

The veteran Marquis Yamagata is the oldest field marshal in the Japanese service. He was the instructor in war tactics of General Kuroki, who was so successful during the Russian-Japanese conflict. Marquis Yamagata was himself one of the big feudal chiefs of old Japan and sided with the emperor. When the imperial forces won over the reactionary party he was made head of the national army and it was his work that transformed the old-time soldiers that whipped China and then Russia. He in person commanded the Japanese armies against China in 1895 and he is frequently termed the Von Moltke of Japan. He is very influential with the Mikado and is a member of the close circle of elder statesmen which really governs the Japanese empire.




