TO FOUND A LABOR COLONY.

HOUSE OF INDUSTRY DIRECTORS TAKE THE INITIATIVE.

The Directors Claim That They Have Been Misrepresented and That They Have Paid Out Nearly Ten Thousand Dollars In Addition To What They Have Received From the City.

The annual meeting of the House of Industry Board was held in the board-room yesterday afternoon with Mr. Samuel Alcorn in the chair.

There were present Revs. A. J. Brough, A. Williams, John Gillespie, Alex. Gilroy, A. H. Baldwin, Messrs R. Gilmore, James Scott, A. MacMurphy, John Ball, T. H. Luce, J. H. Paterson, Henry O'Hara, James Turnbull, James J. Murphy and H. T. Brown.

The Treasurer's report showed that the receipts for the year ending April 1, 1894, were \$28,853.58, and the expenditures were \$27,872.30, including an overdraft balance from last year of \$34,775.84. This leaves a balance on hand of \$881.28.

Principal MacMurphy, in presenting the report of the casual ward committee, again brought up his scheme for establishing a labor colony some place in the vicinity of the city, to which all tramps could be sent for indeterminate sentences and given an industrial training so as to make them useful members of society.

The report of the committee on outdoor relief showed that the demand on this department this year has been much greater than during previous years. An average of from 70 to 150 gallons of soup has been distributed daily since Jan. 1, at a cost of \$500.52.

Two thousand three hundred and forty-three families have been relieved, or 947 individuals in all. The total expense of the outdoor relief department amounts to \$13,428.25.

Mr. MacMurphy pointed out, after presenting his report, that the total grant from the City Council for relief on outdoor relief during the past 11 years has been \$9481.81 every year, and the annual expenditure of the house for the same time has been \$10,276, leaving the house with a total in the 11 years of \$8402.45.

MAY-DAY RESOLUTIONS COXLEY ON PARADE TO-DAY.

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NEW WAR AMBULANCE

VALUABLE AND USEFUL INVENTION OF A GERMAN DOCTOR.

Is Carried by the Troops in Small Parts Into Battle, Where it Can be Easily Taken Apart and Reassembled.

The war department in Washington will receive from the agent of the Society of the Red Cross, in Berlin, a very interesting model of a new field ambulance, which promises to work a complete change in the ones used at present.

The extraordinary progress made in the improvements of modern firearms, the introduction of smokeless powder, with more rapid firing, and perhaps, most of all, the ever present fear of a sudden war, all has had a tendency to keep the members of the Red Cross on the alert for perfecting their equipment.

The field ambulance, as being necessary for the mobilization and transportation of large bodies of men is of the greatest importance in modern warfare and, ever since the outbreak of the present war, it has been a subject of secondary to this great principle. This naturally embraces all that is used in a field ambulance in the way of sanitary appliances. 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BRITISH LABOR COMMISSION.

G. T. R. HALF-YEARLY MEETING.

BOARDS OF CONCILIATION NOT RECOMMENDED.

Arbitrators to Be Appointed—The House of Labor cannot be fixed by law...

LONDON, April 30.—The Royal Labor Commission has agreed upon the report recommended by the Duke of Devonshire...

Mr. Hoselord, a former auditor, moved a resolution to the effect that a commission consisting of three shareholders and three directors be appointed to investigate the accounts and report thereon upon the condition and prospects of the branches now attached to the Grand Trunk system.

A shareholder asked Sir Henry Tyler whether the Grand Trunk maintained friendly relations with the Canadian Pacific Railway. Sir Henry replied that the management of the two railways were on the best of terms.

The president referred to the decreasing business, which was in part met by a decrease in operating expenses. The current half yearly interest on debenture bonds would be fully earned.

A small dividend upon the guaranteed stock had been provided for and the president promised that exceptional measures would be taken for a reduction of expense.

The report was adopted by a large majority and Hoselord's motion defeated. The only change in the directorate was the election of Mr. Jeffrey in place of Mr. Brown.

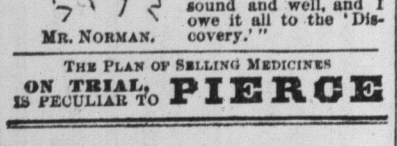
