Origin in Trunk Room.

The fire had its origin in the "trunk room," an apartment in the front or main portion of the building, devoted to the storage of the pupils' trunks, and which is always kept locked. When the alarm was given, the interior of the entire main building was in flames, except that portion in which some of the dormitories were located. On all sides, in the college grounds, lay torn text books, exercise books, writing paper, piles of books, blankets, pillows, wearing apparel, etc. The air was full of flying fragments of burning shingles, etc., and as these fell upon the litter of paper, etc., which covered the ground, dozens of small fires sprang up on every hand. Crash succeeded crash with amazing rapidity as differ-ent portions of the roof or of the cell-ings fell in. And it very early be-came apparent that nothing could be done in that locality, and in the hope of confining the fire to the main part of the structure the firemen turned their attention to the portions in the rear. School Burns Down

Ridley College was an historic structure. Until the establishment of the college it was known as the Springbank a sanitarium famous for its healing waters. Under the control of Dr. Mack it grew in favor from year to year until it was known all over Canada, and the United States. During the summer months St. Catharines was filled with retired planters from the Southern States, who brought their cash and their rheumatism to the city, and added to its prosperity in the times antedating the new Welland Canal. But Dr. Mack died and the Springbank declined. The college was on the high bank of the old canal overlooking the lock two basin. Since the erection of the new school on the opposite bank of the canal it has been the home of the senior boys only. The situation is a charming one being fronted by a pretty hillside park and surrounsed by grounds spacious and well kept. The building was long and low, and well suited for college purposes. The rear plot faced Ontario-street and the city park. The main portion of Ridley College was built in 1864, by Dr. Mack, and the popularity of the institution was so great as to necessitate several additions. In 1889 it was first used for educational purposes, and became known as "Ridley College."





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
