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

#### Commercial Summary.

Tweed manufacturers may find it to their interest to address "A.B," whose aurouncement will be found in another column. He means business.

The dry goods stock of Turgeon & Co., this city, was bought by Dupuis & Co., at \$1 cents in the dollar last week. Mr. Turgeon is now trying to do something at insurance.

- J. A. Firon, a well-meaning trader of Kingsville, Ont., is again in trouble, and has assigned. He failed about five years ago, and compromised with his creditors. His misfortune is due to selling too much on credit for his capital.
- G. H. Munnor, of Brandon, Man., groceries and liquors, has allowed his principal creditors to get judgment against him for \$8,000, leaving nothing for outside claimants.—John Young keeping a small general store at Berriedale, Muskoka, Ont., has assigned.
- A. W. Ghav, of Trura, N.S., referred to last week, owes about \$2000, and his assets amount to about \$500, chiefly in small book debts. His landlord is secured for \$250.—Ottawa complains of losing \$30,000 a year through what is termed "exemptions of taxation."

The liabilities of A. D. Ritchie & Co., lumber millers at Laca la Tortue and Three Rivers, Que., who failed a short time ago, are estimated at \$20,000; the assets are nominally about \$11,000. An offer of 20 cents in the dollar is under consideration. They have been but a short time in business.

Louis Lewis, eigar manufacturer, this city, one of the earlier enstomers of the late W. J. Ingram and his branch, has courageously taken up his grip-suck and samples, and started on the road for Messrs. S. Davis & Son. Mr. Lewis is a native of Russia, speaks half-a-dozen languages, and has something to say in each of them.

JOHN Darcey & Son, dealers in general merhandise, fish, &c., at Trout Cove, N.S., have assigned. They owe about \$5,000, and have assets about equal in amount. They allowed themselves to fall behind last year, and have been making vigorous efforts to collect of late, but without adequate results,

Jos. LAVALLEE began business in Berthier en haut in January, 1881, with a capital of about \$1,000, and had he been more circumspect he would not now be obliged to assign. Kent & Turcotte have charge of the estate, which owes about \$1000, and contains nominal assets of \$800. Lavallée has been chiefly engaged in the liquor trade.

W. T. Nichol, general dealer, Bear River, N.S., who was sold out under execution of his father and another creditor in May last, has assigned. What he had to assign is a puzzle. He owes about \$2,500, and his assets are nil. Nichol has proved himself in a run of two years rather unfitted for business. He has some property in his wife's name.

Some RETAIL dry goods dealers of Quebec complain that the local wholesale houses make a practice of selling at retail. There were similar complaints in Montreal a few years ago, but the practice appears to have been confined to an occasional friend as it probably is in Quebec, but the little noise that was made about it appears to have put a stop to the grievance.

Tue plan of "Renewable Term Insurance by Mortuary Premiums," devised by Mr. Sheppard Homans, has been adopted by the Federal Life Ins. Co., of Hamilton: In the advertisement of the company, on page 770, last week, the printer made the word "Renewable" read "Remarkable," a mistake that must have. puzzled some of our readers. The advertisement appears again the present week.

Leading Wholesale Trade of Montreal.



TRAVELLERS by the South-Eastern Railway, Montreal to Newport, remark on the falling off in passenger traffic of late. This is probably more apparent than real. The number of free passes, of which there were some 3,000 annual and many more trip passes, cancelled last summer, will doubtless account for it, as the holders of such passes and their friends constituted a large proportion of the patrons of the

Mr. ALEX. SHAW, of the firm of Henry J. Shaw & Co., appears to have been left out in the cold in the recent negotiations of the creditors. Mr. Shaw says he put into the firm of H. J. Shaw & Co., a year ago, \$3059 cash, and that (as manager of the business) he reduced the liabilities of the firm \$8,000 and the stock \$5186 during the year, leaving the firm \$2824 better off when the assignment was made than when he entered as a partner a year ago.

Messus, Boyd & McDougall, merchants, St. John's, Nfld., are offering 9s. in the pound, spread over eighteen months, but their bankers are said to be holding out for 1s. more. At a meeting of their creditors held a few weeks ago the liabilities were shown to be \$20,000 of which about \$8,000 is to bank. The failure was a surprise to the trade, but it is accounted for by the dullness in the fishery trade, among which they appear to have a large amount outstanding.

THEIR name is legion! Another James Campbell & Son customer is Alex. C. Perry, of Winnipeg, stationer, etc., who recently assigned. He owed the Toronto concern \$1700, of which about 20 per cent was on accommodation paper. He offered 20 cent's in the dollar, but creditors would not accept.-Wilson Bros., another stationery firm in the Prairie City, has been obliged to assign, owing to a demand and suit for \$1,000 by a brother in Toronto, an old matter which they supposed had been offset by services in the latter city.

OF THE defalcations noted last week, that of Wingate is for \$5,400, the amount of a cheque with which he ostensibly went to pay an account due by the firm; that of Alex. Shearer is about \$5,000. Beamer, Township clerk of North Gower, Ont., has given buil of \$750 to stand his trial for forgery— A. Phillip, keeper of a cigar shop and billiard room, Yonge street, Toronto, after a six months' run, has left the precincts, neglecting to pay debts of about \$2000.

DUNCAN BROS., of St. John, N.B., dry goods merchants, have assigned in trust. Liabilities about \$18,000; assets about \$10,000. Their troubles are partly attributable to having added groceries to the business some time since, but which they disposed of again in October last. They have been hard pressed for some time .- J. Newton Wilson, of the same city, hotel keeper, has returned to the south of the international boundary, leaving several small accounts unsettled. The premises and effects are in possession of creditors to whom he gave Bills of Sale.

V. TAILBEFER, general storekeeper, Cornwall, Ont., has assigned to Kent & Turcotte, with liabilities of about \$3,000 and assets nominally the same .- W. J. Cormack, a secondhand furniture dealer, Toronto, has the builiff in possession at the instance, of one Skinner. Previous to six months ago he was a fairly well-to-do journeyman.-L. A. McDonald, a dealer in a small way at Creemore, Ont., formerly a hotelkeeper at Thornbury, has been very slow in his payments for some time, and recently they stopped altogether. He has assigned.

#### THE LIBERAL DEMONSTRATION.

In compliance with a request made by a number of influential liberals in Montreal, Sir Richard Cartwright delivered an address in the Queen's Hall on Thursday evening, the 27th ulto., which was largely attended, the meeting having been presided over by Mr. Holton, M.P., and having been likewise addressed by Mr. Laurier, M.P. It might have been expected that, on such an occasion, Sir Richard Cartwright would adopt the tone of a pessimist, and he certainly did so-Without pretending even to attempt to review the speech, delivered on the occasion, there are one or two topics to which we shall venture to call attention. It was with regret that we noticed that Sir Richard Cartwright is one of those who claim for Canada the right to negotiate treaties directly with foreign Governments, a right which we were surprised to find the Guzette claims that she already has. We fear very much that the leaning of the Dominion Government is very much in the same direction. The Dominion Government is, however, more consistent than Sir Richard Cartwright, who claims to be a Free-trader.

When we find professed Free-traders like Mr. J. D. Edgar, M.P., advocating the right of Canada to make treaties, we are inclined to be suspicious that their real object is separation from Great Britain. There can be no doubt whatever that Canada may at all times rely on the cordial assistance of the Imperial Government to obtain all the advantages of her commercial treaties with other countries. Those treaties have for their chief object the admission into those countries of all British and colonial exports on the same footing as the most favored nations, similar advantages being given in return. What more can Canadian Free-traders desire? As a matter of fact Canada has refused, on more than one occasion, to be included in treaties with important European States, for no conceivable object, but because her Ministers are favorable to the principle of establishing discriminating duties, when there are opportunities of doing so. Such a policy, we feel assured, would be a most disastrous one for a country like Canada, but we cannot affirm that it would be inconsistent with protectionist views.

It will be probably in the recollection of our readers that in the year 1882 the Governor-General of Canada was informed by the Secretary of State that Sir Anthony Musgrave, then Governor of Jamaica, reported to him that he had learned "from unofficial but trustworthy "sources, that the Government of Can-"ada desires to enter into special com-" mercial arrangements with that colony, "and the British West Indies generally, "in the direction of reciprocal conces-"sions in the reduction of import "duties," and that he (Sir A. Musgrave) had refused to entertain the subject. On this the Secretary of State observed:-"I need scarcely say that "Sir A. Musgrave is entirely right in his " assumption that Her Majesty's Govern-" ment could not sanction any arrange-" ments which would involve the creation " of differential duties in favour of Can-"ada." In their Minute of Council in reply, the Dominion Government maintained that " it is competent for any of the "Colonies possessing representation and " responsible Governments to enter into " mutual agreements for either partial or "absolute free-trade with the Mother "Country or with each other, or with " both, discriminating against other coun-" tries." There was no pretension that it was competent "to negotiate treaties of " reciprocity with foreign Governments," which is what is still claimed by the Montreal Gazette.

We have quite recently had an illustration of the result of reciprocity treaties. It appears that a treaty has been negotiated, between the United States and Spain, on the principle of the free admission of a number of leading articles, and reduced duties on others. Although it is as yet very doubtful whether this treaty will be ratified by the Senate, the merchants of St. John, N.B., have taken the alarm, and are actually crying out for annexation, in order to secure admission for their products to the Spanish West Indies on the same terms as the United States. We have not the slightest doubt that the very same parties would have advocated the reciprocity arrangement with the West Indies, which was desired by the Dominion Government. It is now known that efforts are being made to effect a commercial treaty between the United States and the West Indies, substantially the same as that between the former and Spain. Many difficulties will be found, but, on the assumption that both treaties should be ratified, Canada may be compelled to abandon her sugar duties at a loss to her revenue of over two and a half millions of dollars. So much for discriminating duties.

Sir Richard Cartwright was cautious in his utterances as to the future of Canada, while his former colleague, Mr. Laurier, did not conceal his desire for independence We find it difficult to believe that a man of Mr. Laurier's intelligence, can believe in the possibility of two independent republics on this continent, bearing in mind especially that the several States are practically independent. As to Sir Richard Cartwright's suggestion, that there might be some kind of federal union, between English-speaking nations, the object being of course to unite Great Britain and the United States by some new ties, we look on it as wholly impracticable. It would be simply a resort to the antiquated policy of an alliance offensive and defensive. It has been a settled principle with the United States since their revolution, that they would refrain from all interference with questions of policy in Europe, and they would most certainly enter into no alliance of the kind indicated. As to the adjustment of disputes which may arise in the future as they have done in the past, there cannot be a case conceived, where there was less probability of an amicable settlement than that of the Alabama claims, and yet after long and fruitless negotiations the controversy was settled by arbitration and without causing any illfeeling between the nations.

We have so often had occasion to treat the subject of the Pacific Railway. that we deem it unnecessary to notice at any length Sir Richard Cartwright's reference to it. We are glad to find, that he admits that British Columbia "would have been a desirable acquisition," if it could have been obtained without constructing the Pacific railway. The real cause, according to him, of granting "such outrageously absurd terms was to gratify a childish vanity on the part of the leader of the then Government." Now surely Sir Richard Cartwright must be aware that the proposals for Union came from British Columbia, whose delegates came to Ottawa, and who made the construction of the railway a sine quâ non. It is true that they would have accepted a condition that the railroad should be made more slowly, provided an ordinary road were at once proceeded with. The Dominion Government preferred making one road to two, especially as the railroad through the North-West territories was also required. Had the overtures been rejected there was serious danger that British Columbia might have seceded. Canada would have preferred delay.

#### THE BUSINESS OUTLOOK.

Upon the verge of the holiday season comes a lull in the wholesale trade, which invariably remains unbroken until after New Years, when, in the natural course of events, business will no doubt begin to recover from the torpor which has already settled down upon the commercial world. The advent of 1885, however, is certainly not big with the promise of any great expansion of trade, nor is it, on the other hand, pregnant with those sterile prospects which some are inclined to foreshadow. The conditions of transacting business are steadily gravitating towards the hand-to-mouth policy in almost every line of merchandise, and this of itself ought to inspire confidence in the future, as it simply means a stricter adherence to legitimate principles, and the abandonment of the speculative element, which has too long been a prominent factor in commercial dealings. With business, therefore, working into much safer channels, whereby the carrying of heavy stocks is obviated, and risks are minimized; with profits surer, and losses less likely to occur, we cannot go to the length of pessimists, some of whom would have us believe that we are on the eve of universal bankruptcy. That the situation partakes of extreme dullness there is no gainsaying, any more than it can be denied

that such a condition of things usually culminates about this time. Nor does it require much effort to perceive reasonable grounds upon which to base expectations of an improvement in general trade during the coming spring. We admit that farmers have been provokingly tardy in marketing their abundant cereal products, thereby postponing the liquidation of their long past due indebtedness, the brunt of which has to be borne by the wholesale merchants, who are compelled to assist country customers in providing for a large portion of their paper as it matures. There is no apprehension, however, as to makers being in a position to ultimately pay their renewal notes, as the source from whence they draw their shekels was never in a more solvent condition, the full amount of their liabilities being guaranteed by the known ability of farmers to settle in full as soon as they make up their minds to realize upon their crops. The prerogative which the farmer enjoys in enforcing an extension of time above every other class of creditors no doubt helps to intensify the existing depression in trade circles generally, for just as long as he demands an extension of credit he will naturally be parsimonious in his purchases and hence the many complaints of chronic dullness of trade in the interior. The time is not far distant, however, when producers will have their hands forced and it may then occur to them that a willing game would have proven the best after all. There is every prospect of a very large trade in Canadian grain of all kinds next spring, and even since the close of navigation there has been more trading therein for shipment to the English market via Portland than was expected. Beyond the holiday stagnancy, therefore, which now obtains in many branches of the wholesale trade, the outlook is certainly more hopeful than gloomy.

#### THE GOVERNMENT AND THE BANKS.

There can be no doubt as to the fact that there is increasing dissatisfaction on the part of the banks generally at the persistence of the Government in paying to the depositors in the Savings Banks a rate of interest in excess of the fair market rate, which has long been 3 per cent. The rate of 4 per cent, when originally fixed, several years ago, was the same as what was then being generally paid by the banks, but no one knows better than the Minister of Finance that it has fallen considerably, and that all prudent banks have had to reduce their rates. Under these circumstances it is anything but

fair on the part of the Government to offer a rate higher than that generally prevailing. We mentioned in a late issue a case in which, owing to the temptation of a higher rate of interest, money deposited in the Bank of Montreal was actually withdrawn and placed in the Exchange Bank, where it was at the time of the failure of that institution. Of course it is not easy to ascertain with any precision the effect of the Government policy, but its obvious tendency is to encourage withdrawals from the banks, and thus cripple their means of meeting the demands of their customers. The policy is so objectionable that we can have little doubt that it will be made the subject of criticism on the meeting of Parliament, and if the Finance Minister or the Postmaster General were wise they would anticipate a discussion, out of which it will be impossible for the Government to come with credit.

#### THE TAXES ON CORPORATIONS.

Another decision of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council has cut off a source of revenue from the Quebec Government, viz, the ten cent stamp on documents in all legal cases. It is to be regretted that there has been so much delay in obtaining the decisions of the Canadian Courts as to the legality of the taxes on corporations, but it is hardly conceivable that the Privy Council will sustain them, and the sooner the Quebec Government recognizes that it will be unable to maintain those taxes, the better it will be for the people who will ultimately have to shoulder the burthen. In the case of the ten cent stamp tax the Canadian Courts were divided, but the final decision of the Privy Council confirms the original judgment of Mr. Justice Mackay, which was reversed by the Court of Appeal, Chief Justice Dorion dissenting, and then confirmed by the Supreme Court by 4 to 2. Those who complain of the decision of the Privy Council as an interference with Provincial autonomy should bear in mind that no other Province but Quebec has attempted to impose such taxes.

#### THE ST. LAWRENCE CHANNEL.

We have not failed to notice the Hamilton Spectator's reply to our last notice of his persistent opposition to one of the most important public works of the Dominion, the improvement of the St. Lawrence channel. We readily supply what our contemporary terms "some

unnamed authority," which was that of a Board of Engineers in the United States, whose advice was sought in 1858 by the Harbour Commissioners of Montreal and whose conclusions, we stated in full, although we omitted to mention that a previous extract was from the same report. The gentlemen who constituted the Board were Messrs. Childe, McAlpine and Kirkwood. The Spectator seems to be under the impression that there has been some opposition offered by the people of Montreal to the deepening of the St. Lawrence canals. We have never heard of any, and we feel assured that the main question at issue would not be affected by such a work The Spectator gives the depth of the Welland canal, when the agreement shall have been completed, as 12 feet, and he desires that the same depth should be obtained in the St. Lawrence canals, and then he seems to imagine that steamers drawing 274 feet would stop at Quebec. He forgets that the Montreal trade alone would be sufficient to ensure the prosecution of the voyage to Montreal, where the large steamers would take the canal traffic, up matter what size the craft carrying it might be.

The Spectator does not seem to perceive that the whole Canadian traffic by the St. Lawrence route would be benefited by the improvement in question; and although Montreal may perhaps from the extent of its trade derive a greater benefit than smaller ports on the Upper Lakes yet all do receive proportional advantages. Can the Spectator cite an instance in which it was ever proposed to throw the cost of improvements in the river Mississippi on any of the cities situated above New Orleans? Montreal has good cause to complain bitterly of the Ontario press. Her harbor is almost the only one in Canada of any importance that has received no aid whatever from the public treasury, and yet while the canals constructed to surmount the obstructions of the rapids have been provided for as public works there has been persistent opposition to the deepening of the channel of the St. Lawrence, on the ground of its being a Montreal work, although the expenditure has been chiefly made at a distance of 9) miles from that city. It is now upwards of 43 years since it was resolved that the improvement of the channel of the St. Lawrence should be undertaken as a public work, and be placed on the same footing as the canals, the object of both improvements being the same, and being one in which the whole people of Canada had a common interest.

#### FIRE LOSSES APPORTIONMENTS.

Some years ago we gave a series of articles upon the above subject, and as we believe it is an acknowledged axiom that "imitation is the sincerest flattery," we presume we ought to feel complimented that a contemporary has recently been endeavoring to deal with the same matter in a series of articles. We can scarcely believe that the able editor was at his post when the articles referred to were prepared. When anyone can give place in print to the following example, viz.:

Company A on building .......\$2,500

"B" subject to av ge 5,000
value of building \$10,000, loss \$6,000, and then boldly set down the apportionment thus:

explaining that said B's policy being subject to average the liability is as \$5,000 is to \$10,000 so will \$2,500 be to its liability, it is palpable the writer must have totally ignored the first rudiments of the average clause. All insurance men are aware that the average clause runs as follows: -"If the property so covered shall at " the breaking out of any fire be collec-"tively of greater value than the sum "insured thereon, then this company " shall pay or make good such a propor-" tion only of the loss or damage as the " sum so insured shall bear to the whole "value of the said property at the time "when such fire shall first happen." Therefore in the example given company B's liability is one half, no matter what the loss may be, while company A is liable for \$2,500 (provided of course it does not contain the clause that " if any "other policy covering said property be "subject to average then this policy "shall be subject to average in like "manner"), so that the insured in the example before us loses only \$500, not \$1,000 as our contemporary puts it. Supposing the loss had been \$3,000 instead of \$6,000 the adjustment according to the apportionment quoted would be that each company would pay half, or \$1,500, thus making the average clause in B's policy totally inoperative. The correct apportionment would be-it being understood that the English method of exhausting the specific policy first be waived-thus A's liability \$2,500 pays 5-8, \$1,875; B's lisbility \$1,500 pays 3-8. \$1,125.

This liability is the same and remains unaltered whether the loss be partial or total, though the proportionate contribution of the average and specific policies

vary materially with regard to rateable contribution when the loss is less than the amount of the specific policy. We have already given our views in the articles referred to at the commencement of this paper, and we are willing to admit that respecting those views there may be difference of opinion, but, so far as the simple average clause is concerned, it is not a question of opinion but of fact, and when a writer argues that the liability of an average policy for \$5,000 covering a value of \$10,000 is \$2,500 on a loss of \$6,-000 he simply exposes his gross ignorance of a subject he endeavors to handle and had better read up a few books before he again makes himself ridiculous in the eyes of the insurance community.

#### A CORRECTION.

We beg to assure the Hamilton Times that he is wholly mistaken in his interpretation of our late remarks on the subject of the Pacific Railway. Our main contention was that the Government was bound to act with good faith towards a company which had undertaken an important public work on certain conditions. Referring to the Manitoba South Western road, we expressed an opinion that if Mr. Stephen should fail in obtaining the means of constructing it "no other reliable parties are likely to make the attempt," whereupon our sagacious contemporary informs us that Mr. Hill of the St. Paul and Manitoba road has offered to build an entirely different line with the express object of diverting the traffic of the Canadian Pacific to his own road. We are quite ready to admit that competition is most desirable and advantageous for all persons interested in the traffic carried by railroads, but, on the other hand. railroad companies expect to obtain a fair return for the capital, which they furnish to build their roads. On this continent competition may be said to be the rule, and the consequence is that the rates are generally unremunerative. As to monopoly the public are protected by maximum rates, which cannot be exceeded. The question, however, is not whether, under certain circumstances, competition may be allowed, but whether the faith of the Government and the Parliament shall be adhered to. Surely it will not be pretended for a moment that the gentlemen who undertook to enter into an agreement with the Government for the construction of the Pacific railway had not a right to stipulate that no charters should be granted for the construction of railways which

would divert their legitimate traffic to a rival line in a foreign country. And yet this is what our contemporary and others . term "monopoly." There is not the slightest analogy between the case of the Pacific railway and that of any railway in Ontario, But for the conditions under which British Columbia entered the union the people of Manitoba would have had to build their own roads at their own cost, arrangements which Sir Richard Cartwright holds would have been very desirable, but which we are inclined to think would have been complained of quite as much as the Pacific railroad has heen.

#### ADULTERATION OF FOOD,

Mr. H. Sugden Evans, government analyst, has been interviewed by the St. John Telegraph. The new officer delivered his opinions freely. He thinks the forthcoming government report will show that fully one-third of the articles examined were adulterated. Butter makers come in for a considerable share of blame, although it is well known to the trade that little or no adulteration ispractised in that article of food, low qualities resulting from imperfect washing. working, packing or storing. The extra care necessary to produce finest butter throughout would cost less of time and labor, and result in far greater benefit to . the producer than any adulteration practicable in this country under existing economical conditions. As all kinds of people throughout the country make butter, and as cleanliness and taste are instinctive rather than acquired, it must follow that an article so sensitive to its surroundings must continue to be more or less imperfect until the creamery system comes into more general use.

The trade will smile at the mention of the old exploded notion of sugar adulterated by mixing with sand. Everybody has heard the apocryphal story of the Quaker who interrupts his prayers to ask his assistant if he has sanded the sugar. Many a fraudulent statement is similarly perpetuated. We can scarcely believe that Mr. Sugden Evans is a believer in the sand story. The greatest adulteration in articles of food is doubtless in the preparation of spices and coffee, and if the new officer of the Government can and will compel the grinders to label their packages "Pepper Mixture," "Coffee Mixture," etc., he will deserve well of those who tax themselves to pay his salary. One or two needy, purchasable, partial analysts with their carefullyworded certificates placarded on fences

all over our cities are enough to bring discredit on the returns of the department which they serve.

People remark on the comparatively small proportion of coffee consumed in Canada, and the remark is true in a sense beyond what is meant. Indeed there is very little pure coffee consumed by the masses of the people, and so accustomed is the public palate to the use of chicory that the genuine article is not always recognized as such. "Pure coffee" in some of the best stores means an admixture of from ten to fifteen per cent. of chicory. It is not surprising that so little coffee, good or bad, is consumed among us. Give the people a good article, and they will use more of it; but this would of course necessitate a charge at retail of from 35c. to 45c. per pound. Tea is not so easy of adulteration, and is judged by appearance as well as by its "drawing" or "cup" qualities, and tea has therefore become the great national drink of the people-the cup that cheers but not inebriates.

#### THE BUNTIN SENTENCE.

On Tuesday last Mr. Alex. Buntin was sentenced to ten days' confinement in the common jail of the district on the charges already referred to in these columns. There is but one feeling-that of sympathy-for Mr. Buntin in the result of the trial. The condemnation in this ease is a practical reply to those who loudly exclaim that wealth is a sure defence against the terrors of the law, the more so as few, if any, entertained the belief that Mr. Buntin intentionally committed any wrong. The private prosecutor has the further satisfaction, if any, of paying the costs of the trial, an event which he may be supposed not to have anticipated at the outset. The following is the Judge's ruling in brief:

The accusation was that you, in concurrence with Mr. Craig, president of the Exchange Bank (you yourself being then a director of the bank) conspired to receive an undue preference over other creditors to the extent of \$8,000. You were and are a creditor to the bank yourself to a large amount, and the sum withdrawn was only a part of the deposit then standing to your credit. At this time the bank had suspended payment, and was in a state of insolvency. In thus acting you became involved in the commission of an illegal act. Upon this point the statute is clear and precise. The facts proved were indisputable, and in truth could not be denied. You were ably defended and you had a fair trut. The verdict of the jury was sustained in law, and the result was and is that you stand committed of having violated the law, and thereby subjected yourself to the pondities of a misdementor. For this offence the statute provides a sentence of imprisonment for any period less than two years. It may be proper to remark that you have been a man of wealth, and returned the money the instant—or as soon as—you became convinced that you had committed an illegal act. This will, of course, remove from the minds of those who were concerned in the administration of the law that there was any very scrious intent to defraud. The charge against you is not that you

did it with intent to defraud, but that you did it. There is the law before me, and I must enforce it, however painful. The creditors of the Bank did not lose one dollar by the undue preference, but, in the opinion of the Jary, the law has been transgressed. No compromise was proved, and in law compromise was not possible. There are, however, many circumstances contained in your case which inclines the Court to exercise the utmost leniency computible with the reasonable application of the law, and a rather mild vindication of it. Had it been in my power to impose only a fine, possibly I might have considered myself justified in doing so.....I am very much afraid that my leaning on the side of elemency possibly—possibly I say—is carrying me too far; but still, I assume the responsibility of that. It rests with me, and I am prepared to bear it. As I still before, I would rather err on the side of leniency than that of harshness, and the sentence is that you be imprisoned in the Common Jail of this district for the space of Ten Days.

Mr. Buntin was accompanied to the jail by Hon. A. W. Ogilvie, Messrs. B. K. Greene, Andrew Boyd, J. J. Curran, M.P., and Payette, the governor of the jail.

CLAUDIUS V. Boughton, agent at Toronto of the Accident department of the Citizens Ins. Co., has been discovered in a series of petty defalcations extending over several months. His method was to collect from and give receipts to workmen and the smaller class of policy holders and neglect to make any entries or returns to the company. It was not uncommon for this class of customers to pay by instalments, a small sum down, and Mr. Boughton appears to have taken advantage of the many lapses which usually occur, pocketed the first instalment, and never make any entry or return, except where a policy became a claim, when everything would be set straight. The amount of these petty misappropriations discovered thus far is about \$400, but there is a larger amount, about \$1,000, missing on account of annual premiums. On being accused of the embezzlement be confessed to a shortage of about \$10, and failing to obtain any satisfaction, the company had no alternative but to have him arrested. Boughton appears to have made a favorable impression on his new employers until caught tripping, and was in receipt of a good salary besides the commissions which he had worked up to a considerable amount. One of his securities is Mr. Cluxton, his father-in-law a retired wealthy graut dealer and insurance man at Peterboro. On the first intimation of the trouble, a few weeks ago, Mr. Cluxton notified the company that he wished to withdraw the bond, an evidence that confidence was lost in that quarter also. The accused furnished bail in \$1600.

The good debts due the insolvent, of which his creditors get nothing, were valued at \$1924. Had there been any provision in the law of the land such as our leading business men and the various Boards of Trade have been arging upon Parliament for the last few years, the estate of Levetus, and many like it, would not have been dissipated as shown above.

The annual meeting of the Windsor Hotel Company was held Wednesday last, the president, Mr. Andrew Allan, in the chair. The profits for the year were shown to be about \$90,000, of which \$36,000 went to pay interest on bonded debt, \$26,000 to pay dividends to shareholders and about \$15,000 was expended on the new wing, in curpets, furniture, etc. Mr. Burland advocated the reduction of the interest on bonds from seven to five per cent., but the plan proposed did not meet the views of the directors, who were not disposed to assume again any such responsibility as that of former years. The annual report was adopted. The following gentlemen were elected as directors for the ensuing year: Messrs. Andrew Allan, W. O. MeDonald, Chas. Garth, James Shenrer, J. D. Gibb, (in place of Mr. Geo. B. Burland) Mt. H. Gault, Hector Mackenzie. At a subsequent meeting Mr. Allan was elected president and Mr. McDonald, vice-president.

This liabilities of Fitzsimmons & Byrne, grocers, Ottawa, who assigned last week, are about \$10,000; the assets are about \$9,000, of which \$5,600 are in book-debts, chiefly against farmers in the vicinity, who constituted the greater portion of their customers, and with whom Mr. Fitzsimmons appears to have maintained business relations for many years. The present firm dates from the spring of 1883 when Mr. Browne retired and undertook to liquidate the estate, out of which he is understood to have realized some profit. Mr. Byrne had been for years in the employ of the old firm. The troubles of the present firm, as may be inferred, are due to over-much credit, but immediately to a suit for \$800 brought against them by a creditor. Mr. Wm. Donahoe of this city, to whom they assigned, is the principal creditor, and is supposed to be pretty well secured.

The Central Vermont Railway purpose to begin a regular train service over the Waterloo & Magog Railway as soon as a turn-table and engine-house can be creeted at the present terminus at Sherbrooke, with accommodation for passengers and freight at that point. Mr. J. W. Hobart, the general manager of the C. V. R'y Co., accompanied by Mr. Foss, mechanical superintendent, and Mr. Futvoye from St. Johns, went over the line on a visit of inspection a few days ago. It is the intention to run trains so as to form close connection at St John, to and from the cities of Montreal and New York.

W. T. RUTHERFORD, eigar manufacturer, London, Ont., who does a large trade in Manitoba, and who during the land boom speculated successfully, was recently charged before the London Police Court with obtaining \$5000 from W. H. Bartram, his former solicitor, in February, 1882, by representing, as alleged, that he had got \$1,200 from a Mr. C. H. Joey, now solicitor for Rutherford, for the purpose of a syndicate to purchase two blocks in Brandon, to which Rutherford was to contribute \$1,200, Joey \$1,200, Bartram \$600, and a Mrs. Smiley \$500. It appeared that only Bartram and Mrs. Smiley had paid the hard cash, and that Rutherford and Joey that paid very little, if anything. The magistrate, however, dismissed the charge, holding that it was projer for a civil suit. Mr. Rutherford now threatens an action for malicious prosecution against Mr. Bartram, who has, however, entered into a recognizance to prosecute the charge at the sessions. Mrs. Smiley and Mr. Bartram will bring actions against Mr. Rutherford to recover.

The New York Commercial Bulletin remarks that the success of the recently discovered hydrochlorate of coconine, a partial substitute for chloroform, has created a lively demand for

cocoa leaves, from which the new substance is procured. Prices have advanced in consequence and are now quoted on the market at \$1.00 to \$1.50, against 40c to 75c a short time ago. It requires about 500 pounds of leaves to produce one ounce of the new preparation. The present value of the latter is between \$4 and \$6 per gramme. That the success of the cocoa article is assured is manifest in the fact that prices of chloroform are on the decline, and now some 15c per pound lower than a few weeks ago.

The United States Live.—James W. Molson, of this city, late of the Victoria Straw Works, has been appointed agent for Canada of the United States Life Insurance Co., in the place of Mr. N. J. Tessier, resigned. There have been somewhat rapid changes in the Canadian management of the company of late—since its return to the field. The company never appears to have been fortunate in its management or successful in its business in this country. It is reported that its late agent in Toronto spent several thousand dollars the first year of its re-entry and obtained two applications. Re-organization expenses are a matter of course, but two applications are "too-too." We hope for better things from Mr. Molson, who has the advantage of a new correer before him and a field not over-cultivated at any time by the company he represents.

THE IGE PALACE.—A SUGGESTION.—A gentleman in this city who has an eye to symmetry and hearty suggests that the blocks of ice which go to the building of the new Ice Palace should be bevelled at the outer edges. This, he claims, might be easily done while the blocks are being laid, by means of a simple tool which any blacksmith may fashion. The effect would be to remove the jagged edges which usually prevail with such brittle material, and to furnish a multiplicity of facets which could not fail to add to the brilliancy and magnificence of the structure.

One probable effect of the wide-spread adoption of the Scott Act will doubtless be to lessen the consumption of beer and increase that of whiskey. The greater bulk of the former renders it difficult to handle, while a gallon jar of whiskey suffices for some time and is less liable to exposure. A cask or keg of beer or ale is not easily concealed in the waggon or buggy or about the premises; the jug of whiskey is a more accommodating companion, and will probably take the place of the occasional glass of beer over the tavern counter.

The Boston wool market was quite active last week, the aggregate sales amounting to 3,371,072 lbs., against 2,777,401 lbs. for the week previous and 2,061,000 lbs. for the corresponding week. last year. Another failure is reported in the Boston wool trade, the firm in

question having become embarrassed through the purchase of half-a-million pounds of Michigan X wool at 28c per lb., some time since. The total sales of wool in the above since Junuary 1, 1884, have been 112,017,875 lbs., against 119,432,855 lbs. for the corresponding period of 1883, a decrease of 7,414,980 lbs.

The Bell Telephone Co. has lately opened and connected with its Trunk Line System the following new offices, viz.: Acton, Brampton, Brooklin, Georgetown, Goodwood, Markham, Meadowvale, Port Perry, Petrolia, Sarnia, Streetsville, Stouffville, Uxbridge and Wyoming, and Belleville, Strathroy and Watford will be connected next week. Conversations have already been carried on quite successfully between Hamilton and Sarnia over the new lines.—Ex.

In referring to the large profits supposed by many to be realized by the fire insurance companies, The Ins. Times quotes that the net divident profits on the insurance business for the last ten years have averaged less than one per cent of the capital invested, and not one-half of one per cent of the aggregate assets, and that in the year 1883 these profits were a minus quantity, the dividends being paid from the interest receipts entirely, the companies not making money in that year to show any profit on the insurance business.

QUININE continues to depreciate in value says the New York Commercial Bulletin, owing to the excessive production abroad and prospective liberal supplies of cinchona bark. American manufacture is have reduced their prices to 90c for ounce phials and 83c to 85c for large packages. The foreign article is selling at 80c in bulk—a price low enough to make it more advantageous for American manufacturers to bottle that article than manufacture themselves.

THE OTTAWA FIRE BRIGADE.

OTTAWA, Nov. 24, 1884.

To the Editor of the Journal of Commerce.

Sin,—My attention was called to an article in your paper of the 21st instant signed "Experience." Reflecting on the Ottawa Fire Brigade in general and myself in particular and in support of his statement of our inefficiency quotes three instances wherein he says we proved a failure. Now sir, the 1st Fire he mentions is the market. Now it was proved on oath that that building was one mass of Fire and past putting out by the time the Brigade arrived, and there was no time lost in getting there. The 2nd Fire the Boiler Shop was well stoped, there was nothing destroyed but the roof, the sides and ends were left standing and where used again, a new stronger and better roof being put on. I might say this Building was a frame Building sheeted inside and out with Boards and filled between with saw dust, and had been built for some years and was as dry as tinder besides it was surrounded with other Buildings and wood sheds and none of them where damaged. The 3rd Fire to which he alludes is a fire in a Stable in rear of the Grand Union Hotel, he does not say that that fire was not well put out but he says the men shewed their want of discipline, by using Vile language now all I have to say to that is that if such language was used it was not by members of the Frigade but by out siders who were helping and I dont hold myself responsible for the doings of outsiders, and I dont know of any Member of the force who uses Vile language and I am willing to leave the reputation of the Brigade with those who know them best the Cruzeks whom they have served for Ten Years and in their opinion Experience is a Liar.

#### THE OTTAWA FIRE SERVICE.

We received, too late for publication in our last issue, a communication from Chief Young of Ottawa in reply to "Experience." We do not hold ourselves responsible for the contents of communications, nor do we intend that our columns shall be permanently occupied by acrimonious correspondents. In order to close-this series before it becomes so, we have asked "Experience" for explanations, and insert his reply along with the letter of the Chief, which we give verbatim at literatim:—Ed. J. of C.

To the Editor of the JOURNAL OF COMMERCE:

Sin:—As to the fire at the Market House in Ottawa, the circumstances were such as to render necessary a general whitewashing investigation, which the insurance companies were not invited to attend. As to the Boiler Shop, the fire occurred at noon-day and should never have been allowed to do half the damage it did. As to the livery stable fire, I do say "it was not well put out"; there was a continuous wrangle amongst the men as to the application of the water, which was, in consequence, used spasmodically and not systematically. As to the language used by the men on that occasion, I refer you to the last word of the Chief's letter for a specimen of it. You can readily understand that the men are not more choice in their epithets than is the Chief.

I have seen more fires than the Ottawa firemen and their Ohief, and I know when a fire is well handled. I do not blame the "Chiefs" of Fire Departments when good work is not done, because I know that men are forced upon the Chiefs by intrigue or by favor, whether they are qualified and willing or not. I say distinctly that the Ottawa Fire Brigade have never done good work at a fire. I do not think they have appliances for good work, and I do not think they are under such discipline as to do as good work as their appliances would permit.

Ashes.—Receipts are very light. First Pots have sold freely at \$3.75 to \$3.80, a few brls. being placed as low as \$3.70 and as high as \$3.821. Seconds \$3.15 to \$3.20. Pearls are

utterly neglected, and are nominally worth \$5.00 for Firsts. Receipts since 1st January 6152 Brls. Pots, 798 brls. Pearls. Deliveries, 6152 brls. Pots, 764 brls. Pearls. Stock in Store 1175 brls. Pots, 184 brls. Pearls.

Boots and Shoes.—Some of our manufacturers have been reducing their staffs, in view of the existing quietness of trade which usually sets in towards the holidays, stocktaking having been the order of the day. One or two houses are working on spring orders, and have been the exception to the dullness experienced by some of the other firms. Remittances although reported slow with one large house, may, on the whole, be called fair.

DAIRY PRODUCE .- Butter-The general market is in a very weak and unsatisfactory condition, so much so, in fact, that prices have given way on the finest qualities in sympathy with late English and New York advices, prices having receded 2c per lb. in the latter place. Here it is more difficult to sell even choice qualities, offerings of that description being more liberal of late than many in the trade expected to find it. The chief anxiety, however, is over the poor, medium and fair grades, large quantities of which are still held back of Brockville and west of Toronto. Country buyers need and west of Toronto. Country buyers need to exercise extreme caution in handling these kinds of butter, or they may have to suffer unpleasant consequences. Commission houses here should also be vigilant in order to guard against advancing too much on consignments, as they did hast year. Sales of fine creamery have transpired at 25c, and choice townships have been offered at 22c. Brockvilles are quiet at 15c to 201c, as to quality, and Western at 12c to 17½c, as to quality. Cheese.—The market remains steady for fine goods, owners of which prefer to hold rather than accept present bids from England. Should any animated stir take place between now and the holidays it will be more than the trade expects. tations are unchanged, as follows: Western— Fine to finest 11½ c to 12, fair to good 10½ c to 11]c, early makes 9c to 10]c. Fresh-Fine to linest 11c to 11]c, fair to good 10c to 10], early makes 8]c to 9]c, skims 5c to 7]c.

Drugs and Chemicals.—A rather quiet week has passed in general drugs, but the advances previously noted in iodine, bromine, mercury and its preparations have been well maintained. Quinine is steady, morphia quiet and opium unchanged. Henry chemicals are quiet, importations being all in, with dealers ordering in small quantities to fill immediate wants only. Bleaching powder still leads the firm list at \$2.40 to \$2.50. In other kinds there is little or no change. A new feature in the trade is the substitution of alkali and crystal carbonate for sal soda. The alkali is soda ash made on an improved principle, and the crystal carbonate is sal soda in concentrated form.

DRY GOODS.—Apart from stock-taking, there is no stir whatever in the dry goods department, travellers being nearly all home, and until they start out with general spring samples business is not expected to show the slightest animation. A few buyers have returned from England already, but it is claimed they were a little too hasty, as they must have missed the latest spring styles. In Chandian tweeds, orders for spring goods continue to be sent in by travellers. One of our large tweed houses has appended to its regular business the furnishing of tailors' trimmings, English coatings, buttons, etc., which, although somewhat of a departure, has been called for by the customers of the house referred to. Remittances have been only fair. Notwithstanding the general dullness of trade, stock-taking has already revealed to some of our leading

houses that their sales foot up to a larger aggregate than they had expected. Cottons are quiet and steady.

Eggs.—A dull market has ruled during the past week, and the few sales reported were made at from 20c to 21c, a few fresh cases having realized 22c. A lot in barrels, was sold at 19c.

Fish.—Continued dullness marks the trade in pickled fish. Labrador herring being slow sale and prices range from \$5.75 to \$6.25 per bbl. Cape Breton have sold as low as \$4.50 and \$4.75, and prices range from \$4.50 to \$5. Green cod \$4 for No. 1, \$4.50 for No. 1 large, and \$5 for large draft. Dry cod dull at \$4 to \$4.25 Gaspé, \$3.50 to \$3.75 Nova Scotia and American. Newfoundland salmon \$11,\$10 and \$9 per bbl. for Nos. 1, 2 and 3, and at \$13.50 to \$14 for No. 1 in tierces.

Grain and Flour.—There has been a fair movement in wheat and peas from points west on through freights to Liverpool via Portland, engagements having transpired at 40c per 100 lbs on wheat from points west of Toronto, and at 25c per 100 lbs. on peas from points east of Kingston. Sales of No. 2 Red Winter wheat have been made in the Stratford district at 69c, and since sleighing has set in, hormers' deliveries have been more free. Here prices are quoied: No. 2 Canada Red Winter at 80c to 83c, No. 2 Spring 80c to 83c, and No. White Winter at 81c to 84c. Corn nominal at 70c duty paid; pens 70c to 75c nominal. Sales on the line of the Grand Trunk at 60c per 60 lbs for export. Oats 31½c to 32c per 32 lbs.. rye 56c to 57½c and barley 48c to 65c, as to quality. The flour market is quiet, and prices are easy, further shadings having been found imperative in order to work off stocks. Superiors are offered at \$3.75, Extras at \$3.65, and Spring Extras at \$3.55. Oatmeal quiet at \$4.00 to \$4.25 for ordinary, and at \$4.40 to \$4.60 for granulated; cornmeal \$3.20 to \$3.50. Pol barley \$4.25 per boll and pearl barley \$6.50 to \$6.75. Bran \$13 to \$15.00 per ton, and shorts \$15.00 to \$17.

Green Fruit.—The stock of apples in this city are now estimated at about 25,000 bbls., which does not show much variation from our previous estimate. In this market sales of fair to fine winter stock have been made in car lots at \$1.75 to \$2.00, and quotations range from \$1.75 to \$2.25, higher prices being asked for fancy stock. Oranges are quoted at \$5.75 to \$6.25 per case for Malaga and \$6.25 to \$6.50 for Valencias, Lemons, \$4 to \$4.50 per box for Florida and Messina, and at \$3.25 to \$4 for Malaga. Almeria grapes \$4.50 to \$5.00 per keg for ordinary up to \$6 and \$8 for extra weights. Catawbas 121c to 13c and California \$5 to \$6 per case. Occoanuts \$5 to \$6 per 100. English cobb nuts sold at 26c per 1b. Cranberries \$13 to \$15 per bbl.

Groceries.—Sugar market is easier, in sympathy with the condition of foreign markets. Granulated has been off-red at 6 3-8c, which figure it is claimed was shaded for a round lot. Yellows have lost tone, and quotations range from 4 3-8c to 5\frac{3}{2}c, the latter for extra choice brights. Latest cables from London quote a further decline of 3d per cwt. in the price of German beet sugar, off-rings of 38 test being cabled at 10s 4\frac{1}{2}d. In New York granulated has been sold at 6c. Molasses are full, and in order to moveround lots quotations would have to be materially shaded. Barbadoes quoted at 3\frac{3}{2}c, to 3\frac{1}{2}c, to 2\frac{1}{2}c, and Trinidad at 22c to 2\frac{3}{2}c. Syrup unchanged at 2\frac{3}{2}c to 5\frac{1}{2}c. Tulencia Taisins, all the large lots having been cleaned up at \$\frac{3}{2}c\$ and dealers now demand \$\text{9c}. A lot of 2,000 lowes have arrived in New York which was destined for this market, but unless 9c can be guaranteed here it

is believed they will not come on. A round quantity of fine old fruit having been received showing good value, the ardor of dealers to secure new fruit has been somewhat dampened. About 500 boxes of this lot sold at 7c. Malagaraisins are scarce and dan and prices are under control of holders. Sultanas have been dealt in at from 6c to 7½c, as to quantity and quality. Currants are in limited supply, and prices are quoted at 4½c to 5½c, cround lots having been sold to arrive at the inside figure. Prunes are plentiful and easier. French fruit being obtainable at 4½c to 4¾c. Figs are quiet, at former prices. The teamarke appears to be getting into a little steadier shape. Several sales of low grade Japans showing excellent value have been sold at 1½c, in all about 300 half chests. There has also been more enquiry for fine to finest Japans, with sales at 28c to 32½c. Coffee and spices are unchanged, the latter being quoted as follows: Black paper 17c to 18c; white, 25c to 27c; nutmegs, 45c to 70c; Chilis, 14c to 18c; ginger, 13½c to 18c; cassia, in chests, 9½c to 11c; do, in bales, 7½c to 8½c, and pimento, 5½c to 6½c. hice \$3.50 to \$3.60.

Hides, &c.—Nothwithstanding the protest of Quebec tanners against paying over 9c per lb. for No. 1 inspected Montreal hides, it did not produce the desired effect, as they were too much in need of immediate supplies to play a waiting game, and therefore 9½c was paid for several lots of No. 1 for shipment to Quebec yesterday. Green city hides stendy at 8½c No. 1. A few broken lots of Toronto hides have changed hands at 9½c for No. 1 and at 9c for No. 2. Hamilton hides are quoted at 9½c for No. 1 and 8½c for No. 2. Bulls 8c. In Western States hides a moderate demand is experienced at 9½c per lb. Manitoban dry flints 15½c to 16c per lb. Sheepskins are steady at 70c to 75c each; Calfskins nominal at 12c to 13c.

Hors.—Business appears to be going from bad to worse, several good sized lots having been forced upon the market at a loss to holders, although they cost what seemed to be a reasonable figure at the time. Stocks are large, and accumulating, and at the moment it is difficult to sell except at a loss to holders. A representative of a New York firm has been in the city since our last report, and managed to sell a number of parcels of very choice Californian hops, which seemed to be appreciated by our brewers although costing much more than Canadian, the latter being quoted at 14c to 15c for fine down to 12c and 9c for fair to inferior.

IRON AND HARDWARE.-There was very little to be gleaned from dealers in Scotch pig iron this week, or any other pig, sales being confined to car lots or thereabouts at within range of auotations, which are as follows: Siemens, \$18.50; Coltness, \$20 to \$20.25; Langloan, \$19.75 to \$20; Gartsherrie, Calder and Summerice, \$18.50; and Eglinton, \$17. Warrants are weak, having dropped 7d to 42s 11d. Advices just received here from an English house throw some additional light on the muchtalked-of Lackawana sale of steel rails to the Canada Pacific Railway Co., as the correspondence referred to states that English makers could have taken the order and laid it down at Brockville at £5 17s Od., being equal to \$26 per ton. The present price of English rails f.o.b. Liverpool leaves an ample margin of 22s for freight. The metal market is still unsettled, ingot tin in London having declined 12s 6d during the week to £74 2s 6d. Ingot copper is also easier and 10s lower, at £57. Here tin is quiet at 2"c to 21c, and copper at 15c. Lead is quiet at 3½c to 3½c. Bars are steady on a moderate run of business at \$1.70 to \$1.75, plates are quiet at \$2.50 to \$2.75, and sheets at \$2.40 to \$2.60. The market for tin plates is unchanged \$2.60. The market for an planes is archanged at \$4.45 to \$4.50 for I. C. charcoal and at \$4 to \$4.10 for I. C. coke. Liverpool cables quote tin plates weak and lower. Canada plates are about over for the season, and are nominally quoted at \$2.85 to \$2.95 for leading brands. quoted at \$2.85 to \$2.95 for leading brands. The general hardware trade has not been idle by any means during the week, as, besides a fair amount of business in heavy goods, some good-sized orders are reported in shelf goods. Prices, however, are low and profits circumscribed.

LEATHER.—A few sales of B. A. sole have been made, but the quality was ordinary, and prices were in favor of buyers. Choice plump, selected weights, are scarce, and prices are steady. Several lots of harness have changed hands at 27½c to 28c for heavy medium, the range being from 26c to 32c. Black leather is quiet, the movement being very limited in waxed upper, bulf, splits and pebbled. Many firms complain that last month has been the dutlest November experienced for years. The transactions in some instances have fallen off from 60 to 75 per cent. Some of the leading shoe manufacturers are practically closed for the remainder of the month, and others are working on reduced time.

LUMBER.—During the week a little more enquiry was experienced at the yards, at generally unchanged prices. Hardwoods are firm. Building operations are said to be moderately fuir for the season. For large quantities our quotations would be shaded. Laths are steady at \$1.75 to \$2.

NAVAL STORES.—Spirits of turpentine is firmer, and values are now quoted at 50c to 52c, Imports are now all in, and as stocks are not large holders are firm. Rosins are firm, especially for the fine pale kinds. In other stores there is no material change.

Oils.—Fish oils are moving out of first hands slowly, as dealers and tanners only order for immediate wants, which are small Cod oil quoted at 55c for Halifax and 57c to 60c for Gaspe and Newfoundland. Steam refined seal oil 59c to 60c. Cod liver oil quiet at \$1.20 to \$1.30. Linseed oil firm, raw at 58c to 59c, and boiled at 61c to 62c.

Petroleum.—Advices from Petrolia report an advance there in refined oil of ½c per gallon, and holders here are, in consequence, asking a corresponding advance, quotations being 17 5.8c for car lots in store, 18c for broken lots, and 18½c to 19c for single barrels.

PHOSPHATE.—The season is now over for 1884, and contracts for next year's delivery will now be in order. Prices are nominal at \$10.50 to \$14.50 per tou, according to analysis.

Provisions.—A steadier feeling has been developed in pork, in, sympathy with the advance in prices in Chicago occasioned by light stocks in that great centre. The supply of pork in this market is not very bulky, although ample for all requirements of the trade, Chicago short cut clear selling at \$15.50 to \$16.25, and Western mess at \$15 to \$15.59, according to size of lot. Dressed hogs have no sooner commenced to arrive in better volume than prices have weakened, sales having been made at \$6.50 during the past few days, but resterday that figure was difficult to obtain for any large quantities, and prices are now quoted at \$6 to \$6.50 per 100 lbs. Lard is quiet and unchanged at 10¢ to 10¢ for Western in pails, and at 10c for Canadian. Smoked meats are dull, the season not having set in yet. Tallow quiet at 71¢ to 73c.

RAW FURS .- The receipts of skins during the past week were the largest of the season, embracing mostly all kinds, red fox being an exception. Although showing better quality than previous arrivals there is still a scarcity of dark prime skins. Several butky lots of beaver, bear, otter, fisher and muskrat have been received, with a good sprinkling of mink and marten. Fox are not expected until a little later in the season. Prices are quoted as follows :- Beaver, per lb., \$3 to \$3.50; bear per skin, \$8 to \$12; b ar cub, per skin, \$4 to \$7; fisher, per skin, \$4 to \$6; red fox, per skin, \$1; cross fox, per skin, \$2 to \$5; lynx, per skin, \$2 to \$3; marten, per skin, 90c to \$1; mink, per skin, \$6 to \$1; mink, per skin, \$6 to \$1; mink, per skin, \$6 to \$1; on \$1; per skin, \$6 to \$1; per skin, \$6 to

Australian moves slowly at 19c to 30c as to quality. Very little has transpired in Canada wool, and prices remain unchanged as follows :- A supers 26c to 27½c, B supers 22c to 24c, unassorted 19c to 21c, fleece 17c to 19c.

#### TORONTO WHOLESALE MARKETS.

TORONTO, Dec. 4, 1884.

Trade is thought to be better. But it is to an extent that cannot be measured and in some way that cannot be described. The opinion is universal that trade ought to be better. Even if manufacturers are despondent over their idle machinery there should be a distribution and consumption of goods. But there is not a satisfactory distribution, for retailers are everywhere uttering complaints about dull times.

The city is probably worse than the country. Fine weather was not suitable nor seasonable, for people would not buy heavy goods. And now that a sharp spell of cold rough weather has come there is some other reason alleged for the delay in the rush of buyers. Cheap goods are of no avail where the mass of the buyers are short of money. And that is exactly what afflicts trade at present. Wholesale men are making slow steps also in getting their stocks distributed. This is embarrassing. Indebtedness would not bear so heavily, and accounts would be safer if distributed over a hundred dealers throughout the country than if the goods were lying on the shelves of half-a-dozen wholesale houses. The movement of goods is still reported to be in small lots from the distributing centres. And although stocks are not very heavy, they are a burden where there is no assistance in carrying them. The prospect for the settlement of accounts in the country during the winter is not cheerful. The farmers are not showing any inclination to sell their wheat at present prices. And values of breadstuffs are not likely to advance much during the next three months. It looks as if ordinary business will be dull for weeks to come. And in the meantime the effort to sell goods will be maintained all along the line, among big and little houses alike. Financial business is moving along quietly. Banks appear satisfied with settlements made, but merchants complain of slow payments from the country. Rates of discount are nominally unchanged, and accommodation is ample to the right customer. Commercial paper continues

COAL.—There is no change noted in prices. Car lots are quoted at \$5.25 to \$5.50. All sorts quoted at \$6 delivered in the city. Wood \$5.50 for best four feet hard wood per cord.

COME OIL.—Prices are easier, as was predicted a short time ago. The combination here has had to come down to a basis of the prices charged at the refineries. Common Canadian sells at 17c to 17½c, according to bulk of order; and carbon safety at 20c. American oil is unchanged at 24c for prime and 27½c for water white.

Day Goods.—There is nothing new to report in trade. The retail trade is very slow, and wholesale business is of a light character, but with continuous orders. There is steady work in the wholesale houses but the results are not large. Cotton goods are still slow in movement, and prices have been made so low that profits are scarcely to be traced. In some cases woollen goods are better than cotton, but are also heavy. The entire trade is slow, and futures do not promise very much improvement.

Dauds.—Trade has been quiet. Several drugs have not been in much demand. Prices are steady. Quinine is still reported low, but not more depressed in value than was recently reported. Dye stuffs are unchanged, with a slightly improved demand. Cod Liver oil, Mid. \$1.90 and Norwegian \$3.50 per gallon. Preparations of iodine and mercury are higher in price.

Flour is still very quiet: Superior extra quoted at \$3.45 to \$3.50 according to brand, extra, \$3.30 to \$3.35. Oatmeal: unchanged at \$3.80. Cornmeal \$3.50 to \$3.65 per barrel. Bran \$10.50 per ton. Grain is quiet. Wheat has been firmer, but there is little movement, the firmness being caused by a demand to complete export lots. No. 1 Spring is quoted at 75e; No. 2 Spring at 72e; No. 2 Fall at 74c to 75e; No. 3 Fall 72c. Goose wheat at 57c. Barley has declined with slow sales; quoted at 67c to 68c for No. 1; at 65c for No. 1; No. 2; at 57c for 3 Extra, and 53c for No. 3. Oats 31c for car lots. Peas, 57c to 58c for No. 2. Rye, 56c. Corn offered at 50c, with no buyers. The stocks in store on Monday were 132,763 bushels wheat; 151,763 bushels barley; 15,301 bushels peas; 1,000 bushels rye. Total grain 301,000 compared with 175,119 same date last year; and 336,779 Dec. 4, 1882.

Funs.—Trade has not been active up to the pre ent, but the manufacturers are moderately satisfied. Prices have been fair and the profits as good as were expected. Robes are held at good prices, and furs for general wear are steady at remunerative prices. There will be a good market for skins. There are not many offering so far, but all that reach the market will be taken. New York market will be firm. Chrocenes.—The market is quiet, and prices so little changed that previous quotations held for the present. There is a slight activity in Christmas goods, fruits, spices, etc., but trade is scarcely affected thereby. Prices of dried fruits are very firm. Sugars are quiet and unchanged. Porto Rico 1 lower. Teas in moderate demand and prices maintained. Tobaccos steady with quiet trade.

HARDWARE.—Business continues very quiet for general hardware. There has been the ordinary pushing trade, and a fair business been done in stoves, skates, and such like seasonable goods. Retailers report a very quiet business Wholesale men report a light trade also, with payments rather slow. The winter trade does not promise to be very profitable.

HIDES AND LEATHER.—Business continues to be quiet and steady. Prices of hides are unchanged, but rather weak. Green are quoted at 7½ of for cows and 8c for steers, No. 1 inspected. Cured hides selling at 9c for cows and 9½ of or steers. Sheepskins steady at 75c; fine humbskins at 80c. Leather is entirely unchanged in quotations, with trade quiet but steady.

LIVE STOCK TRADE.—There is only a quiet local trade being done. Cattle for teeding purposes are offering more than buyers require. Butchers have possession of the market. Prices are not depressed for good beasts, but there are more common and light eattle offering than what are wanted, and prices are low. The export trade bring so unpromising is emburrassing operations that depend on the future. Prices for local demand are 4c to 4½c for fine heavy cattle. Ordinary cattle run from 3c to 3¾c. Sheep and lambs find a rather dull market at \$3.75 to \$5 for the former and \$3.2 to \$4 for the latter. Hogs continue to find a ready market at \$4.50 to \$4.62½ per 100 lbs., live weight.

Provisions, &c.—There is an abundance of supplies, and prices generally are easy. All descriptions of meats are cheap. Broom is in small demand and low compared with the price of hegs. Long clear is quoted at 8c, and 8½c in box lots. Cumberland cut 7 c. Hams, smoked 11c. Lard 10c to 11c. Pork \$15 to \$15.50. Beef \$10 to \$10.50. Butter 19c for choice tubs; medium heavy of sale at 16c; inferior 8c to 10c, and a drug. Eggs 19c for pickied, 20c for fresh, in case lots. Apples \$1.25 to \$2. Polutoes abundant at 37c per bag in cur lots. Onions \$2 to \$2.25 per barrel. Beans \$1 to \$1.20 per bushel. Cheese 11c to 12½c for medium to good. Hops in light demand at 12c to 18e for small lots, according to quality. Salt in fair demand and unchanged. Hogs coming in more freely, and prices steady at \$5.60 to \$5.85, and \$6 for choice car lots. Tallow 4e for rough, 7c for rendered. Fish, whitelish \$5, trout \$4.

SEEDS.—There has not been any trade here yet. But threshing has been going on, and enquiries are made from the country as to what prices would be if supplies were forwarded. There is only an export trade to be done at present, and prices here must be on a basis to compete with American and Continenal seeds in the London market. On this basis dealershere would not pay more than \$1.25 to \$4.50 for good red clover. What the local market may be in February does not affect present export prices. Alsike clover will have to compete in London with large supplies from Germany. It is thought that the early market for alsike will be better than what it will be later on. Dealers here would pay \$7.50 to \$8 per bushel of 60 lbs. The United States crop of red clover is large. It is a mere question for individual judgment whether to sell at present or wait.
