## THE LIBERAL DEMONSTRATION．

In compliance with a request made by a number of influential liberals in Mont－ real，Sir Richard Cartwright delivered an address in the Queen＇s Jall on Thuisday evening，the 27 th ulto．，which was largely attended，the meeting having been pre－ sided over by Mr．Holton，M．P．，and having been likewise addressed by Mr． Laurier，M．P．It might have been expect－ ed that，on such an occasion，Sir Richard Cartwright would ndopt the tone of a pessimist，and he certainly did so． Without pretending even to attempt to review the speech，delivered on the occa－ sion，there are one or two topics to which we shall：venture to call attention． It was with regret that we noticed thati Sir Richard Cartwright is one of those who claim for Canada the right to negotiate treaties directly with foreign Governments， a vight which we were surprised to find the Guzetle claims that she already lias． We fear very much that the leaning of the Dominion Government is very niuch in the salie direction．The lominion Government is，however，more consistent than Sir Riclarrl Catwright，who claims to be a Free－trader．

When we find professed Free-traders like Mr. J. D. Edgar, M.P., advocating the right of Canada to make treatips, we are inclined to be suspicious that their real object is separation from Great Britain. There can be no donbt whatever that Camada may at all times rely on the cordial assistance of the Imperial Government to obtain all the advantages of her commercial treaties with other combiries. 'Those treaties have for their chief ohjeci the admission into those countries of all British and colonial exports on the same looing as the most favored nations, similar advantages being given in return. What more can Canadian Free-traders desire? As a matter of fact Canada has refused, on more than one occasion, to be included in treaties with important European States, for no conceivable object, but because her Ministers are finvorable to the principle of establishing discriminating duties, when there are opportunities of doing so. Such a policy, we feel assured, would be a most disasthous one for a country like.Canada, but we camot aftiom that it would be inconsistent with protectionist views.

It will be probably in the recollection of our readers that in the year $188^{\circ}$ the Governor-General of Canada was informed by the Secretary of State that Sir Anthony Musgrave, then Governor of Jamaica, reported to him that he had lemned "from tunoflicial but trustworthy "sources, that the Government of Can"ada desires to enter into special com" mercial arrangements with that colony, "and the British West Indies generally, "in the direction of reciprocal conces"sions in the reduction of import "daties," and that he (Sir A. Musgrave) had refused to entertain the subject. On this the Secretary of State observed:-"I need scarcely say that "Sir A. Musgrave is entirely right in his " assumption that Fer Majesty's Govern"ment could nol sanction any arrauge" ments which would involve the creation "of differential duties in favour of Can"ada." In their Minute of Council in reply, the Dominion Government maintained that "it is competent for any of the "Colonies possessing representation and "responsible Governments to enter into "mulual agreements for either partial or "absolute free-trade with the Mohher "Country or with ench other, or with
" both, discriminating againsl other coun-
"tries." 'Ihere was no pretension that it was competent "to negotiate trealies of "reciprocity with foreign Governments," which is what is still claimed by the Montreal Gazette.

We have quite recently had an illustration of the result of reciprocity treaties. It appears that a treaty has been negotiaied, between the United States and Spain, on the principle of the free ad. mission of a number of leading articles, and reduced duties on others. Although it is as yet very doubtful whether this treaty will be ratified by the Senate, the merchants of St. John, N.B., have taken the alarm, and are actually crying out for amexation, in order to secure admission for their products to the Spanish West Indies on the same terms as the United States. We have not the slightest doubt that the very same parties would have advocated the reciprocity arrangement with the West Indies, which was desired by the Dominion Govermment. It is now known that eflorts are being made to effect a commercial treaty between the United States and the West Indies, substantially the same as that between the former and Spain. Many difliculties will be found, but, on the assumption that hoth treaties should be ratilied, Can. ada may be compelled to abandon her sugar duties at a loss to her revenue of over two and a half millions of dollars. So much for discriminating duties.

Sir Richard Cartwright was cautious in his utterances as to the future of Canada, while his former colleague, Mr. Laurier, did not conceal his desire for independence. We find it difficult to believe that a man of Mr. Laurier's intelligence, can believe in the possibility of two independent republics on this continent, bearing in mind especially that the several States are practically independent. As to Sir Richard Carbwright's suggestion, that there might be some kind of federal union, between English-speaking mations, the object being of course to unite Great Britain and the United States by some new ties, we look on it as wholly impracticable. It would be simply a resort to the antiquated policy of an alliance offensive and delensive. It has been a settled principle with the United States since their revolution, that they would refrain from all interfereace with questions of policy in Europe, aud they would most certainly enter into no alliance of the kind indicated. As to the arljustment of disputes which may arise in the future as they have done in the past, there cannot be a sase conceived, where there was less probability of an amicable settlement than that of the Alabama claims, and yet after long and fruitless negotiations the controversy was settled by arbitration and without causing any illfeeling between the nations.

We have so often had occasion to treat the subject of the Pacific Railway, that we deem it unnecessary to notice at any length Sir Richard Cartwright's reforence to it. We are glad to find, that. he admits that Eritish Columbia "would have been $a$ desirable acquisition," if it could have been obtained without constructing the Pacific railway. The renl cause, accouding to him, of granting "such outrageously atisurd terms was to gratify a childish vanity on the part of the leader of the then Governmeat." Now surely Sir Richard Cariwright must be aware that the proposals for Union came from British Columbin, whose delegates came to Ottawa, and who made the construction of the railway a sine quin uon. It is true that they would have accepted a condition that the railroad should be made more slowly, provided an ortinary road were at once proceeded with. The Dominion Government preferred making one road to two, especially as the milroad through the North-West temitories was also required. Had the overtures been rejected there was serious danger that British Columbia might have seceded. Canada would have preferred delay.

## THE BUSINESS OUTLOOK

Upon the verge of the holiday season comes a lull in the wholesale trade, which invariably remains unbroken until after New Years, when, in the natural course of events, business will no doubt begin to recover from the torpor which has already settled down upon the commercial world. The advenl of 1885 , however, is certainly not big with the promise of any great expansion of trade, nor is it, on the other hand, pregnant with those sterile prospects which some are inclined to fore. shadow. The conditions of transacting business are steadily gravitating towards the hand-to-mouth policy in almost every line of merchandise, and this of itself ought to inspire confidence in the future, as it simply means a stricter adherence to legitimate principles, and the abandonment of the speculative element, which has toolong been a prominent factor in commercial dealings. With business, therefore, working into much safer channels, whereby the carrying of heavy stocks is obviated, and risks are minimized; wilh profits surer, and losses less likely to occur, we cannot go to the length of pessimists, some of whom would have us believe that we are on the eve of universal bankrupley. Ithat the situation partakes of extreme dullness there is no gainsaying, any more than it can be denied
that such a condition of things usually culminates about this time. Nor does it require much effort to perceive reasonable grounds upon which to base expectations of an inprovement in general trade during the coming spring. We admit that farmers have been provokingly tarly in marketing their abminat cereal products, tnereby postponing the liguidation of their long past due indebuchness, the brunt of which has to be borne by the wholegale merchants, who are compelled to assist country cuntomers in proviling for a large portion of their paper as it matures. There is no apprehension, however, as to makers being in a position to ultimately pay lhair renewal notes, as the source from whence they thav their shekels was never in a more solvent condition, the full amount of their linbilities being guaramteed by the known ability of farmers to settle in full as soon a. they make up their minds to realize upou their crops. The prerogative which the farmer enjoys in onforeing an extension of time above every other class of creditors no doubt heips to intensify the existing depression in trade circles genemally, for just as long as be demauds an extension of credit he will naturally be pasimonious in his purchases and hence the many complaints of chronic dullness of trade in the interior. The time is not far distant, however, when producers will have their hunds forced and it may then occur to them that a willing game would have proven the best after all. There is every prospect of' a very large trade in Canadian grain of all kinds next spring, and even since the close of naviga ion there has been more trading therein for shipment to the Juglish maket via Porthand than was expected. Beyomt the holiday staguancy, therefore, which now obtains in many branches of the wholesale trade, the outlook is certainly more hopeful than gloony.

## THEGOVERNMENT AND THE BANKS.

There can be no doubt as to the fact that there is increasing disatisfaction on the part of the banks generally at the persistence of the Government in prying to the depositors in the Savings Banks a rate of interest in excess of the fair market rate, which has long been 3 per cent. The rate of 4 per cent, when originally fixed, several years agn, was the same as what was then being generally paid by the banks, but no one knows better than the Minister of Finance that it has fallen consiclerably, and that all prudent banks have had to reduce their rates. Under these circumstances it is anything but
fair on the part of the Government to offer a rate higher than that generally prevailing. We mentioned in a late issue a case in which, owing to the temptation of a higher rate of interest, money deposited in the Bank of Montreal was actually withdrawn and phaced in the Exchange Bank, where it was at the time of the falure of that institution. Of course it is not easy to ascertain with any precision the effect of the Government policy, but its obvions tendency is to encourage withdrawals from the banks, and thus cripple theirmeans of meeting the demands of their customers. 'lhe policy is so olijectionable that we can have little doubt that it will be made the sulject of criticism on the meeting of Parliament, and if the Finance Minister or the Postmaster General were wise they would anticipate a discussion, out of which it will be impossible for the Govermacnt to come wilhuredit.

## THE TAXES ON COMPORA'IONS.

Another decision of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council has cut off' a source of revenue from the Quebec Government, viz, the ten cent stamp on documents in all legal cases. It is to be regretted that there has been so much delay in obtaining the deceisions of the Canadian Courts as to the legality of the taxes on corporations, but it is hardly conceivable that the Privy Council will sustain them, and the sooner the Quebec Government recognizes that it will be unable to maintain those taxes, the better it will be for the people who will ultimately have to shoulder the burthen. In the case of the ten cent stamp tax the Canadian Courts were divided, but the fimat decision of the Privy Council confirins the original juignient of Mr. Justice Mackay, which was reversed by the Court of Appeal, Chiel Justice Dorion dissenting, and then confirmed by the supreme Court by 4 to 2 . Those who complain of the decision of the Privy Council as an interference with Provincial antonomy should bear in mind that no other Province hut Quebec has attempled to impose sucia lixes.

## THE ST. LAWRENCE CIIANNEL.

We have not failed to notice the Camilton Spectator's reply to our last notice of his persistent opposition to one of the most important public works of the Dominion, the improvement of the St. Lawrence channel. We readily supply what our contemporary terms "some
unnamed authority," which was that of a Board of Engineers in the United States, whose advice was sought in 1858 by the Harbour Commissioners of Montreal and whose conclusions, we stated in full, although we omitted to mention that a previous extract was from the same report. "Ihe gentlemen who constiluted the Board were Messers. Childe, MoAl pine and Kirkwood. The Spectator seems to be under the impression that there has been some opposition offered by the people of Montreal to the deepening of the St. Lixwrence canals. We have never heard of any, and we feel assured that the main question at issue would not be affected by such a work the Spectator gives the depth of the Welland camal, when the agreement shall have been completed, as 12 feet, and he desires that the same depth should be obtained in the St. Lawrence canals, and then he seems to imavine that stemmers drawing $27 \frac{1}{2}$ feet would stop at Quebec. His forgets that the Montreal trade alme would be sufficient to ensure the prosecution of the voyage to Moutreal, where the large stermers would taise the canal trafic, a, matter what size the cralt carrying it might, be.

The Spectutor does not seem to perceive that the whole Canadian traffe by the St. Lawrence route would be bensfited by the improvement in question; and although Montreal moy perhaps from the extent of its trade derive a greater benefit than smaller ports on the Upper Lakes yet all do receive proporional mivantages. Can the Spectator cite an instance in which it was ever proposell to throw the cost of improvement.s in the river Mississippi on any of the cities situmed above New Orleans? Montreal has good cause to complain bitterly of the Ontario press. Her harbor is almost the only one in Canada of any importanee that has received no aid whatever from the public treasury, and yet while tha canals constructed to summont the olistruntions of the rapids have been pror vided for as public works there has been persistent opposition to the deepening of the chamel of the St. Lawrence, on the ground of its being a Montreal work, although the expenditure has been chiefly made at $\Omega$ distance of 9 miles from that city. It is now upwards of 43 .years since it was resolved that the improvement of the chamel of the St. Lawrence should be undertaken as a public work, and be placeal on the same footing as the canals, the object of both improve. ments being the same, an i being one in which the whole people of Cumbat hat a common interest.

## FIRE LOSSES APPORTLONMENTS.

Some years ago we gave a series of articles upon the above subject, and as we believe it is an acknowledged axiom that "imitation is the sincerest flattery," wo presume we ought to feel complimenterd that a contemporary has recently been endeavoring to deal with the same matter in a series of articles. We can scarcely believe that the able editor was at his post when the artioles referred to were prepared. When anyone can give place in print to the following example, viz.:
Company $A$ on building
.. $\$ 2,500$
" B " subject to av'go 5,000 value of building $\$ 10,4,0$, loss $\$ 6,000$, and then boldly set down the apportionment thus:
Company A insures..................... $\$ 2,500$
" B "................... 2,500 explaining that said B's policy being subject to average the liability is as $\$ \overline{3}, 000$ is to $\$ 10,000$ so will $\$ 2,500$ be to its liability, it is palpable the writer must have totally ignored the first rudiments of the average chuse. All insurance men are aware that the average clause runs as follows: -"If the property so covered shall at "the breaking out of any fire be collec-
" tively of greater value than the sum
" insured thereon, then this company " shall pay or make good such a propor"tion only of the loss or damage as the "sum so insured shall bear to the whole "value of the said property at the time "when such fire shall first happen." Therefore in the example given company B's liability is one half, no matter what the loss may be, while company A is liable for $\$ 2,500$ (provided of course it does not contain the clause that "if any "other polncy covering said property be "subject to average then this policy "shall be subject to average in like "manner"), so that the insured in the example before us loses only $\$ 500$, not $\$ 1,000$ as our contemporary puts it. Supposing the loss had been $\$ 3,000 \mathrm{in}$ stead of $\$ 6,000$ the adjustment according to the apportionment quoted would be that each company would pay half, or $\$ 1,500$, thus making the average clause in B's policy totally inoperative. The correct apportionment would be-it being understood that the English method of exhausting the specific policy first be waived-thus A's liability $\$ 2,500$ pays $5.8,81,875$; B's lisbility $\$ 1,500$ pays $3-8$, $\$ 1,125$.
This liability is the same and remains unaltered whether the loss be partial or total, though the proportionate contribution of the average and specific policies
vary materially with regard to rateable contribution when the loss is less than the amount of the specific policy. We have already given our views in the articles referred to at the commencement of this paper, and we are willing to admit that respecting those views there may be difference of opinion, but, so far as the simple average clause is concerned, it is not a question of opinion but of fact, and when a writer argues that the liability of an average policy for $\$ 5,000$ covering a value of $\$ 10,000$ is $\$ 2,500$ on a loss of $\$ 6$,000 he simply exposes his gross ignorance of a subject he endeavors to handle and had better read up a few hooks before he agrin makes himself ridiculous in the eyes of the insurance community.

## A CORRECIION.

We beg to assure the Hamilton Times that he is wholly mistaken in his interpretation of our late remarks on the sub. ject of the Pacific Railway. Our main contention was that the Government was bound to act with gool faith towards a company which had undertaken an important public work on certain conditions. Referring to the Manitoba South Western road, we expressed an opinion that if Mr . Stephen should fail in obtaining the means of constructing it " no other reliable parties are likely to make the attempt," whereupon our sagacious contemporary informs us that Mr. Hill of the St. Paul and Manitoba road has offered to build an entirely different line with the express olject of diverting the traffe of the Canadian Pacific to his own road. We are quite ready to admit that competition is most desirable and advantageous for all persons interested in the traftic carried by railroads, but, on the other hand; railroad companies expect to obtain a fair return for the capital, which they furnish to suild their roads. On this continent competition may be said to be the rule, and the consequence is that the rates are generally unremunerative. As to monopoly the public are protected by maximum rates, which cannot be excoeded. The question, however, is not whether, under certain circumstances, competition may be allowed, but whether the faid of the Government and the Parliament shall be adhered to. Surely it will not be pretended for a moment that the gentlemen who undertook to enter into an agreement with the Govermment for the construction of the Pacitic railway had not a right to stipulate that no cbarters should be granted for the construction of railways which
would divert their legitimate traffic to a rival line in a foreign country. And yet this is what our contemporary and others. term "monopoly." There is not the slightest analogy between the case of the Pacific railway and that of any railway in Ontario, But for the conditions under which British Columbia entered the union the people of Manitoba would have had to build their own roads at their own cost, arrangenents which Sir Richard Cartwright holds would have been very desirable, but which we are inclined to think would have been complained of quite as much as the Pacific railroad has been.

## ADULTERATION OF FOOD.

Mr. H. Sugden Evans, government analyst, has been interviewed by the St. John I'clegraph. The new officer delivered his opinions freely. He thinks the forthcoming government report will show that fully one-third of the articles examined were adulterated. Butter makers come in for a considerable share of hlame, although it is well known to the trade that little or no adulteration is. practised in that article of food, low qualities resulting from imperfect washing, working, packing or storing. The extra care necessary to produce finest butter throughout would cost less of time and labor, and result in far greater benefit to the producer than any adulteration practicable in this country under existing economical conditions. As all kinds of people throughout the country make butter, and as cleanliness and taste are instinctive rather than arquired, it must follow that an articlp so sensitive to its surroundings must continue to the more or less imperfect until the creamery system comes into more general use.
The trade will smile at the mention of: the old exploded notion of sugar adulterated by mixing with sand. Everybody has hearl the apocryphal story of the Quaker who interrupts his prayers to ask his assistant if he has samed the sugar. Many a fraudulent statement is similarly perpetuated. We can scarcely believe that Mr. Sugden Evans is a believer in the sand story. The greatest adulteration in articles of food is doubtless in the preparation of spices and coffiee, and if the new officer of the Government can and will compel the grinders to label their packages "Pepper Mixture," "Cuffee Mixture," etc., he will deserve well of those who tax themselves to pay his salary. One or two needy, purchasable, partial analysts with their carefullyworded certificates placarded on fences
all over our cities are enough to bring discredit on the returus of the department which they serve.

People remark on the comparatively small proportion of collee consumed in Camada, and the remark is true in a sense beyond what is meant. Indeed there is very litlle pure coltee consumed by the masses ol the people, and so accustomed is the public patate to the use of chicory that the genuine aticle is not always recognized as such. "lure coffee" in some of the best stores means an admixture of from ten to fifteen per cent. of chicory. It is not surprising that so little collee, good or bad, is consumed amoner us. dive the people a good article, and they will use more of it; but llis would of course necessitate a charge at retail of from 35 c . to 45 c . per pound. 'lea is not so easy of adulteration, and is judned by aprearance as well as by its "drawing" or" cup" qualities, and tea has therefore become the great mational drink of the people-the cup, that cheers but not inebriates.

## The buvtin shntench.

On 'luesdiny Jast Mr. Alex. Bumtin was sentenced to ten days' condinement in the common juil of the district on the elarges atready referred to in these cohmans. There is but one feeling-hat of sympathy-for Mr. Bumbin in the result of the trial. 'Ihe condemation in this ense is a protucieal roply to those who loudly excham that wealdh is a sure defence against the terrors of the haw, the more so as few, if any, entertainel the belief alnt Mh: Bustin intentionally commited any wrong. The private prosecntor has the firther satisfaction, if any, of prying the eosts of the trinl, the event which he may be supposed not to have antir cipated at the ontset. The following is the Julge's ruling in brief:

The atecusution was that you, in conenrpence with ilr. Uraig presillent of the lixelatuge bank (you yourself becing then adirector of the bank) conspired to receive an undme preference over oller crediturs to the extent of $\$ 8,000$. You were and are a ereditor to the bank yourself to a hage anombt, and the sum withirthyn was only it pate of the deposit then slanding to your eredit. At ditis time the bund latid sus. pended parment, mad was in a state of insolvency. In thas acting you became involved in the commission of an ilegrat act. Upen this point the stialute is cleat and precise. The fincts proved were indisputuble, nand in truth couln not be denied. You were nbly delemied and you had a fitir trant. The verdiet of the jury: wassmanimed in haw, and the restith was and is that youstand emmitued of having violated the law, and thereby shbijected yourself to the panalties of amishlemennor. fror whis wifence the statute provides a sentence of inprisomment for any perioul lesis than two jears. It may loe proper to remark that yon hase been at mat of werlil, and returned ilse money the instantor is soon as-rou becance convinced that you hnd commited an illegal aet. This will, of course, remove from the minds of those who were concerned in the adminisaralion of the law that there was any very serious intent to defraud. The charge agatinst you is not that you
did it with intent to defraud, but that you did it. There is the law before me, and I must enforce it, however paiaful. The creditors of the Bank did not lose one dollar by the tudue preference, but, in the opinion of the Jury, the law lans been thansgressed. No compromise was proved, nad in Jaw compromise was not possible. There are, however, many circumstances contnined in your ense which inclines the Court to exercise the utmost lemiency compatible with the reasonable applieation of the law, and a rather mild vimdication of it. Had it been in my jower to impose only a fine, possibly I might hatue considered myself justified in doing so......I inn very much atrait that my leaning un the side of elemeney possibly-possibly 1 satyis carrying me too far; but still, I assmme the respunsibility of that. It rests with ma, mand I amp prepared to bear it. As 1 siiill before, I would rither ere on the side of leniency than that of hatshess, and the sentence is that you be imprisoned in the Commun Jat of this district for the space of teen Daya.
Mr. Buntin was nceompanied to the jail by Hon. A. W. Ogilvie, Messrs. B. K. (ireene, Andrew boya, d. d. Curran, M. P., and Payette, the governor of the jail.

Glambius V. Boughton, agent at 'loronto of the Aecident depmrment of the Citizens Ins. Co, has been discovered in a series of petty defatcations extending over several months. It was not ancommon for this class of customers to paty by insiatiments, it small sum down, and Mir. boughton appenta to have taken advathage of the many lapses which usmully oecorr, poeketed the lirst instahmen, mod never make any entry or return, execon where n policy becmmen chin, when evergthing would he set straight. The mmonnt of these petty mistapropriations discovered thas far is ubout $\$ 400$, but there is a larger amount, about wi, 000 , missing on acconnt of anmail premiums. On heing aceused of the embegzlenment be confessed io a shoptage of abous ${ }^{2} 10$ ( 0 and fiting to oblain any satisfiction, the compariy hat no aldermave but to have him marested. Boughtom apeats to have made a fivarable impression on his new enployers until cought tripping, and was in receipt of a good salaty besides the conmissions which lie hiad worked up lo a colisiderable amomot. One of his securilies is Mr. Uluxton, his fithor-in lan a retirel wailly graun dealer and insurance man al Peterboro. Oin the first intimation of the louble, a few werks ago, Mr. Cluxton notilied the compmoy that he vished to withanm the bond, an evilence that conlidence was lost in that quater also. 'lite ncensed furnished bail in $\$ 1600$.

Sm:-As to the fire at the Market Honse in Othaw, the ciremmatames were suche to to wnder necessary a genemb whitewashing investigation, which the insumance companies were not itwited to attend. As to the Boiler Shop, the fire oecurred at moon-day. and should nerer have been ullowed to do haif the danage i- did. As to the livery, stahle fire, I do say "it was not well pat ont"; there was a continuous wrugle amongst the men as to the application of the water, which was, in consequence, used spasmodicaily and not systemutically. As to the langinge nsed by the men on that, occersion, , reter yoin to the last word of the Chiet's letter for a specimen of it. Yon cati readily understand that the men are not more choice in their epithets than is the Chief.

I have seen more fires than the Uttawn firemen and their Chief, and I know when $\Omega$ fire is well handled. I do not blame the "Chiefs "of" Fire Departments when good work is not done, hecansel know that men ate forced upon the Chiets by intrigue or by favor, whether they are qualified and willing or not. I say distinctly thint the Othawa Fire Brigade have never done good work at a fire. I do not think they have appliances for good work, and I do not think Hey are under such discipline as to do as goud work as their appliances would pernit.

Boots axd Shoes.-Some of our manufacturers have been reducing their stafls, in view of the existing quietness of trade which usually sets in towards the holidnys, stocktaking baving been the order of the day. One or two houses are working on spriug orders, and have been the exception to the dullaess experienced by sume ot the other firms. Remittances alhougli reported slow with one large bouse, niny, on the whole, be celled fuir.

Damy Pronuce.-Butter-The general market is in a very weak and unsutisfactory condition, so much so, in fuct, that prices have given way on the linest qualities in sympathy wilh late English and New York adrices, prices luving receded ac per ib. in the latter plate. Here it is more diflicult to sell even choice qualities, offerings of that descciption being more libural of hate than many in the trade expected to find it. The chief anxiety, howerex, is over the poor, mediam and fair crades, large quantities of which are still held back of Brockville and west of thoronto. Coumty buyers need to exercise extreme cantion in handiing these kinds of butter, or they may have to shilier unpleasuat consequences. Vommission housus here should also be vigilant in order to guard against alvancing too much on consiguments, as they did last year. Sales of line creamery have transpired it 250 , and choice townships hape been offered at 22c. Brockvilles ure quict at 15 c to 202 c , as to quality, and Western ht 12 c to $17 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{c}$, us to quality. Cheese. -The market remams steady for fine goods, owners of which prefer to hold rather than accept present bids from England. Shoold my 'animated stir take place between now and the holidays it will be more than the trade expects. Quotations are unchanged, as follows: WesternFine to tinest $11 \frac{1}{2}$ e to 12 , tair to good 10 izc to 11. f , early makes 9c to 102 c . Fresh-Fine to linestile to $11 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{c}$, fair to good loc to 102 , early makes $8, \frac{1}{2}$ to $9_{4}^{3} \mathrm{c}_{\mathrm{j}}$ skims 5 c to $7 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{c}$.

Druas and Chemonls.-A rather quiet week bans passed in general drugs, but the advances previously noted in iodine, bromine, mercury and its preparations have been well maintained. Quinine is siendy, morphia quiet and opinm unchanged. Heays chemicals are quiet, inportations being ali in, with dealers ordering in small quantities to fill immediate wants only. Blenohing powder still lends the tirm list at $\$ 2.40$ to $\mathbf{i d i} .50$. In other kinds there is litile or no change. A new feature in the trade is the substitution of alkili and crystal carbonase for sal soda. The alkali is sodia ash made on an improved principle, and the crystal carbonate is sal soda in concentrated form.

Dry Goods.-Apart from stock-taking, there is no stir whatever in the dry goods department, travellers being neurly all home, and until they start out with general spring samplos businoss is not cxpected to show the slightest animation. A few buyers have returned from Eugland already, but it is claimed they were a litte too hasty, as they must have missed the latest spring siyles. In Canadian tweeds, orders for spring goods continue to be sent in by travellers. Oni of our large tweed houses has appended to its regular tusiness the furnishing of tailors' trimmings, English coatings, butions, etc., which, although somewhet of a departure, has been called for by the customers of the honse reterred to. Remittances have been only fair. Notwithstanding the general dullness of tuade, stuck-taking has already revealed to some of our leading
houses that their sales fuot up to a larger ngiregate than they had expected. Cottons arequiet and steady.

EgGs.-A dull market has ruled during the past week, and the few sales reported were made at from 20 c to 2 Ic, a few fresh cases having realized 22c. A lot in barrels, was sold at 19 c .

Fish.-Continued dullness marks the trade in pickled tish. Labraior herring being slow sale and prices range from $\$ 5.75$ to $\$ 6.25$ per bll.
