### MRS. MARSHALL.

## Parish Notes.

Sunday, October 16th, was observed in St. George's as a day of special Thanksgiving for the Fruits of the Harvest. Nothing could exceed the natural beauty of the day ; earth with its thousand voices seemed praising God. Within the Church all was bright and appropriately decorated, while the singing and the music were really beautiful.

The same Sunday was observed throughout the Church as a Day of Intercession for Sunday Schools, and though Thanksgiving was the keynote here, the other note was also sounded. At the early Celebration the Rector gave an address to all Church workers, and both Mr. Shortt and Mr. Goodman spoke effectively to religious education in their sermons.

The offertory at both services will be devoted to repairing the organ and other necessary improvements.

The Sewing School re-opened on Saturday morning, 5th November.

Miss Lowe's Bible Class for young women is held in the Church on Sundays at 3.30 p.m. A cordial welcome is extended to all new members.

During the summer some repairs were done to the Church buildings, and now no longer the cellars are flooded in wet weather through defective eavetroughs. The Clergy Vestries have also been done up, and with the money subscribed by Miss Maud Cayley's class, have been made at least water tight.
