OTTAWA, Jan 12 .- (Special.)-"The great bloody assizes by the Liberals n '96" was the sounding phrase in which Major Currie (North Simcoe) described the ruthless slaughter of Conservative office-holders when the Laurier government took office in 1896. The doughty major insisted on reading a return to the senate, 35 pages in length, setting forth the names and alleged offences of the vicims of this "reign of terror." But this was only a partial list, he said. and added that the reading of the full roll of those who have fallen beneath the blade of the political guilotine would require at least two days.

Dur-ing the year there were 44,479 entries, representing a total acreage of 7,166.640, which is an increase of 3000 entries over the previous year, which had been the



A HOUSEHOLDER'S VOTE. Presumably the board of control and the city's legal department are wrest-Hng with whatever civic legislation is to be brought before the local house at the approaching session. There is one question that might be taken up, which would interest a large number of the citizens, not only in Toronto, but in other places.

In the submission of several of the bylaws at the last election, the interest of the citizens was a general one. The exhibition of that interest at the polls was confined to property owners on the basis of a belief that they paid the taxes or assumed the responsibility of the expenditures to be made.

We believe that if this argument be a logical one, it is the strongest possible reason why the much abused proposal to levy of taxes on land values adopted at once. If the real should be property owners are to do all the voting, let them assume all the taxes.

The taxes are also paid by renters who are just as permanent in their residence as many of the property owners. Many of the renters pay far more than many of the propertyholders. But the man with a fifteen foot lot with no improvements upon it, has a vote, while the man who pays twenty times the taxes and contributes twenty times as much to the prosperity of the city, has none, because he is ed. THE BANK OF TORONTO. In the address delivered in his co pacity of president of the Bank of Toronto at its annual meeting, Mr. Duncan Coulson summarized the factors which have conduced to Canada's prosperity under these headings: Rapid growth in population; extension in suilroad building; expenditure on public works; increase in manufacturing; further development of mines and enlarge ment of the area of cultivated land.

Fortunately along all these lines there has been remarkable activity and advance. This has been rendered pos sible by the readiness with which British and foreign capital has been supplied for the promotion of new enterprises and the expansion of those al-

ready established. But Mr. Coulson rightly reminded his audience that the apparent prosperity so created does not always constitute a stable for for solid growth, nor is it safe to as me that money will always be avail

able to the extent it has been hereto fore. Enterprises of any kind must be productive if they are to be of real and permanent value, for only in this way can the credit of the country be maintained and at the point necessary to assure investors.

Among the agencies directly con cerned in safe commercial and indus-

trial extension, none yields in importance to banking institutions. From their nature, they are responsive to all business fluctuations, and have it in their power both to promote judicious development and to check any tendency to speculative experiment. It is there fore of supreme moment that they be

themselves administered wisely and prudently and with due regard to possible contingencies. Canada, undoubtedly, has been well served by her banking system and those responsible for their administration have shown an earnest and well-advised anxiety to forward the national interests. The Bank of Toronto is a typical example of a conservatively managed institution as indeed is manifest from the fact that the rest account now stands at \$5,608,which is an even million in excess of the amount of paid-up capital. As Mr. Coulson said, the object in building up this account is primarily to strength. en the bank and to insure that the interests, both of depositors and shareholders, shall be protected and preserv-

Better crop prospects were reported from India and Russia. Liberal mow protection over most of the winter wheat belt in the United States afforded some additional comfort to speculators on the bear side. World Shipments Light. At the ensuing deeline, support de-veloped owing to the lightness of world shipments and because receipts north-rest were under the record of a year ago. Considering the cold and storms the supplies arriving at terminal points, however, seemed to many dealers to be larger than could reasonably have been expected. The outcome nevertheless was a steady one at the finish. Between the opening and the wind up May ranged from 99 3-4c to 100 1-8c, with isst sales 1-4c net lower at 99 7-8c. Break in Corn. Corn features were strong until a leading concern sold about 1,500,000 bushels for May dellvery, and caused a break in prices all around. 


