MAJOR MARCHAND LEAVES FASHODA

The Commander of French Forces is Now at Khartoum on the Way to Cairo—He Has Left a Substitute in Command—What Britain's Policy Will be, as Defined at the Cabinet Meeting—Will Not Forcibly Expel Marchand.

The London despatch to The Paris Soler, announcing the decision of Great Britain to establish a protectorate over Egypt, "diplomatically" denied by a despatch from London, yet there is no official denial, and the St. James Gazette urges the adoption of such a course.

MARCHAND AT KHARTOUM The Troublesome Frenchman Has Left Fashoda, But a Substitute is in Command. Paris, Oct. 28.—The French Foreign Office has received a despatch from its diplomatic agency at Cairo, confirming the reported arrival of Major Marchand at Khartoum.

MAJOR MARCHAND LEFT FASHODA ON SUNDAY and arrived at Khartoum this morning. He will start for Cairo to-morrow. As the other Frenchmen remain at Fashoda, Major Marchand's departure from there is not regarded as a settlement of the question.

Position the Same Officially. London, Oct. 29.—The morning newspaper editorials regard Major Marchand's movement from Fashoda to Khartoum as indicative of a yielding on the specific question in controversy, although the position is officially unaltered.

CONSTERNATION CAUSED IN PARIS

By the Report That Great Britain Had Decided to Seize Egypt—Frenchmen Believed It Was True and Looked Upon It as Practically a Declaration of War—A Fighting Cabinet is Probable Under Dupuy—Feeling in London:

New York, Oct. 28.—The Sun has the following special cable despatches in today's issue: Paris, Oct. 27.—At 9.30 o'clock to-night a report reached here that Lord Salisbury and the members of his Cabinet had voted to proclaim a protectorate over Egypt.

It is terribly significant of how such a step on the part of Great Britain would be met here that no other interpretation was put upon the story except that it was a declaration of war. It would, nevertheless, be unsafe to predict therefrom what would be the effect on France as a whole.

What a Frenchman Said. In conversation with two or three prominent Frenchmen, the correspondent of The Sun pointed out that even if the report was accurate everything depended on Russia.

IT HAS STIRRED THEM UP

Finance Committee Takes Steps to Counteract Fleming's Movements.

Don't Like the Idea of Hamilton Concerns Moving to Toronto—Minister of Customs Pays a Visit—Police and Other Items of News From the Ambitious City.

Hamilton, Oct. 28.—(Special.)—The action of Assessment Commissioner Fleming in seeking to attract Hamilton manufacturers to Toronto, has had the effect of stirring the Mayor and the Finance Committee to take steps to counteract such a movement, and also to devise a plan to encourage manufacturers to locate in Hamilton, when they are seeking new fields. The citizens are opposed to the system of assessing, but they are ready to support the city authorities in any scheme by which they can retain factories whose owners have been offered apparently superior inducements to move to other cities. The close method of assessment introduced by Mr. Hill's accession to the office of Commissioner is also a factor in the complaints. The Finance Committee and officials are meeting in private to discuss the situation and arrive at some plan of action.

St. Thomas Club Must Pay.

Judge Monck this morning gave his decision in the action brought by William Stroud, for the Hamilton Baseball Club, against the St. Thomas Rail Club, to recover \$50.00, guarantee and gate percentages for two games scheduled, but not played, last September at St. Thomas. His Honor gave judgment for plaintiff for \$70 and costs, a guarantee for the amount, which is now in the hands of President Cal Davis, who, as treasurer, holds money in reserve.

Hon. W. Patterson Here.

Hon. William Patterson, Minister of Customs, paid Hamilton a visit to-day, and heard a number of business men on customs matters at the Customs House. Several members of Parliament also called on him. Mr. Patterson, who was accompanied by his private secretary, John Bain, left for his beautiful home this evening.

No Money for the Dairyman.

George Watson, dairyman, before Judge Monck to-day, sought to recover a \$200 damage, alleged to have been caused by his horse and wagon last July, on King-street, through his horse being frightened by the electric road spring. The evidence given on behalf of the plaintiff showed no negligence on the part of the motorman, and the action was dismissed.

Police Points.

At the Police Court to-day John Burdington failed to establish a charge of fraud against Valentine Byrne, and the case was dismissed.

SHOOTING DOWN ON THEM

An Alleged Religious Pilgrimage to Honore Mercier's Grave

Frustrated by Archbishop Bruchesi, Who Was Going There Himself—Town Topics Takes It Back in the Case of J. Marshall Williams—Mr. Ogilvie Making Things Right in the Klondike.

Montreal, Oct. 28.—(Special.)—The Archbishop of Montreal is setting real hard upon President Drouin and Mr. Thomas Cole of Hon. Mr. Duro's personal staff. This is how it all happened. It has been the custom ever since Hon. Honore Mercier's death to engineer a special religious, but really a political, demonstration at the grave of the leader of the Parti National.

The ecclesiastical authorities have tolerated the turnout quite a while, but the other day La Patrie announced with a great flourish of trumpets that a big pilgrimage would be made to Mercier's tomb on Thursday next, and that all good Liberals were supposed to be on hand.

In a few hours the Drouin and Cole received a polite note from Mr. Bruchesi, inviting the two rising Liberals up to the palace. They went there, and the archbishop showed them the way to the great city of the dead behind Mount Royal.

The Archbishop told these politicians, however, that after his religious demonstration was over they might take the admirers of the dead leader to his grave and pray for his soul. This of course he did not intend to do, as he had been completely knocked out of the politico-religious fellows.

"An article appearing on page 1 of the issue of the 20th day of July, of the said weekly newspaper, Town Topics, containing in its heading the following, amongst other lines, 'History of Marshall Williams,' the whole of which article, as well as its contents mentioned and relate to J. Marshall Williams, is false, erroneous and without any foundation in truth."

"(Signed) Richard P. O'Bryan. Witness: (Signed) A. W. Cranberry. These follow specific details of the truth of every charge made in Town Topics against the character and good name of J. Marshall Williams."

The Yukon Administration. Dr. J. B. Leblanc, a French-Canadian of Detroit, who has lately arrived from Dawson City, when asked to say how things were managed in the Klondike, said that the administration of the country some time ago was simply disgraceful, so much so that he felt ashamed to be a Canadian. Corruption amongst officers was being practiced on a great scale. It was hardly possible to get any Government business without money."

"That is very plain talk, doctor." "I know it is, yet it is the common way of speaking in Dawson. The Canadian Government, I think, is responsible for that state of affairs. The laws imposed upon the country were simply farcical, and treated as such by the miners."

"But I must say that a great change took place upon Mr. Ogilvie's arrival. This sensible and respectable gentleman, who is set to work to better the situation. He interpreted the laws in a clever manner and moved certain officers out of his staff."

COX FIRED IN SELF-DEFENCE

Finding of the Jury in the Goderich Shooting Fatality.

Case Will Come Up Before Police Magistrate Seager at 2 P.M. To-day—Very Little Evidence of Importance Presented—Several Witnesses Examined.

Goderich, Ont., Oct. 28.—The inquest in the Cox-Beattie shooting case was resumed this afternoon in the Court House here. The witnesses examined were: Dr. Whitley, Robert Thompson, George Parmenter, Robert Lusk, Richard Chambers and Thos. Gundry, constable. Mrs. Beattie was too ill to appear.

The witnesses corroborated the evidence previously given and added further points which favor the prisoner strongly. The coroner reviewed the evidence impartially and gave the case to the jury, who returned the following verdict, after an absence of about 25 minutes:

"That on the morning of Oct. 26, Frederick Beattie came to his death in his own orchard by a pistol shot, the pistol being in the hands of William Cox, and we further find, according to the evidence, that the said Frederick Beattie was shot in self-defence by the said William Cox."

To-morrow the preliminary investigation will be held before Police Magistrate Seager at 2 p.m.

Funeral of Beattie. Goderich, Ont., Oct. 28.—The funeral of Frederick Beattie, who was shot by his father-in-law, William Cox, took place at the residence of the deceased at 2 p.m. to-day. There was an immense crowd present. The procession was nearly a mile long. The pall-bearers consisted of six of the Canadian Order of Chosen Friends, of whom the deceased was a member. The order attended in body. The services at the grave was conducted by Rev. Mr. Hamilton, pastor of Zion Church, Leeburn (Methodist).

Reasons for Thankfulness. President McKinley Proclaims Thursday, Nov. 24, as National Thanksgiving Day.

Washington, D.C., Oct. 28.—The President has proclaimed Thursday, Nov. 24, as Thanksgiving Day. The proclamation reads in part as follows:

"Few years in our history have afforded such cause for thanksgiving. We have been blessed by abundant harvests, our trade and commerce have been wonderfully increased, our public credit has been improved and strengthened, all sections of our common country have been brought together and knit into closer bonds of national purpose and unity."

"The clouds have passed for a time darkened by the cloud of war; but, as we were compelled to take up the sword in the cause of humanity, we are permitted to rejoice that the conflict has been of so brief duration and the losses we have had to mourn, though grievous and important, have been so few, considering the great results accomplished, as to inspire us with gratitude and praise to the Lord of Hosts. We may laud and magnify His holy name, that the cessation of hostilities can so soon as to spare both sides the countless sorrows and disasters that attend protracted war."

Cattle on Wolfe Island Died of Black Leg—Kingstonian Drowned Off the Schooner St. Peter.

Kingston, Ont., Oct. 28.—Isaac Fraser, son of the late Isaac Fraser of Elmwood, township, Lennox County, was one of the members of the Nebraska force that volunteered last spring for service for the United States army. He formed a cowboy troop and was sent to Chickamauga. There he died on Sept. 11 of typhoid fever. He was 28 years of age.

A veterinary surgeon has been examining dead cattle on Wolfe Island, and reports that they suffered from black leg, a dangerous and contagious disease. Capt. Ronald Cockburn of the Third Dragoons, Peterboro, has been here for several days. He had hoped to secure a place on the permanent forces of Canada, but has so far failed. He applied to the British Government, his application being favorably regarded by the War Office, and it is almost settled that the Captain will leave for the east coast of Africa and will be stationed at Uganda.

James McCreight of this city was the Kingstonian drowned off the schooner St. Peter near Sodus, N. Y. He was 80 years of age and had lived here from infancy.

Last night the steamer Ocean was towed into port by the steamer Sir L. Tilley. While coming up the river the Ocean's propeller struck an obstruction, breaking a blade. A new blade was added here to-day.

Schooner Lost, Crew Saved. Wilton, Ont., Oct. 28.—The schooner C. F. Mitchell, lumber laden, for Chicago, owned by O. W. Elphicks & Co. of Chicago, dragged her anchors and went ashore on Cove Island Wednesday morning, during a heavy northeast gale, and is a total wreck. The crew were saved, and are now at Tobermory. The news has just arrived by the Government fishery cruiser Dolphin.

Old Lady Dropped Dead. Colborne, Ont., Oct. 28.—Mrs. J. L. Yeoman, an aged and respected citizen, dropped dead of heart failure this afternoon at her own home. Deceased was 78 years of age, and is survived by her husband and two sons, John and Fred. The funeral will take place on Sunday.

GIRLS' HOME MEETING

Held Yesterday—Compelled to Draw on Their Assets to Keep Things Going.

The annual meeting of the managers of the Girls' Home was held yesterday afternoon at the Home, Gerard-street. The secretary's report showed that on Oct. 1, 1897, there were 28 children in the home and during 1898 45 were admitted and 58 discharged, leaving a total of 75 in residence on Oct. 1, 1898. The total cost of maintenance, including all expenses, was \$74,280, which gives the cost per day per child, 18 1/2 cents.

The treasurer's report gave the total receipts as \$74,280, and the total expenditure as \$74,280, leaving a balance on hand of \$716.20. But, as the collections for the year were a great deal smaller, it was found necessary to draw out a bond of \$2000 and use \$1000 of it, so as to make up the deficiency.




