the wager to the winner solely at his pleasure. And the legal question arises: When the stakeholder pays over to the winner, how would the loser get back his?
