PACKED UP AT THE HOTELS

Winnipeg Manufacturer Discusses the Coming Biennial Conference at Halifax.

POWER FROM NIAGARA FALLS

Representatives of Rival Companies Interview the Cabinet—Where Thieves Are Organized.

THIEVES ARE ORGANIZED

M. Harrison Thomas of Winnipeg registered at the Rossin. Mr. Thomas is the secretary of the Manufacturers' Association of that city, and is en route to Halifax, where he will attend the biennial convention of the Manufacturers' Association of the Dominion of Canada. Discussing the subject Mr. Thomas remarked to a reporter: "The convention will not be an occasion until Aug. 13 and 14, but I desire to be on the ground a week in advance of the delegates. This promises to be the most important meeting of its kind ever held in the Dominion. It is of special interest to the northwest section of the country, and Winnipeg will send fifty or seventy-five as prominent trade representatives. Vancouver and the Pacific coast will be heavily represented. I am anxious to attend and to be a representative on an even footing with the other sections of the Dominion. I understand the rates from the coast will be largely reduced. The rates from the Pacific coast will be one fare for the round trip, and the rates from the east will be one fare for the round trip. I anticipate an attendance of at least four hundred delegates, and the most important questions now relating to Canada will be discussed. Probably the one of greatest importance to Ontario will be that relating to a Canada having a special trade representative in South Africa—a man who will be entirely without the domain of politics, and who will represent in the best sense the manufacturers of the Dominion. In addition to the question of placing special trade representatives in South Africa, the British colonial possessions will come up for discussion. The proposed tariff on the goods of the Dominion is being largely increased. I know it is essential that Canada can supply a freight tonnage of six thousand tons per month to the ports of Australia, New Zealand and South Africa. This would mean non-competitive freight, and which could be depended upon to hold out the year around. Then, too, the Pacific coast territory will be represented and a vigorous protest will be filed against some of the tariff discriminations. "Be Party Men, But Stick to Temperance Principles," Utterance of Rev. J. W. Cooley.

MEETING OF DOMINION ALLIANCE

Prohibitionists Will Roll Up a Big Vote for the Referendum—Officers Elected.

"Be party men, but stick to temperance principles with a view to securing prohibition in the Dominion." This utterance by Rev. J. W. Cooley was vigorously applauded at the meeting of the Dominion Alliance Council yesterday afternoon in Richmond Hall, thus showing that the feeling of the Alliance is solid against any third party, be it for the securing of prohibition or any other reform.

The meeting was opened in the morning with the president, J. R. Dougal, Montreal, in the chair.

At the outset the Business Committee was struck as follows: S. J. Carter, Montreal; Rev. J. H. Oliver, J. J. MacLaren, K. C. Toronto; Rev. E. J. Cheswin, Winnipeg; W. F. Lawrence, Saratoga; Rev. W. I. Moore, L. C. Peake, Mrs. A. O. Rutherford, Toronto; Mrs. Brownell and Secretary Beaudet.

President Dougal's Address.

In his annual address, the president congratulated the Province of Ontario upon the bright prospects for victory in the referendum vote in December next.

He referred to many things that had to be surmounted in the campaign, and reminded them that united effort was the only effective path to victory.

"Should a referendum be fair or unfair," he said, "even whether it is honest or dishonest, quite apart from its immediate legislative consequences, every vote cast for prohibition counts one in the minds of the public and in the minds of the politicians for prohibition, and every vote not cast for prohibition counts one against it."

Nobody watches more closely than do the politicians, friendly and unfriendly alike, the currents of public opinion. We ourselves do not scan as carefully as they do the returns of votes upon the liquor traffic, if we are not intended among them treated as a negligible quantity, while they are qualified before the liquor men, it is because such is their deduction from their most careful observations.

The outlook for a creditable fight in Ontario is most hopeful. Concerning the discouraging opinion given by John Charlton and his reasons therefor, the result of the referendum, President Dougal declared that the Scott Act was weak because it was confined to local limits. The desired amendment to the act was that its operations be extended to include whole provinces and that its enforcement be put in other than provincial hands. These objections were absent from the present law.

Continuing, he said: "We must never consent to any dilution of the Scott Act. It is the most beneficial law we have upon the statute book, and has greatly diminished drinking wherever its enactment has been in any degree enforced. The greatest mistake we ever made was to let it drop." He pointed out that the act had been repealed out of sympathy for those against whom it was enforced.

The pledge-signing campaign was declared to be one of the most important means of success recommended by the report of the Executive, which was referred to the Finance Committee.

The treasurer's report, presented by W. H. Orr, showed a balance on hand of \$13,338.

The Late Election.

The report of the Executive was read by J. J. MacLaren, K. C., and reviewed the events of the past year, dealing at length with the most important—that of the deliverance of the Privy Council on the Manitoba Act—and the consequent vote in Manitoba. Temperance legislation in Ontario was also referred to, and in connection with the action of the Ontario branch it commented as follows:

"The Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance expressed strong disapproval with the terms of the referendum. A general provincial election was approached, and an appeal was made to the electors to take action to secure the return of representatives in favor of a prohibitory law. A vigorous campaign was carried on, some independent candidates were nominated, and a number of candidates nominated by existing parties promised to support prohibitory legislation. The general result of this campaign was not known until the new legislature met. In the meantime the Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance is making an energetic campaign to secure a large vote as possible in favor of prohibition on Dec. 1st."

The report showed that requests for prohibitory legislation had been refused by the government of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, and that an amendment to the Canada Temperance Act, introduced during the last session by P. B. Plint, M.P., had been turned down. The Minister of Militia was commended for his readiness to accede to the request of the General Officer Commanding the Militia, that certain restrictions of the sale of liquor in cantines be removed.

Recommendations of Council.

The report embodied the following recommendations:

1. That, while refusing to accept as a final settlement of the liquor question any measure short of total national prohibition, the Council expresses its gratification at the action of the Imperial Privy Council, further defining the power of Provincial legislatures, thus opening the way for the enactment of further effective measures of partial prohibition.

2. That steps be taken to secure at the next session of the Dominion Parliament the enactment of such a measure of amendment of the Canada Temperance Act as will secure the better enforcement of that act in those parts of the Dominion in which it is in operation.

3. That all churches and other societies be requested to inaugurate an active movement to secure signatures to a total abstinence pledge, drinking a pledge form to members of churches, Sunday schools, Young People's societies, and having public addresses and sermons delivered in favor of total abstinence. In this connection, the following form of pledge is suggested:

"I promise to abstain from the use of intoxicating liquors as a beverage, and to discontinue such use by others."

Fraud in Quebec.

Rev. G. G. Huxtable of Montreal alleged that abundance of fraudulent work was largely responsible for the big adverse majority in the Quebec plebiscite. He cited instances of crookedness, and appealed to Ontario prohibitionists to prevent a repetition of such delinquency in the referendum campaign.

W. W. Buchanan, speaking on behalf of the referendum had all precautions and safeguards usually surrounding ordinary political elections. Both interests had the right to bipartite scrutineers.

Because they had remained away from the polls when the referendum was voted upon was not derogatory to their wisdom. They knew their own mind, and they were in the interest of prohibition.

Dr. MacLaren feared the Alliance had not the influence in Manitoba that it should possess. After further discussion on the part of several of the representatives, the report was voted upon, and unanimously adopted.

Against a Third Party.

At the afternoon session a debate upon the most advisable means of reaching the goal to which they all aimed was carried on, it having been introduced by a few remarks of the president on the machinery in existence for the enforcement of prohibitory legislation. He was of the opinion that the different organizations throughout the country could be made to spring into activity by their action on the part of the Alliance.

Rev. J. W. Cooley said that it was an undoubted fact, when it came to a parliamentary election, many so-called temperance organizations were practically inoperative. The organization with the officials, all aimed exclusively to hold the popular vote, but the representatives of the political parties got their candidates in the field, and afterwards, the temperance people awoke and started to work, having given their opponents a decided handicap.

Mr. Holland approved of this idea, and said they should get their candidates in the field before the Dominion campaign. An aged representative regretted that clergymen had a tendency to be always ruling in Ontario, and that it was not until the Dominion campaign was over that they were absent from the present law.

On motion of Rev. Dr. Chow, a resolution of condolence was passed on the death of Major E. L. Bond of Montreal. In submitting the motion, the president paid a glowing tribute to the deceased gentleman, in whose death the Dominion had lost a valuable friend.

MEALS FOR PEOPLES HEROES

Canadian Humane Society Will Investigate Claims of a Number of Miners.

PASTOR SILCOX'S RECOMMENDATIONS

Difference of Opinion in Paris, Owing to the Fact That Dr. Dunton is Not Included.

The matter of bestowing medals and certificates of the Royal Canadian Humane Society on the men who risked their lives in the Paris well for a few weeks ago to rescue Joshua Sanford will be taken up within the next few days. President Brown of the society lives at Hamilton, and Chairman Dunton of the board of governors has written him suggesting that he inform him as soon as possible the day on which the presentations shall be made. Mr. Dunton has not yet been given this information by President Brown.

That officer has, however, officially confirmed the list of men who will receive the medals: John Carney, Geo. Blanchard, David Mott, Robert Hamilton and George Wentworth. It is settled that the medals will be presented at Paris. The date of the presentation to have been named by the committee appointed for receiving funds for the purpose of erecting a monument for those who did such valiant work in the well for four days. This date has not yet been named.

Dr. Dunton should not receive the medal.

Just who will receive the certificates is uncertain. About thirty-five will be awarded to the different citizens. The friends of T. Harry Jones, the miner, who did hard and dangerous work in the well, are anxious to have a medal for him. Richard Doyle and Mr. English have many friends who assert that they have done their part, but that many people who are well and know the character of the services he rendered demand that the matter be left to the committee. Dr. Dunton is a big-hearted fellow, who took chances night and day, and performed the hardest and most dangerous kind of work.
