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

So many calls are being made on the purses of the generous people of To-ronto and Ontario, to help the soldiers of the Empire, that as I make my daily rounds through the wards of the Hospital, and see the suffering chil Hospital, and see the suffering chil-dren in our cots and beds, the thought strikes me as to whether the people will as of old, with all the demands made upon them, answer our appeal and be to meintain the institution and help to maintain the institution that is fighting in the never-ending battle with disease and death, in its endeavor to save the stricken little

ones in the child-life of Ontario. Last year there were 394 in-patients from 210 places outside of Toronto, and in the past twenty years there have been 7,000 from places in the Province other than Toronto. —It costs us \$2.34 per natient per day

Province other than Toronto. -It costs us \$2.34 per patient per day for maintenance. The municipalities pay for patients \$1 per patient per day; the Government allows 20 cents per patient per day; so, deducting \$1.20 from \$2.34, it leaves the Hospitat with \$1 14 to new out of subscriptions with \$1.14 to pay out of subscriptions it regeives from the people of Toronto and the Province. 

The basket might be duplicated in raffia or by any one who has skill in basket making, or it may be purchased ready made and, after being lined with cretonne, fitted up with the required articles.

Restoring Colors In Carpets.

If a carpet is almost all wool the color may be brightened or wholly restored if washed with a pail of water containing three gills of ox gall. If necessary to use fresh ox gall procure it at the butcher's, cut it into small pieces, cover with warm water and allow it to soak for several hours. Di-lute the liquid and wipe the carpet off with it. It makes a lather and should be rinsed off with clear water.



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

2.—11 any person orders his paper dis-continued he must pay all arrearages or the publisher may continue to send it until payment is made and collect the whole amount whether the paper is taken from the office or not. There can be no legal discontinuance until payment is made.

3.—Any person who takes a paper out of the post office, whether directed to his name or not, or whether he has sub-scribed or not, is responsible for the pay. 4.—If a subscriber orders his paper stopped and the publisher continues to send, the subscriber is bound to pay for it if he takes it out of the post office. This proceeds upon the ground that a

This proceeds upon the ground that a man must pay for what he uses. 5.—The courts have decided that re-fusing to take newspapers or periodicals from the postoffice or removing, leaving them uncalled for, is prima facie evidence of intentional traud.


