The Depopulation of Ireland and its Consequences.

According to official census figures, Ireland had in 1841 a population of between eight and nine millions of souls; to-day she has barely half that number.

The fatal plague of disease and death overtook them in the stiffs, and unclean quarters of the "coffin ships" that carried them, and their bodies were dropped into the sea, unattended by burial rites unnumbered and uncounted for.

It was at this sad period in Ireland's mournful history that the utter lack of English sympathy was most keenly felt. The callous foreign rulers and landlords, with some noble exceptions, both alien and native, held themselves aloof from any sympathetic contact with the afflicted peasantry.

With true Celtic pluck, they, however, held together, saved their little earnings, visited and compared notes, and, above all, they kept the faith, and, as soon as enough could be mustered, a congregation was formed, and a faithful Irish priest took the guidance of his little flock, and, like the growth of the scriptural mustard seed, the Irish Catholic element has grown to be powerful in Glasgow, Edinburgh, Dundee, and other Scottish centres, and in Liverpool, thanks to Mgr. Nugent, and all zealous hierarchy and priesthood, Irish Catholics are strong and yearly growing stronger.

It is, nevertheless, to the United States and Canada, especially the former, that we must look for the best achievements of the Irish Catholic race in their mission of spreading the faith in this New World, and that too in the face of many grievous obstacles, for the pioneer Catholics faced and outlived Puritan bigotry, prejudice and malice, and despite the boast of American freedom, the great Republic has had its periods of Blue Laws, know-nothingism, apism and the rest, which vile organizations confronted Catholicism in every hostile fashion.

The War in South Africa

Popular opinion has proclaimed the advent of victory in South Africa. The people have made up their mind that the war is over, or so nearly so that it is only a question of a few days when the South African Republic will be vanquished, and that process territory annexed, and led by Field Marshal Roberts, Great Britain's army has fulfilled the most optimistic expectations.

Whether the war is just is not a debatable question with most people, and it is not surprising, in view of the bewildering rapidity of Lord Roberts' progress during the past week, that the troubles still ahead of the army in South Africa receive only a passing thought.

The Anglo-Saxon Mania.

At the time of the Spanish-American war the Anglophobe was in his prime, and Canadians, who understood their American neighbors, often were disgusted at the gush from the lips and pens of some of the English who were so ready to embrace everything emanating from the American jingoes.

When the Spanish-American war was declared the Spanish Minister at Washington found it necessary to leave the United States. Having packed his trunks, he naturally came across the border to Canada. The cry was at once raised by the Americans that we were harboring enemies of the United States, and we were requested to notify Senor Carenza to leave the country.

Thus the assertion of a distinguished English writer that "this is a war of the drawing-rooms and the saloons" has been verified. That it is a war of the drawing-rooms is shown by the presence in South Africa of a swarm of society women who make the war a picnic or carnival to such an extent that numerous officers have been compelled to complain; and that it is a war of the saloons the early appearance on the streets of the brewers' waggons last Thursday morning was sufficient evidence.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

The Dominion Government is to be congratulated upon the appointment of a Commission to enquire into election frauds.

That the annual races held at the Woodbine have something to recommend them we do not for a moment deny, but the presence of an unusually large number of children last Saturday, while undoubtedly adding to the effectiveness of the pretty scene, was in other respects somewhat undesirable.

That the Dutch of South Africa, even in Cape Colony, are anything but satisfied with the prospect of English rule was emphasized by a largely attended meeting at Graaf Reinet, Cape Colony, last Thursday.

Other resolutions presented affirmed that if the Republics were annexed the peace and prosperity of the country would be irretrievably wrecked.

A delegation was appointed to visit Great Britain, Canada and Australia to explain the views of those represented at the Congress.

GREETING AT GUELPH TO BISHOP DOWLING.

Loretto's greeting to His Lordship Bishop Dowling, on Monday evening, was a brilliant event. Though the invitations were limited, the large basement of the Church of Our Lady was intelligently and appreciatively filled.

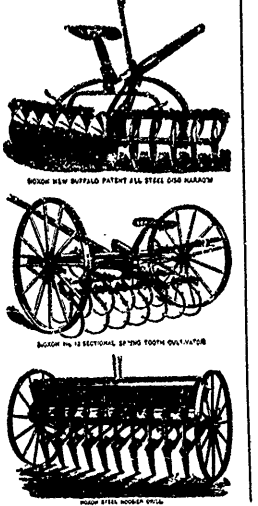
