THE GERMAN ZOLLVEREIN TREATY HAS BROKEN IT

And All the Supplementary Conventions Will Cease With It.

London Times, Standard, and Daily News, Representing Both Shades of Politics, Endorse the Position Taken, and Practically Tell Germany If She Doesn't Like It She Can Do the Other Thing—A Little Sweetness Thrown Towards Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the Canadian Government—A Sensation at Berlin as Well as at Brussels.

Berlin, July 30.—The commercial treaty between Great Britain and the German Zollverein, which has been in force since May 30, 1855, was denounced today by Great Britain and ceases to be operative at once.

The Reichsanzeiger says that the supplementary conventions which were concluded when the treaty was extended to the German states joining the Zollverein, will expire with the main treaty next summer.

What London Papers Say.

London, July 31.—With reference to the denunciation of the German commercial treaty, The Times this morning again compliments Canada and Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the Canadian Premier, upon paving the way for further consolidation of the Empire, and expresses the hope that the German friends of the Empire will not be angry enough to refuse to negotiate another treaty.

It is, unappreciated, they should do so, they are not assured that the denunciation will be borne with fortitude. British exports from Germany were never large, and have increased very little in the past forty years.

Standard expresses views and says: It would be to the interest of Germany to meet us in a businesslike spirit for the negotiation of fresh treaties.

### THE JOHN EATON FAILURE.

Messrs. Reid, Taylor & Bayne Issue a Statement of Facts for Information of Creditors—Matter to be Passed.

The following statement of facts for the information of creditors of the John Eaton Company, Limited, has been issued:

Toronto, July 29, 1897.  
Dear Sirs,—In view of the action which has been taken by us in conjunction with some of the local creditors of this company we deem it right to place the foreign creditors in possession of the following facts:  
As you are no doubt aware, a fire occurred in this city on the 20th May last at three o'clock in the morning, by which the premises occupied by the John Eaton Company, Limited, with the contents were totally destroyed. Shortly after the fire the company assigned the whole of its insurance on stock and fixtures, amounting to some \$255,000, to their bankers, the Bank of Toronto. It is alleged that this was done in fulfillment of an agreement to do so made between the company and the bank in June, 1896.

From time to time after the fire circulars were issued by the company to its creditors, asking the creditors to take care of maturing paper, and promising payment in full as soon as the insurance was settled. Most of the creditors, on the faith of the promises contained in the circulars, complied with the company's request and took no proceedings. On or about July 12, inst., at the request of Mr. E. R. C. Clark, who acted therein for the Bank of Toronto, a meeting of some of the local creditors was held, and Mr. Clark attended and suggested that a committee be appointed on behalf of the creditors to enquire into the state of the company's affairs, with the view to the issuing of a circular by the committee to the creditors generally, to the end that the creditors should thereby be induced to still continue to hold off until the insurance should be settled. Assuming that this proposal was made in perfect good faith a committee was appointed, consisting of our Mr. Charles Reid, Mr. J. K. Macdonald of John Macdonald & Co., Mr. Marshall, representing the firm of G. Goulding & Sons, Mr. James Watkins, representing the firm of S. F. McKinnon & Co., and Mr. James Parkes and Mr. W. H. Wallbridge, solicitors, of this city.

On the day following the committee met at Mr. Clark's office for the purpose of receiving from him and the Thompsons, members of the John Eaton Co., the information which the committee desired before any circular would be issued. The Thompsons did not attend this meeting, and the same was adjourned until the afternoon of the same day, with a view to securing the attendance of the Thompsons, so that the required information could be ob-

tained. In the afternoon Mr. W. A. Thompson and Mr. T. C. Thompson, Director and Secretary-Treasurer, respectively, of the John Eaton Co., met the committee, but much of the information which was promised was not forthcoming. However, the committee insisted that before anything should be done a full statement of the affairs of the company as to the date of the fire should be furnished, together with particulars of what had been done with the assets of the company after the fire, and what unpledged assets of the company still remained, and asked that these be placed under the control of some person for the benefit of the creditors; and the committee further insisted that an undertaking should be given by the company as well as by the Bank of Toronto that the creditors should not be prejudiced by the delay in action they subsequently see fit to take to question the transactions which had taken place between the Bank of Toronto and the company.

The request by the committee that the foregoing information and undertaking should be given was recognized as being perfectly reasonable, and the committee were of opinion that at the adjourned meeting, to be held at 10 o'clock on the morning of the 15th, the same would be furnished. Instead, however, of this being done, on the morning of the 14th, at the instance of the Bank of Toronto, an assignment for the benefit of creditors was made by the John Eaton Co. to Mr. Clark. The committee met Mr. Clark on the morning of the 15th at the hour named, and asked for an explanation of the making of the assignment under the circumstances, and the explanation afforded was that it was insisted upon by the Bank of Toronto.

Perhaps an explanation of why the information desired by the committee was not given is afforded by the fact that on June 2 the minute book of the company shows, after the fire and after the members of the company were aware of its utter insolvency, a meeting of the shareholders was held at which they generously voted to invest the following sums:  
To Harton Walker, the President, \$1,000  
To T. C. Thompson, Secretary, 1,000  
To W. A. Thompson, 1,000  
and about the same time authority was given to the officers of the company to pledge the remaining unpledged assets, and in pursuance of this authority some cash was pledged and about \$500,000 was raised in this way.  
The committee was immediately dissolved, and we, in conjunction with some other local creditors, by some means, were induced to sign a deed of assignment to Mr. Clark, and the assignment to Mr. Clark had been made at the instance of the Bank of Toronto. The court, however, knowing of the filing of our petition and that notice for winding up order had been given, declined to grant the winding up order at the instance of Messrs. Hughes & Sons and

advised that those of an assignee under our Provincial Act respecting assignment and preferences. Under the former the company is completely wound up by a resolution of the assets under the direction of the court and by the calling in of all unpaid stock, and making the same available for the payment of creditors' liabilities. In other words, usually so called, the shareholders of the company, to the extent of their unpaid stock, become contributories to the assets of the company after the fire, and the nature of the transactions which have taken place in this case, consisting of the nature of the transactions which were taken over by the John Eaton Company, Limited, and the Bank of Toronto, the assignment of the shares of the company to the examination of Mr. W. A. Thompson and Mr. T. C. Thompson that the company family in the John Eaton Company was not all in cash, but was largely a matter of book-keeping as between a company called the Thomas Thompson Company, Limited, and the John Eaton Company of Toronto, Limited. In other words, when the stock of the Eaton Company was increased to one hundred thousand dollars in 1895, it took over the business of the Thomas Thompson Company, Limited, and so far as the facts have developed here there appears to have been no independent valuation of these assets.
