WALKER NOW IN QUARANTINE

The Case of Walker. Mr. George Walker, the brakesman, who s credited with bringing the disease into is credited with bringing the disease into the town and spreading it here, left on his usual run, thinking himself convalescent before knowing that he really had smallpox. Mr. Walker first felt ill at Erm, where he consulted a local physician, who pronounced it a case of grip. At Erin just now there is an epidemic of measies, and it is just possible that a very mild form of smallpox has in some instances been wrongly diagnosed. Mr. Walker's was a very mild type, much milder than that of J. Howard and A. Linfoot, who contracted it from him. Mr. Walker came in from his run on the Teeswater branch last night, and is now quarantined at the Taylor boarding house on May-street. The cars he was on have been sldetracked and disinfected, and will not be used again for some time. Other cars have also been disinfected, and all the freight hands on the division are being vaccinated—the engineers on the left arm, so that they can handle the throttle with their right.

All Precautions Taken.

Other precautions taken to-day were or-

This state of affairs prompted a resolution which authorized the printing of forms to be sent to the medical men, but here again there has been neglect, and the forms are not yet in the hands of the doctors. This want of forms to-night placed the board in a very awkward position.

He weut in to see Walker and remarked, "Why, you've got the smallpox." Walker replied, "Heavens, it isn't that?" Walker had been skating at Erin a few nights before. He had sore throat, vomiting, pains in the back and all the symptoms of smallpox. Dr. Perfect then went to Dr. Mavety and said he had, a case he wanted him to see. "What have you got?" asked Dr. Mavety. "A case of smallpox," was the answer, "I never saw one," said Dr. Mavety. "Then you'll see one now," replied Dr. Perfect. They both examined the patient, and on the way back Dr. Mavety said: "If I were attending, I should call it chickenpox." He further says that the consultation of Dr. Bryce was not suggested by Dr. Perfect, and that he asked Dr. Perfect if he reported this as a case of smallpox, and he replied that he did not. Interest rate, which are the standards adopted by the company at its commencement, amounted to \$421,-587.00. To this there has been added, as a special reserve, the sum of \$19,525.00, to provide for the immediate payment of death claims and for deferred mortality, bringing the total policy and annuity reserves up to \$441,112.00. 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
