

Crops in general in the United States promise better harvests this year than their average for the last five years, forecasts of the Depart-ment of Agriculture indicate. Bumper crops of potatoes and tobacco are promised, and most crops are better than last year. With the ex-ception of wheat, corn and oats, acreages this year run from 1 to 22 percent. above those of 1921.

The Quebec Government expects this year a record surplus, notwith-standing that \$3,000,000 extra has been appropriated for special pur-poses, an extra million has been allotted to education, another million to good roads, and a third towards reduction of debt. Profits from Government sale of liquor will probably be more than five millions.

Stock of the Ford Motor Company of Canada, Limited, is enjoying a boom almost without precedent among the stocks of large industries

on the stock exchanges of the United States and Canada. A month ago Canadian Ford stock ranged on the Detroit Stock Exchange at between 320 and 325. Monday afternoon it was quoted at 440 a share.

On, an illustration farm in the West, Walter Tact tested out sun-flowers as compared with corn for ensilage. The yield of corn was five tons to the acre, and sunflowers seven and one-half tons per acre. The cost of producing the corn was

\$4.60 per ton, the sunflowers \$2.92. The sunflowers not only yielded heav ily but withstood the early fall frosts much better than the corn.

Canadian manufacturers are being advised by the department that there is a good market awaiting their product in Japan if they care to develop business
