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

Molineux, a New York man was arrested for sending through the mail a package of poison that caused the death of a woman. He was tried, convicted and sentenced to death. Last week he was released from prison and the jury were but twelve minute in finding a unanimous verdict of "not guilty." The result of that trial ought to discourage the infliction of mere circumstantial evidence has led to conviction. It is possible, it is even probable that many men equally as innocent as Molineaux, but with less influential friends, have paid the price for crimes they never committed. It took four years to secure a new trial for Molineaux, and only unlimited money and great influence could have stayed the execution of a death sentence for so long a time. The new trial saved him, and a review of the evidence offers but a flimsy fabric of motive,knowledge of poison and opportunity to place it within reach of the victim, for his conviction. Why was it that four years ago the same evidence proved so conclusive to the guilt of the suspected one? The judge and the jury then held it to be a clear case of guilt. Last week the judge held that the only evidence connecting Molineux with the commission of the crime was the handwriting of the address on the pcison, and the jury found the evidence valueless in the confusion and contradiction of expert testimony. The strength of the evidence for conviction did not abate a particle in

"Laughing Them Down."

How often this is done in the home by the parents and grown-ups to the little and growing children, "laughing them down."

Perhaps the word "ridiculing" might have sounded better as a title, still this laughing down children can hardly come under the head of ridicule, for the grown folks, as a rule, do not really intend to ridicule in such cases. They are simply surprised or amused at a child's action, remarks or questions, and either laugh outright or else smile and glance significantly at someone else near by, thinking that the laugh or smile will not be noticed nor understood by the child itself.

This is a mistake, for most children are very quick of perception, and know intuitively what their little untrained minds could never reason out. Besides this, they are more sensitive than one might imagine, and with they apparently take no notice of your laughing at them, they still feel your lack of sympathy for and with them, and secretly resent your poking fun at them, or, in other words, your laughing them down.

Sometimes the "laughing down" is not done so kindly, and perhaps, unintentionally; indeed, quite frequently one person's laugh at a child's expense will be caught up by the rest until the child, and even a grown person, must How often this is done in the home

thing of this kind very keenly, and brood over it long after the older people have forgotten the occurrence. And what is the final result? Gradually the freedom of speech and with the confidence of expressed action, the independence of expressed thought, the confidence in people in general, and most of all, the confidence of the children in themselves—gradually, all these belong to the past and instead of happy, confident, unconscious children, we see reserved, hesitating and self-conscious little bodies, whose entraces into a room where

hesitating and self-conscious little bodies, whose entrance into a room where there is company is agony to themselves and annoyance to their parents, many of whom are to blame for the children's diffidence.

Children, even though they are children, do not like to be "laughed down" and more than the average grown person enjoys such a proceeding, and if people would only stop to think, they would realize that children are not little wooden, unthinking, un-noticing, ale in any of its numerous forms.
